Turkey Shoot To Be Held Here Saturday

The Spur VFW post will hold an old-fashioned Turkey Shoot Saturday, Dec. 12, starting at 10 a. m.

County Cotton Data Due By Dec. 12

The name of the Production and Marketing Administration (PMA) has been changed to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC). This change took effect Nov. 2, in accordance with the recent reorganization of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Farmers of this area who had an interest in a 1953 crop of upland cotton that was planted in the upland cotton referendum to be conducted Dec. 15.

Voting boxes will be placed in the following places: ASC office in Spur, County Agent's office in Dickens, Gin office in Afion, Gin office in McAdoo, and the Gin office in Croton.

The polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m.

The 1954 cotton allotment notices should reach the farmers of Dickens county not later than Saturday, Dec. 12. Dickens county received an allotment of 55,998 acres which will be divided among 815 farmers.

McGinty Reports On Chicago Trip

Throughout the past ten years, 4-H Club work has exerted an ever-increasing influence on my thinking, planning, and living. This force has reached its culmination in my recent trip to Chicago.

Ten years ago when I started my first 4-H project in the barnyard of my rural home in Dickens County, Texas, my understanding of what 4-H really means was very limited. As the project grew and my club activities expanded, it dawned slowly on my thinking that 4-H reaches beyond my family and my home to the community, my country, and the world.

My years in 4-H have been good years. With the exception of the Church and the school, nothing has influenced my life as much as the 4-H Club program. Now a senior in high school, with ten years of 4-H adventure behind me, I believe I can best express my concept of 4-H by comparing it to the ripple on a pool of still water caused by throwing a stone into the middle of the pool. As the motion of the water reaches out until it breaks on the bank of the pool, so have my club activities expanded until they have reached the dream of my club life, a trip to the National Club Congress in Chicago.

As I shook hands with 4-H Clubbers from our forty-eight states and all the continents of the world, I know that we are all brothers under the 4-H

whether we come from Austria, Canada, Germany, Alaska, Hawaii, or Porto Rico. We all subscribe to the 4-H ideals of the 4-H pledge. Nowhere is Wendell Willkie's concept of One World more vividly portrayed than in the coming together of the 4-H Clubs of the world. And so the most meaningful phase of my recent experience is my realization that what I have been doing is just one drop in a mighty stream of international efforts and understanding. I know now that the great 4-H movement is just myself made international.

As I look back on our days in Chicago, I feel that those who planned our entertainment diet for the Congress paid us a high compliment when they arranged for a concert by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. It was evident beyond question that everyone of that assembly enjoyed and appreciated the artistry of that magnificent ensemble, the Chicago Symphony. We felt a warm glow of self-satisfaction that two of our own numbers should occupy positions of guest-artists on this occasion.

Again, it was gratifying to us that the Honorable Ezra T. Benson, Secretary of Agriculture in the Cabinet of the President of the United States, considered us of sufficient importance in the agricultural economy of the nation that he would come to us in Chicago for the address that we were privileged to hear him give. I know that we are all brothers under the 4-H

New Loan Program Set Up By F. H. A.

Authority to make Economic Disaster loans in all counties of Texas has been received by L. J. Cappleman, State Director of the Farmers Home Administration, it was announced this week by John E. Quattlebaum, Dickens County FHA Supervisor.

The effect of the designation, Quattlebaum explains, is to continue the making of Production Disaster loans throughout the state during 1954 and to authorize the making, for the first time, of Economic Disaster loans and aid in the case of a production loss. The farmer who has suffered crop losses because of drought, floods, insects or other natural causes is eligible for a Production Disaster loan if he is unable to obtain operating funds elsewhere. If the farmer is a sufferer from the effects of insufficient income and excessive operating costs he is eligible for an Economic Disaster loan if unable to get needed credit from local sources.

In announcing the new loan, Quattlebaum said that the \$11,850,000 fund allotted Texas for crop production loans is now practically exhausted, although \$3,000,000 was added in the closing days of November.

He pointed out in addition to the disaster and economic types.

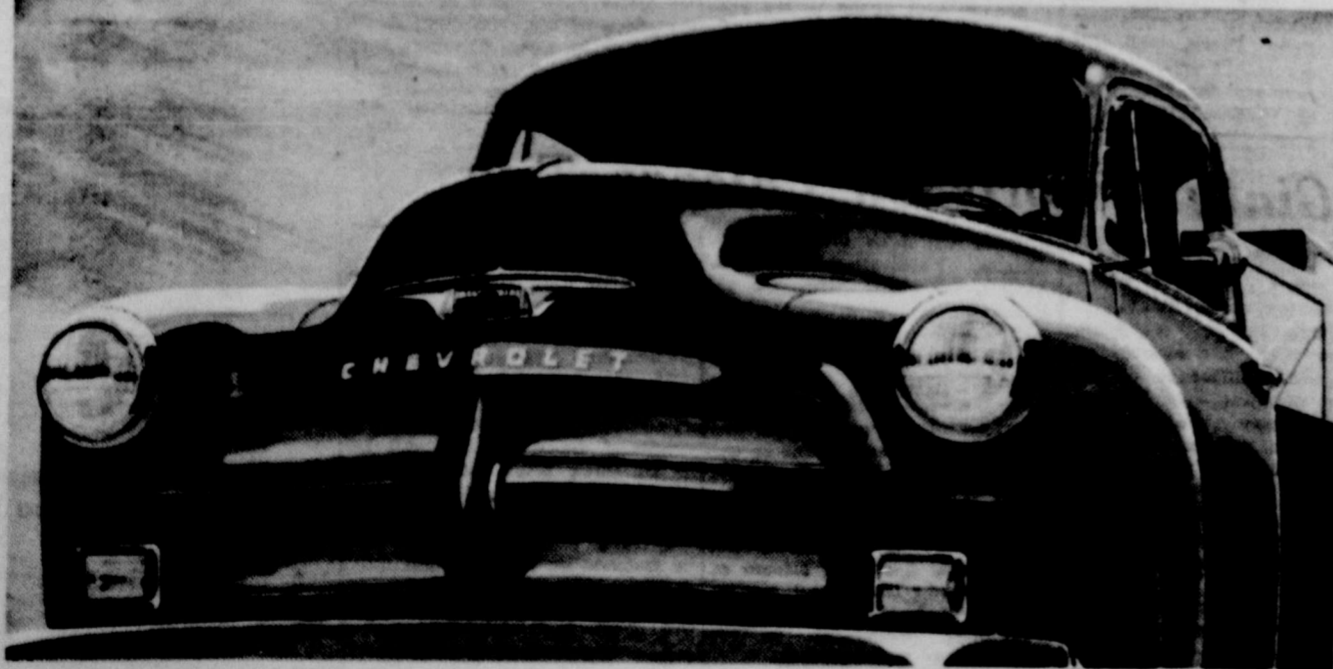

Nothing is more genuinely human than the satisfaction that comes from feeling that one really counts. Again and again in the Congress, we were able to feel that we were of some consequence when the leading industrial institutions of the nation paid us homage. They did not send us an obscure member of the firm. We were honored and impressed respectively to know that the president of a great institution had considered us worthy of his time and attention and that his firm had given to us a cut in its budget.

It will be a privilege to me to bring the story of the Congress to 4-H members and people of my community as I have opportunity. We never reach the peak of pleasure in any experience until we have shared that experience with others. My satisfaction will grow as I have opportunity to tell other people about the wonderful experience that has been mine. I hope to inspire other 4-H clubbers in my area to achieve that which I have achieved.

Through the contacts I have made with these 4-H delegates, I have a new consciousness of "World Friendship and Understanding. No longer are people from other continents strangers whom I cannot trust. Now I know that we are all working together to "Make the Best Better". If all of the 1700 of us in Chicago pledge our Heads, Hearts, Hands, and Health to the betterment of our clubs, communities, and countries, the whole world will achieve better thinking, greater loyalty, better service, and better living.

Funds that are available in the form of Special Livestock loans to established ranchmen to carry on their operations. Funds of this type already advanced to ranchers total \$7,800,000, he said. Ranchers, in addition to borrowing for operating expenses, may obtain funds to restock their ranches and replace herds depleted by effects of the drought. Special livestock loans provide emergency credit at 5% to ranch operators who are unable temporarily to obtain from recognized lenders the credit needed to continue their operations and have reasonable prospects of working out of their difficulties.

Applicants certify in writing the extent of damage they suffer and the fact that they cannot obtain the needed credits from other sources. Their eligibility is determined in all cases by the County Committee familiar with the conduct of farming and livestock operation. Production loans are approved for a wide variety of purposes such as purchase of feed, seed, and fertilizer, or to meet other essential operating expenses. Special Livestock, Disaster and Economic loans are scheduled for repayment over the minimum period consistent with the borrower's ability to repay. They are secured for the full amount. Those secured by liens on cattle or other livestock are scheduled to be repaid as determined

the borrower's ability to pay. Loans are extended for crop production purposes or for other ordinary scheduled repayment when the income is received from sale of the crop and livestock products produced with the aid of the loan. Funds are available and applications may be submitted at the office of Quattlebaum located in the Lathan building here in Spur.
