### Whoa, Now! For October Sale

In the Editor's Column of the Texas Spur last week an editorial was published with a number mistakes contained therein. We would like to publish the corrections for the benefit of the readers of this column.

At the present time the CRTC is having difficulties with the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. The Bell Telephone Co. has made committments to the cooperative with the following two alterna-

1. That subscribers of the CR-TC be placed on a minimum toll basis of 15c per call to Spur, also 15c per call from Spur to Dry

2. That the CRTC pay a toll sum of 60c plus tax per subscriber per month to call Spur. The cooperative met with the Commissioners of the City of Spur and solicited their help in trying to negotiate a free calling service from CRTC subscribers to Spur, and from Spur to the cooperative's subscribers, at no additional cost to either party.

In recent meetings with the city folks there has been some discussion pertaining to number two alternative. This discussion was whether or not telephone subscribers in the Dry Lake and Girard area, and the Spur trade center, should pay on a proratable basis for telephone service to and from Dry Lake and Girard to Spur. This was only discussed and has never been considered as a concrete suggestion. The CRTC group has met with the City Officials trying to arrive at a solution to the above mentioned problem that will be suitable to all telephone users

It is the feeling of the CRTC group that the city folks are defnitely interested in helping to settle these difficulties. "At no time has the cooperative expected the people of Spur to pay the bills for the rural






