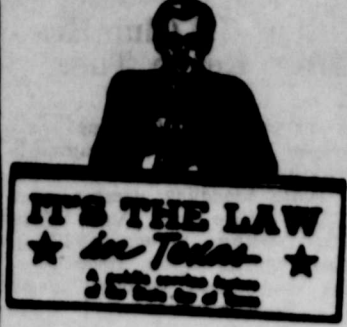

MAKE CONTRACTS SPECIFY. AVOID DISPUTES

Nearly every day all of us are making agreements with our fellow citizens. Our whole system of free enterprise and trade is based, to a large extent, upon mutual agreements or promises to do something in the future. The important thing we need to remember is to make every agreement perfectly clear whether it is oral or written.

Generally speaking, you can enter into a verbal agreement that is just as binding as a written contract. Consequently, the great majority of contracts that we enter into are never put into written form. But exact terms of an oral contract may be difficult to establish if a disagreement arises, and a well drawn written contract will help to avoid the unfortunate disputes which arise from honest misunderstanding.

Not every written contract meets the test of clarity, however. Suppose Mr. Householder has a piece of paper on which is written the heading "Pro-

posal" and which thereafter reads as follows:

"We will build a garage for you on your lot for the estimated price of \$800, work to be done in a workmanlike manner. All of our work is guaranteed to your satisfaction. Subject to the conditions printed on the reverse side."

This is signed by the XYZ Company. Under this signature is the word "Accepted" followed by a line for the signature of Mr. Householder. His question is, should he sign it?

Here are some of the misunderstandings that might arise from such an agreement: The intention in the agreement as to location of the garage is not stated. There is no indication whether it is to be a single or double garage. There is no statement as to the size or type of construction. The size of the lot is not stated. It is not even stated whether the garage is to be built on the lot the garage will be built. It says nothing about when the work is to be finished. There is no agreement as to whether Mr. Householder is to pay in advance, in installments, or not until it is completed.

Further, they have not actually agreed upon a price. The agreement refers to an estimated price of \$800. They should be specified and make either a fixed price contract or an agreement whereby the builder is reimbursed for his expenses plus a definite percentage. Perhaps the XYZ Company feels that if their

expenses are higher than anticipated, they will be able to charge more than the estimated \$800. On the other hand, Mr. Householder probably feels that \$800 is the maximum price he will have to pay.

The most important prerequisite of a clear contract is that it cover the essential elements of performance. This is not as difficult as it might seem. Here is a good rule to follow: As to the acts of each party determine what is to be done, when, where

and by whom. See that these essential parts are included in your agreement.

In addition, remember that if a contract is worth signing, it is worth reading and understanding—all of it.

New Variety Of Cantaloupe Ready For Growing

Rio-Gold, a new disease resistant cantaloupe which is described as having an excellent flavor, is now available to growers.

Developed at the Lower Rio Grande Valley Experiment Station in 1950, the variety has several characteristics superior to Rio-Sweet. G. H. Godfrey, plant pathologist at the Weslaco Station, says Rio-Gold has an attractive, deep tender flesh with an excellent flavor and a high sugar content. The vines are highly resistant to downy mildew and fairly resistant to powdery mildew and aphids.

Rio-Gold was first recognized as a distinctive strain late in the spring of 1950 when found on a vine that bore bright, well-netted melons of high quality.

Trial plantings at various Texas locations brought favorable response in appearance, an eating quality, Godfrey says.

Limited quantities of Rio-Gold seed for trial plantings and seed increase are available from Foundation Seed Section, Department of Agronomy, Texas A & M College, College Station, Texas.

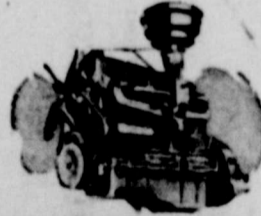

Export Drop Causes Headaches for 1953 Farm Program

Reduced foreign export contribute directly to many of the present farm program problems, says John G. McHaney, assistant extension economist.

During periods of high agricultural production, overseas outlets provide a more complete market for a surplus food and fiber, McHaney says. Agricultural exports from this country hit a record 4 billion dollars in 1951-1952, but slipped to 2.8 billion during 1952-1953, a 30 percent drop. This decline is responsible for many surpluses and depressed prices, he says.

With world supplies high, a further decline is expected in wheat shipments abroad. The forecast for rice exports is

favorable, but little change is foreseen in other grains. Cotton exports have dropped sharply in recent months. This is due, McHaney adds, to high world production and lower competing prices in foreign countries. Short supplies of United States cotton abroad and some pickup in the textile industry, especially in Europe, suggests slightly advanced cotton exports next year. The consumption abroad of fats and oils is increasing, especially cottonseed oil.

World production last year of cotton, wheat, rice, corn, oats, barley, and fats and oils was high. Other countries have less need for commodities produced in the United States and in some cases, the economist says, foreign countries can purchase from one another more cheaply than from this country.

The transition period is here, McHaney adds. Today's farmers are experiencing postwar adjustments that eventually had to come. "Adjustments now confront us squarely and we have to face up to them," he concludes.

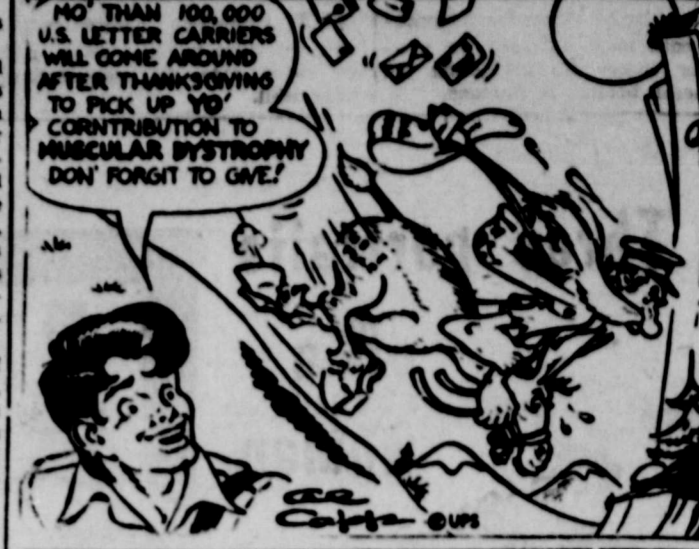

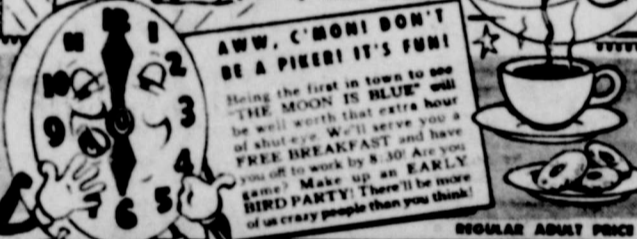
