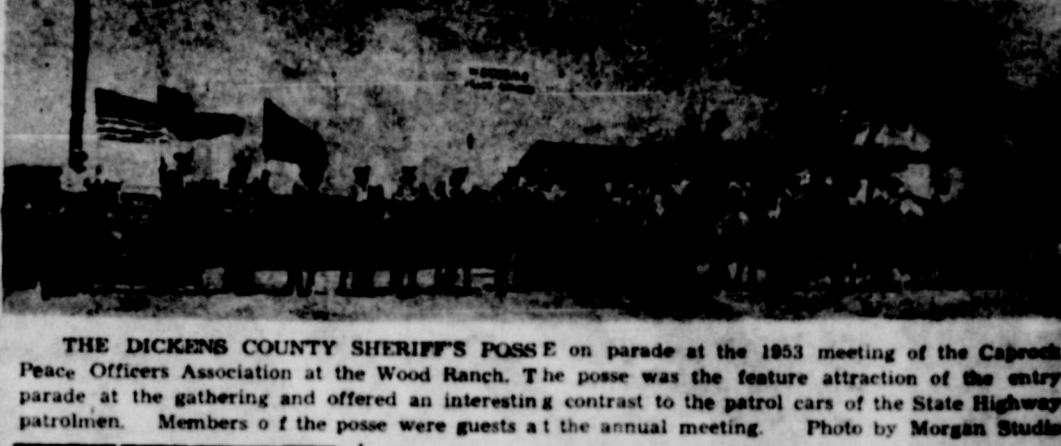

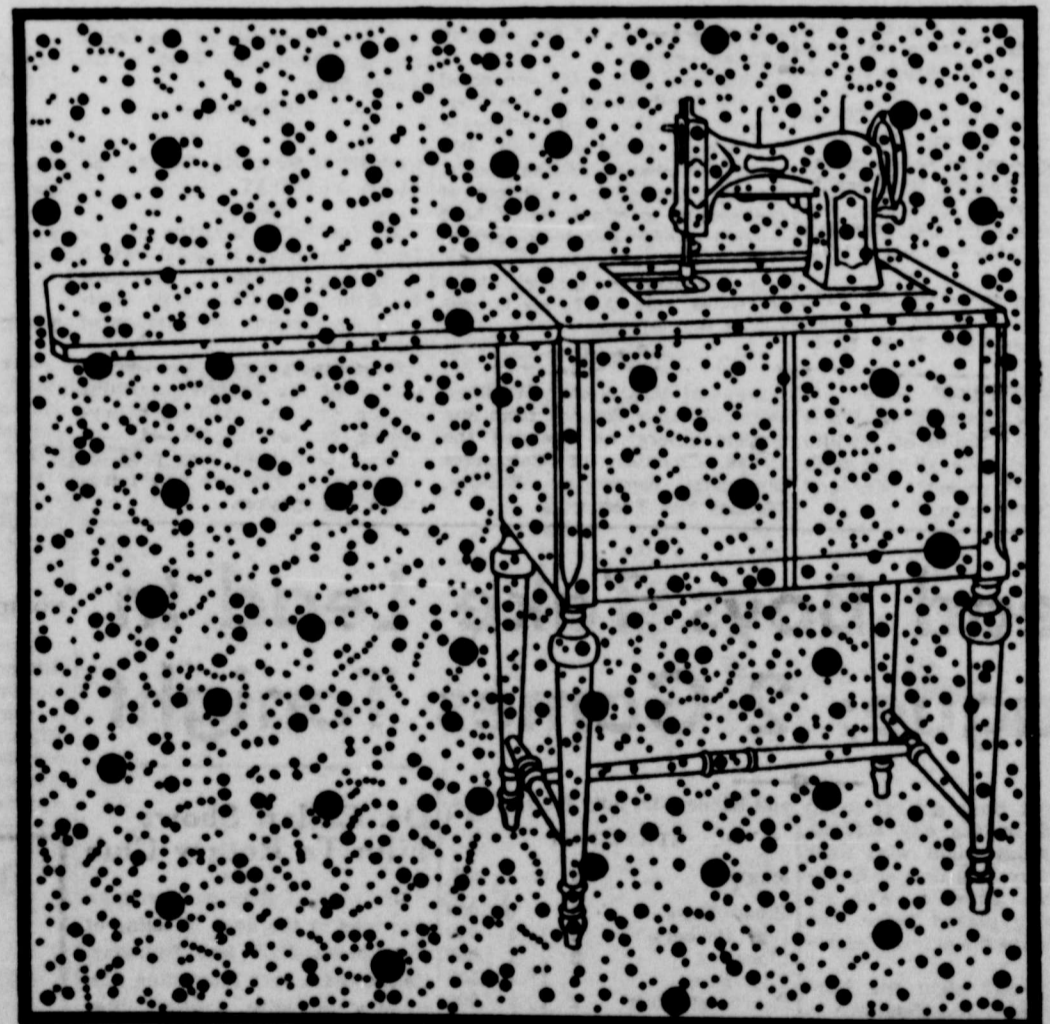

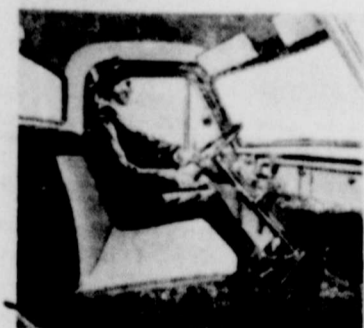

Since the chamber is a department of every business and in my opinion it should be sold on that basis, it follows that men don't join the chamber as they would join a lodge or church, nor do they make contributions to the chamber. In the first place, chamber of commerce dues are not deductible under the income tax law as a gift but they are deducted as a business expense.

Therefore, a man in business does not donate to a chamber of commerce any more than he donates to a shipping department, sales department, or any other department of his business. The chamber dues are a part of the fixed overhead of every business and should be set up that way in the firm's budget just as he sets up rent, salaries and other necessary expenses. I am sure the bud-

get of most firms shows the chamber of commerce item as a very small amount and in both instances it should and could be a much larger amount.

Finally, let us also remember that in addition to what we have to do for the development of our city and community such as education, cultural activities, city beautification, business promotion, public health, or what not, the chamber can do a better job and a job that you as the citizens and businessmen want done for the betterment of your city. Don't you agree that our job, not only in program building, but in every aspect in which we are engaged is a very important job? I would like to summarize this by leaving with you a little verse of which I think all of you would be interested in.

"If you want to live in the kind of a town, In the kind of a town you like,

You needn't pack your clothes in a grip And start on a long, long hike. For you'd only find what you left behind, There's nothing that's really new.

It's a knock at yourself when you knock your town, For it isn't your town, It's you. Real towns are not made by men afraid That somebody else gets ahead.

For if everyone works and nobody shirks You can raise a town from the dead. And if while you are making your personal stake, Your neighbor should make his too.

For your town will be what you want it to be For it isn't your town - It's you."
