### A Statement From Your Mayor and Commissioners

### TO KEEP THE RECORD STRAIGHT

The members of the Board of Commissioners of the City of Spur feel that the public should know the facts as to why an election has been called to decide the all-important issue of selling the city light plant.

It is regrettable that the commission should find it necessary to defend its action in giving the voters of Spur a choice in the making of this decision, but such seems to be the case.

We wish to point out that the light plant is not the property of just the Board of Commissioners or any other single group of individuals. It is owned by all of the people collectively. Therefore, when an offer to purchase the plant was received by your commission, we felt duty bound to call the election in order that you, every voter in our city, could decide this question concerning the sale of your property.

We have been severely critized by several people for calling the election. In our opinion, these critics apparently want to deprive the people of the fundamental right to decide the people's business in the time honored democratic way - at the polls. We want to go on record right now as frankly declaring that whenever a question arises which affects the people and their common property, we will without hesitation, submit that question to the people to be decided by their vote at an election callled for that purpose.

We wish to make a clear statement concerning the proposed 35 year franchise agreement between West Texas Utilities Company and th City of Spur, if the sale is made. The granting of this franchise would not prevent the city from again entering into the electric business at any time in the future. Under the terms of this franchise the light plant could be sold one day and the city remain free to go back into business the very next day if it should choose to do so.

Those who oppose the sale of the light plant have gone to great lengths to erroneously tag the price of everything the city owns and to add in figures which are not even involved in the proposed sale of the plant. With such masses of mis-information before you, we find it our duty to point out the true facts. We deplore the misleading advertisement which appeared in last week's Texas Spur as to what specific property was being cons ed for sale. This advertisement would have you believe that the city would sell the outside lights erected by the Spur Lion's Club at the new Memorial Hospital, together with all of the city's vehicles. In fact we have even encountered rumors that the sale would include the city waterworks, city hall and all other properties of the city. This appears to be so deliberately misleading that we feel we must set the record straight.

The very issue to be voted upon is whether your Board of Commissioners shall be authorized to sell the light plant and distributing system for a dash (price of \$350,000.00 AND UPON SUCH OTHER TERMS AND CONDITIONS AS THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONER MAY DEEM PROPER AND TO THE BEST INTEREST OF THE CITY OF SPUR AND ITS INHABITANTS. In other words, your Board of Commissioners will have the power to determine just what properties will be included in the sale, and you can rest assured that WE WILL NOT SELL the Spur Lion's Club lights, nor all of the city's vehicles or any other property except just what is properly a part of the lighting and electric distributing system.

The commission also wishes to declare that a statement of profits, covering the past three months, appearing in the November 5 issue of The Texas Spur was not an official statement from the City of Spur and the figures contained therein were misleading. Such items listed as meter deposits are in no sense profit Every business man knows that before profits can be ascertained inventories must be taken into consideration. No inventories were mentioned in that statement.

The book value of the light plant (cost minus depreciation), including building, motors, generators and distributing system, and this is all we propose to sell, is \$102,688.29. Add to this figure the \$113,542.-98 depreciation and you have the original cost of the plant, complete, which was \$216,231,27. Based on these true figures we feel that the West Texas Utilities Company's offer of \$350,000.00 is a good business proposition and have, therefore, submitted it to you for your consideration and vote.

The City of Spur owes \$291,000.00 in bonds on waterworks, sewer, street and hospital and \$37,000.00 in warrants on fire equipment, sewer, street and gas equipment, making a total indebtedness of \$328,000.00. The interest on this debt is about \$12,000.00 a year. This indebtedness will have to be paid off regardless of how hard times may become.

You, the voters of Spur own the light plant and it is up to you to decide whether we shall keep it and stay in debt or sell and have no indebtedness to meet during the lean years which appear to lie ahead of us.

It has been stated that since the light plant is now paid for profits will be greater in the future. When can we expect that increase? Certainly not so long as the costs of fuel oil continue to advance and salaries increase. Added to these increases is also the extra expense of repairs and maintance as the present motors, generators and distributing system continue to age and wear out.

One thing those who oppose the sale of the plant have never mentioned is the very real \$12,000.00 saving to our citizens each year in interest on the city's debts, if the plant should be sold. Add to this figure the 2% gross revenue which the West Texas Utilities Company would have to pay the City of Spur under the sale contract, plus the amount of taxes West Texas Utilities Company would pay the city on the plant, which is now tax free, and the sum total would produce for more reveue than the light plant has ever produced.

Another argument put forth by the opposition is that the West Texas Utilities Company would raise the rates charged for electricity just as soon as it had closed the deal for the plant. Under the terms of the proposed agreement with the City of Spur, the West Texas Utilities Company agrees to lower the present rates 5%, in keeping with standard rates charged in neighboring cities of like population. The only way an increase in rates could be brought about would be through the consent of the future city commission of Spur holding office at the time such request for increased rates should be made, if indeed, it ever were made.

Th only manner in which your city commission will benefit from the sale of the light plant is exactly the same way you will benefit from it, as a citizen of Spur. We would receive no commission from the sale at any time but our interests in the future of our city compels us to take our stand for this progressive movement and share with you, the voters, in its benefits.

We know that with the \$350,000.00 which the city would receive in cash from the sale of the plant that we could pay our city out of debt, save ourselves many thousands of dollars in interest, reduce taxes, see our new hospital through its difficult beginning stage to become one of the most valuable assets to Spur and surrounding territory, and make other needed improvements which would make Spur a better city in which to live.

If you choose to make the sale, we, your City Commission, will act immediately to pay off all callable bonds and warrants owed by the city and offset the balance with giltedge securities which will, in turn, retire remaining bonds and warrants as they fall due. In this manger our entire indebtedess would be paid off without further cost to our citizens.

With these clearly stated facts in mind, we want you to go to the polls on Tuesday. November 17, and vote in accordance with what you believe to be best for the people of Spur as a whole. The light plant is yours. Do with it as you choose. We have every confidence in your judgement. By all means, DO VOTE.






