BIBLICAL STORY OF "SALOME" WAS FILMED IN HOLY LAND ITSELF

The most difficult picture to produce at any time, is any picture based upon a Bible story. Exhibit A and B of this discussion are Columbia Pictures' producer Buddy Adler and his "Salome," starring Rita Hayworth and Stewart Granger and co-starring Charles Laughton at the Palace Theatre Sunday and Monday in color by Technicolor.

Adler pales even now at the thought of the hurdles he had to take with the picture. The usual censorship problems were at hand, such as apply to any picture, but when a producer elects to make a picture based on an episode in the Bible, he runs into a whole new set of circumstances, all important, all in need of solution.

There was for example, the matter of a cast. Ordinarily, a producer's job includes the assembly, at a schedule time, of actors and actresses capable of playing the roles called for in his production.

But "Salome" was no ordinary film; Adler needed the finest possible assortment of stars. In Miss Hayworth he had the perfect Salome, the dancing princess she is an actress of note, a dancer of international repute, a world-famed beauty. Opposite her was Granger, whose reputation as a handsome screen adventurer fitted him for the role of Claudius, the Roman commander in Galilee who falls in love with the barbaric sensuous Salome. Laughton automatically came

Hollywood's leading writers. Five months and several thousand pages later, Adler let the first writer go, and hired another, Harry Kleiner, who licked the story in a matter of weeks. That was when Adler's troubles really began.

The Bible is like a great pool, and if you throw even a very small stone into it, if you try to use even a very slight portion of it, the rings spread out into all the vast numbers of interpretations which, through the centuries, have been put upon every passage in the Book of Books.

Adler's preliminary story conferences and research led to the asking, and the answering, of a number of questions: Was Salome evil? Was she good? Was Herod a wicked ruler or a weakling in his wife's power? What was the true role of the dancing princess of Galilee?

The result has been possibly the greatest attention to detail ever lavished on a Hollywood production. Adler, who had counted on handing the script over to a director and setting back for a little rest when the picture was finished, found himself immersed in a thousand details he had never figured on encountering at all.

A company, with director William Dieterle and artist Millard Sheets in charge, was sent off to the Holy Land to film actual backgrounds. Sheets returned with sketches which led to the construction of some of the most beautiful and colorful sets Hollywood had ever seen.

For one of the highlights of the film, the Dance of the Seven Veils, Adler sought out Valerie Bettis, noted choreographer, who

created a tempestuous dance for Miss Hayworth. Adler who had read the Bible for some years with an idea of doing some of the stories in its rich lore of literature, now thinks he will content himself, for a while at least with some of Hollywood's more simple fare something in which everyone doesn't seem to have such an intensely personal interest.

which, 88,000,000 strong, may turn out to have just that many individual ideas about how the story of Salome and John the Baptist should have been treated. If it does, the producer thinks nice extended vacation to Iceland or some other remote locale may be in order for him.

At this writing, he hasn't even begun to hear from the audience, Haves and children of Abilene.

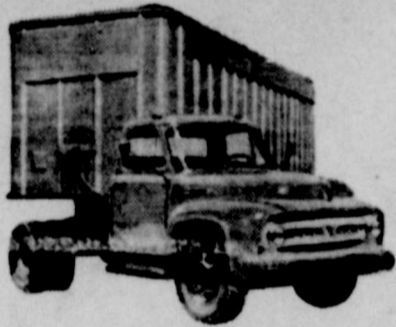

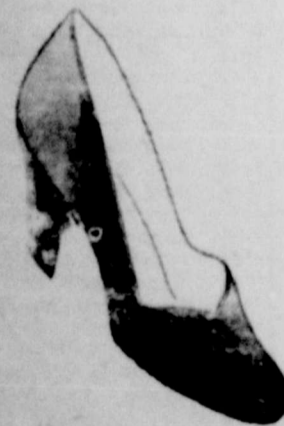

S. S. Worker To Be In Spur Oct. 15

Time is an important element where social security insurance benefits are concerned. To begin with, the time you have worked in employment or self-employment covered by the law determines whether or not you are insured at the time of your retirement or death.

The time when you retire at the age of 65 or later and make a claim for monthly benefit payments is equally important. This is because the date of retirement affects the benefit rate of payment to you and your family.

A variation of several dollars a month in benefit rates may occur if a claim is made, for example, on June 30 instead of July 1, or vice versa. If it should happen that a claim made on July 1 should have been made the day before, nothing can be done to correct the disadvantage.

In case of the death of the insured breadwinner, the total benefits payable to the survivors depends on the time the claim is made. A delay can cost each entitled member of the family one or more monthly insurance benefit payments. This is because back payments can be made only six months from the time a claim is made.

Here are two timely reminders: (1) the survivor of a deceased insured worker should get in touch with the social security office without delay. (2) if you are an insured worker and are nearing or past age 65, go to your social security office before deciding on the time of your retirement.

WEARY MOTHER REQUESTS AID FROM SPUR EX-SERVICEMAN

The convicting and execution of a Sgt.-Major with Gen Rrafa Mihailovic's Chetnik guerrilla band during World War II has hunted and beaten a weary mother in Serbia, Yugoslavia, for six years and last week her growing panic touched Denton.

It came to Leonard Pritchett, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dan Pritchett, in the form of a letter, painfully "drawn" in English. And the apparent misery and hardship of Stefanovic Nostasia and her two children fairly jumps from the onion-skin sheet of 8 by 10 paper.

Pritchett directly feels concern. For it was her husband, Miodrap Stefanovic, the Sgt.-Major under Mihailovic, who protected Leonard 32 days in a "cloak and dagger" race with the Germans among the hills and small towns in Serbia, Yugoslavia in 1944.

Pritchett, an engineer on a B-24 was shot down over Breznica, Yugoslavia in 1944.

"We were picked up by Stefanovic and it was his efforts combined with those of Mihailovic, that finally put us free in Italy. Those 32 days seemed like 32 years but the Chetnik guerrillas went without shoes and food to make it easier on us."

Stefanovic's widow is now writing Pritchett and all other Americans she knew during those days in an effort to clear her name as well as her dead husband's.

In part, her letter to Pritchett reads: "Although so many years have passed since you have left Yugoslavia and have forever parted from my late husband, nevertheless I have made up my mind to write to you, a great misery having induced me to do it."

"Namely, immediately after the liberation of my country from under the German occupation, my late husband was accused that he had spoiled and then delivered you and your companions to the German authorities. After the accusation my husband was condemned to death and shot immediately.

"The accusation was entirely false, as you also know it yourself. Therefore I intend to demand the rehabilitation (clear his name) of my late husband and for this purpose I need your testimony about my husband's treating your comrades after your forced descent from your damaged plane on the soil of the village Bremista."

Pritchett intends to do what he can from here. She cannot get work because of the mark against her.

Mihailovic, once war minister of Yugoslavia, was accused and convicted by the regime of Marshal Tito in 1946 of traitorous

collaborating with the Germans during the war. He was removed from his office by King Peter shortly after Tito, leftist partisan leader and now Yugoslavia premier, accused him of leading a traitorous Bosnian offensive in 1944.

Pritchett and nine others survived an air attack by German fighters after bailing out from their bullet-ridden B-24 about 100 miles from Belgrade.

One crewman, the ball-turret sticer, went down with the ship. Pritchett says the Germans stripped him of all his clothes and buried him in a shallow grave. After the Nazis had left, members of the Stefanovic band dug up the body, dressed it in Chetnik clothes, and held a day-long funeral that attracted approximately 4,000.

"We moved at night, through the small towns," Pritchett recalls. "Many times the people of the underground would go without food in order that we might eat."

Americans, Britons, French and Italians were among a group of 600 that left with Pritchett from atop a mountain in Yugoslavia in American B-24s after eluding the German threats.

"When we stopped for sleep and food," Leonard continued, "Stefanovic and his men would stand guard."

"We were told to lie on the ground or find cover if the Germans attacked. Those Chetniks really liked to fight the Germans. But they had good reason. For everyone of us that was known to have escaped, 10 or more of the people were executed."

"Mihailovic had no source of supplies. His only means was hijacking German patrols. Here he would gain ammunition and guns. I've seen bullets worn sixteenth of an inch from being carried for months. The Chetniks treasured them with their life and would use their ammo only in emergency. Usually knives served their purpose."

Pritchett broke his ankle when he 'chuted out and he had to ride or was carried during his 32 days of dodging.

"They would hide me and others in woods under feed and other camouflage. This way we moved right through German troops.

The above-mentioned things, plus others, gives Pritchett basis to believe that Stefanovic and Mihailovic were for us and not traitors, at least when we were associated with them.

Stefanovic's widow cannot find work now and with winter approaching it will be extremely difficult for her to survive, as well as her two children.

She ends her letter to Pritchett:

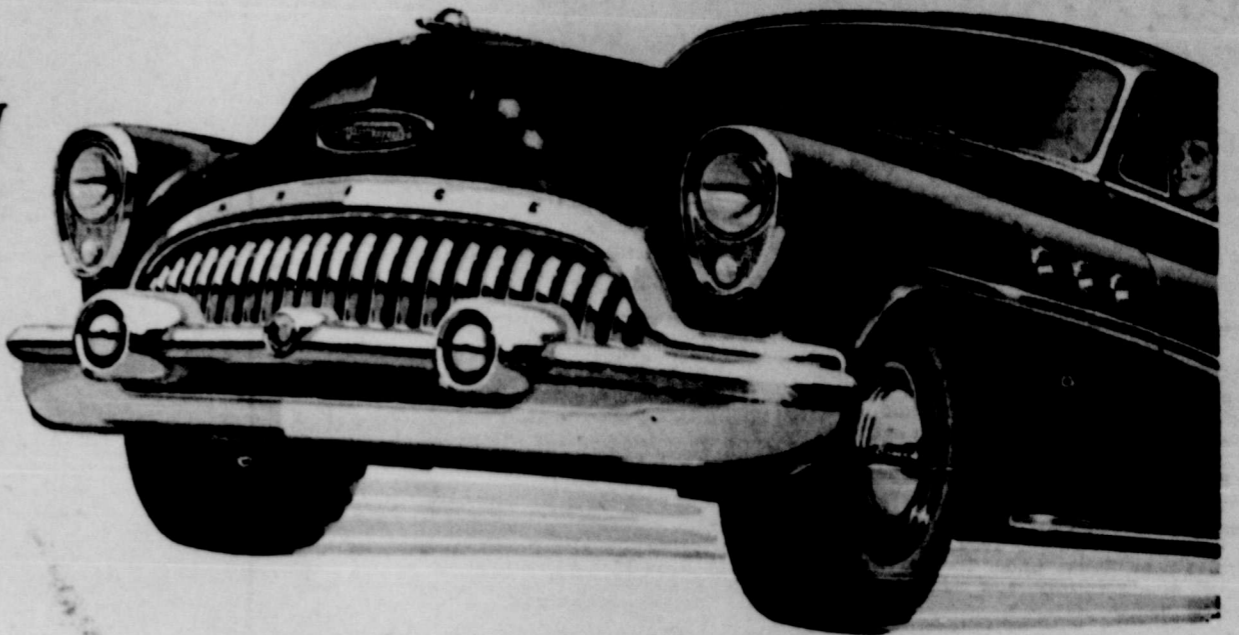

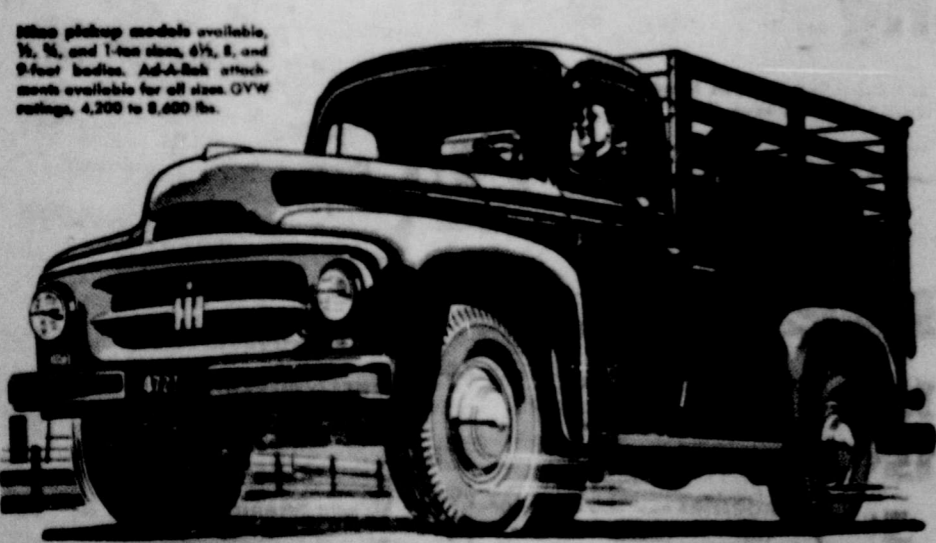

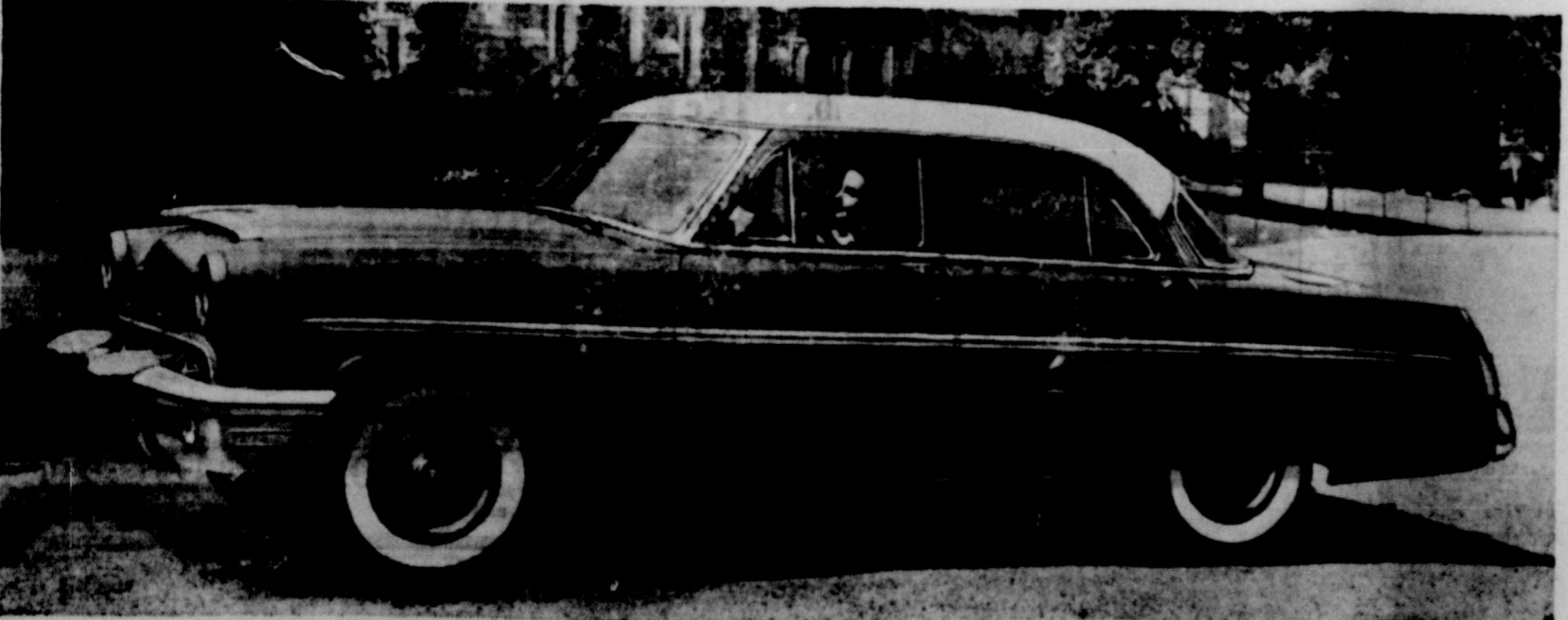
