### Teacher Shortage Is Critical In Texas

Austic, Texas, July 25- A sury just completed by the Texas late Teachers Association indiates that there will be only 2,-550 new teachers available for approximately 8,000 vacant teaching jobs in Texas in September esearch Director E. L. Galyear

The 8,000 figure is an estimate based on previous records, Galy-ean explained. The survey showed that there were 3,508 vacant aching jobs--almost 1,000 more han the supply of new teachers as of June 1.

"There are usually more than wice as many teaching jobs vaant on September 1, as on June " Galvean said, "because so to the teaching profession, dur-

g the summer." The survey showed that the anual turnover in teaching persenel is nearing 25 per cent. Reords of the Texas Education Agey show that schools made 12,754 replacements during the

952-53 school year. That means hat one out of every five Texas eachers changed jobs during the

ast school year. Asswers to the survey questons were received from 944 city and county superintendents. Practically all of the larger school districts reported, producing information from schools representing more than 88 per cent of the otal personnel in Texas public

The fifty-one senior colleges nd universities were surveyed the supply of new teachers hat will be available. Forty-rine these replied, reporting that ,660 graduating seniors were elgible for teaching certificates. But they also reported that only 2,550 said they would accept teaching positions. More than 30 per cent of those trained to teach said they planned to enter other fields.

The survey of superintendnts showed that the teacher hortage is less critical in large ties which pay salaries consideribly higher than the minimus equired by state law. School discts with less than 2,500 studnts reported the greatest perentage of teaching vacancies.

Approximately 2,100 of the rew eachers to be in demand next all are needed to take care of n anticipated increase of 60,000 the state's scholastic popula-





Ge, in the act with riboflavin, one of the B vitamins. You need it, if you want to take a bow for better health. Riboflavin, when you get enough of it, is more than a partner. It takes on the job of a stage manager in your body. The result—other food substances may be used more efficiently.

Without this vitamin, the protein food you eat could not be properly used in the manufacture of new body cells or in the repair of old ones. In this show, riboflavin also helps set the pace by assisting in the release of energy from fats and carbohydrates—your body fuel. If too little riboflavin is in your three meals a day, cracked and sore areas at the corners of the mouth may develop. Burning and bloodshot eyes, which may be unusually sensitive to the bright light, may also occur. With slight deficiencies of this vitamin, symptoms may not be visible, but deficiencies may be accompanied by a generally lowered state of health, efficiency and earning power. efficiency and earning power.

Riboflavin is an easy-to-get vitamin because it is widely distributed Elboflavin is an easy-to-get vitamin because it is widely distributed in nature. Requirements may be met easily if you use moderate care in selecting your food from all the well-known basic food groups. To be certain that riboflavin will "get in the act" put some liver in the market basket and do it often. Liver, either chicken, calves or pork liver is the best food source of riboflavin. It also is found in large quantities in leafy vegetables such as turnip greens, spinach and kale. The eggs, milk and cheese which you include in your meals play a part, in the show that must go on, by furnishing good amounts of riboflavin.

Along with other members of the B vitamin family, riboflavin co-stars in the enrichment of bread, flour and cereals. Enriched bread contains more of this vitamin than does whole wheat bread. Because plenty of riboflavin is used in enriching cereal foods, the amount in everyone's daily food is increased regardless of the number of dollars spent at the grocery store or super-mart.


