Frau Renee von Bronneck submerged her own personal achievements in her desire to speak of her beloved Austria when she appeared before an audience of clubwomen of Dickens county in the home of Mrs. George S. Link, Tuesday afternoon, Dec. 4.

Speaking an amazingly clear English tongue, this vivacious Viennese woman extended the hand of friendship and international understanding of Austrian womanhood. Her plea did not fall on deaf ears. To a woman, the staunch West Texas women felt the heartbeat of the unfortunate but beautiful Austria. Even though shadowed by threat of an ominous power, reduced to privation by demands made by occupation troops, the Viennese love of finer things of life cannot be extinguished.

Frae von Bronneck came to this country under the sponsorship of the Seventh District, Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, as an ambassador of good will, as a link between the women of the two nations. She did not fall in Spur Tuesday afternoon in her mission. Women of Dickens county will always feel closer to the women of Vienna because Renee von Bronneck spoke in lyric terms of the values her countrymen hold dear, according to a spokesman who heard the talk.

Vehicle Inspection Active In County

Motor Vehicle Inspector, J. R. Whitmire, who is in charge of the vehicle inspection station in Dickens County, said today that although inspection is progressing extremely well in this county and throughout the state, it would be well to keep the following in mind:

With ten months of 1933 already behind us, the state of Texas is 106 highway deaths behind the 1932 total for a comparable period. This decreasing rate may be held and even improved upon although the "deadly" holiday season is fast approaching. With winter and holiday travel only a weather change away, it would be wise for all those who have not had their vehicles inspected to do so now.

The very essentials of winter driving-proper brakes, lights, horn and windshield wiper operation-are the backbone of the new Motor Vehicle inspection program. We can, therefore, do our winter driving safely and with fewer operational worries as well as avoid the last minute spring inspection rush if we will have our vehicles inspected between now and Christmas.

Whitmire said that of all cars inspected so far, records show that 58 per cent need some adjustment or repair. Seven per cent needed brakes adjustment, while 34 per cent needed headlights corrected. At the same time, total cost of inspection has averaged only \$1.77 per car which includes the price of inspection. Whitmire said that this was the most reasonable life insurance being sold in Texas today. He urges each owner to go today to the inspection station of his choice, tomorrow may be too late.

The following is a list of inspection stations in Spur: Godfrey Motor, Rickels Motor, Spur Auto Co., Jones Motor, Spur Motor and Hoover-McAteer.

They are required by law to be open for business at least 8 hours a day. Most of them are open much longer, and each one will be glad to give your car a thorough, courteous and personalized inspection.

Although most Spur merchants reduced their buying this year for the Christmas season due to the drought, they still have ample stocks and varieties to meet the shoppers' needs. Several merchants have indicated pleasant surprise over the volume of Christmas buying this year. The condition indicates that many families had saved back money for Christmas and are not letting the drought and crop shortage mar the Christmas season for the children.

Many local merchants have indicated that they will be closed all day Saturday, Dec. 26, to give both employers and employees a four-day holiday week end.
