The State Law quoted below clearly states the City Commission's authority to regulate future electric rates in Spur.

Article 1119 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas is as follows:

"RATES PRESCRIBED, ETC.

The governing body of all incorporated cities and towns in this State incorporated under the General Laws thereof shall have the power to regulate, by ordinance, the rates and compensation to be charged by all persons, companies, or corporations using the streets and public grounds of said city or town, and engaged in furnishing water, gas, telephone, light, power, or sewerage service to the public, and also to prescribe rules and regulations under which such commodities shall be furnished, and service rendered, and to fix penalities to enforce such charges, rules, and regulations. The governing body shall not pre-scribe any rate or compensation which will yield more than a fair return upon the fair value of the property used and useful in rendering its services to the public, but which return in no event shall ever exceed eight (8) per cent per annum. Acts 1907, p. 217, Sec. 1; Acts 1937, 45th Leg., p. 274, ch. 144, Sec. 1.
