Within the last few months the county has brought in several irrigation wells. Within the next two years we could very possibly see large scale irrigation farming develop around Spur. Such a situation would definitely bring a new type of prosperity to our city which we will expect our city officials to handle in a manner advantageous to us as a city.

Even without any oil or irrigation on a large scale, we as a city can and will continue to prosper as long as we can work together in a friendly and congenial atmosphere with and through our city commission.

We feel that the 1953 mayor's race here in Spur indicates that the citizens are definitely interested in our city's affairs and that there is a need for harmony now that the election is past.

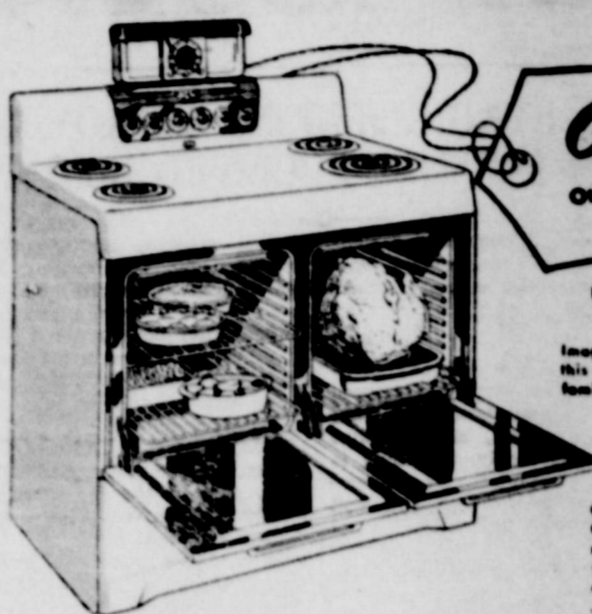

DUCK CREEK SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS NOTES

Following the recent rain, district cooperators are busy planting grasses. Blue panic and native mixtures. A. J. Richey, cooperator near Croton, planted 27 acres to a native mixture of Blue Grama, side oats grama, and buffalo grass last week. After the grass is established, Richey's plans call for removing the fence separating it from a native pasture.

Early vigorous growth from last year's plantings of Blue panic grass is reported by Lawton Harvey, Rex Robinson, O. E. McClain, in spite of last year's drouth these cooperators were successful with their plantings.

Irrigation is still a high light among a few farmers in the district. T. B. Watson's well promises to be one of the best discoveries near Sour. Willie Williams and Martin Pope are drilling wells this week.

T. L. Conaway, cooperator who

lives, eight miles east of Dickens, completed construction of three and one half miles of terraces recently.

An average size farm pond stocked with fish and properly managed will produce about 500 pounds of fish per year or a sufficient amount for an average family, reports S. C. S. technician, J. H. Taylor. Eight cooperators have requested fish through the district for early fall delivery. These men are Horace Wood, Ben Overstreet, R. H. Simmons, Bob Hahn, M. F. 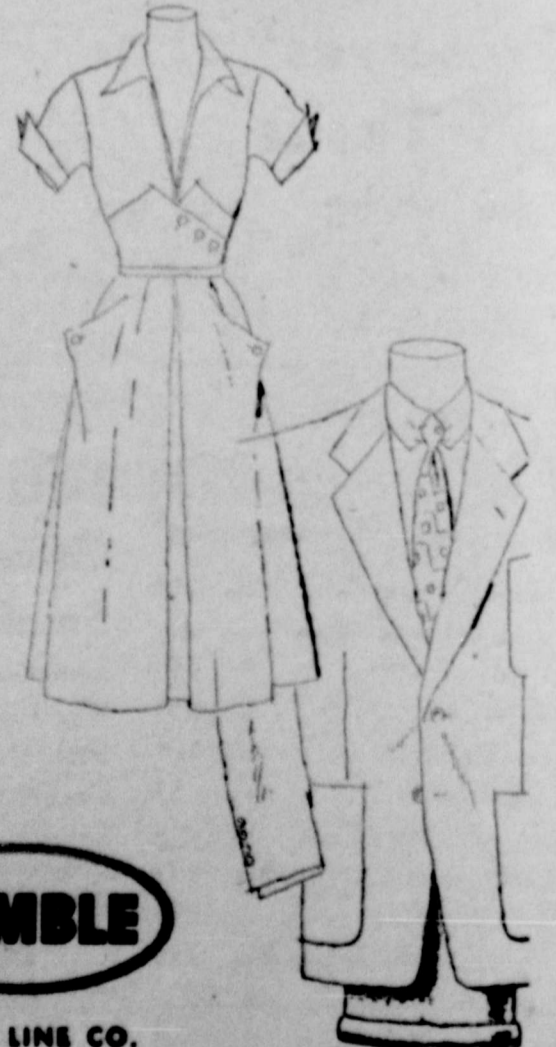

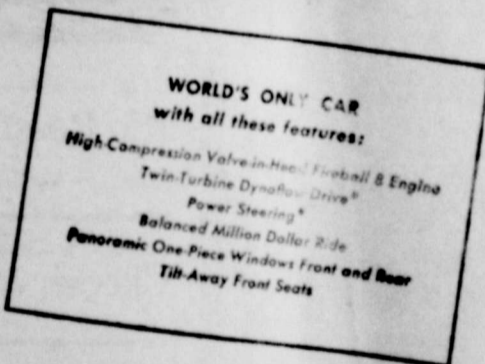

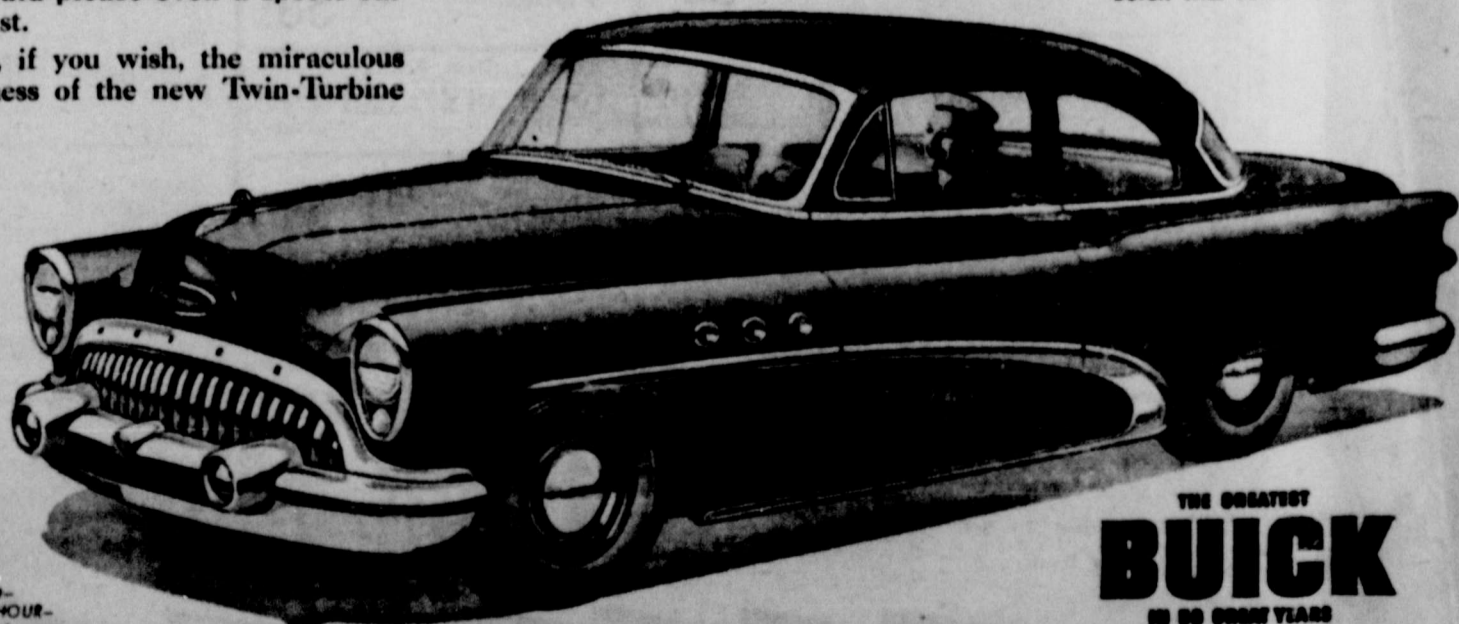
