Phillips Petroleum Company Erecting Oil Storage Tanks

A crew of workmen began the erection of tanks and buildings for the Phillips Petroleum Company here this week. The location of the storage houses and tanks is near the Gulf Oil Company west of the Bailey County Elevator.

The Phillips Company recently purchased two lots on Main Street, across from McCarty Drug Store, and will erect a modern Service Station there. It is understood that this building will be of the English bungalow type and will cost around \$5,000.

This is one of a number of stations being built over this section of the Plains to take care of the increased demand for petroleum products due to the tide of immigration into this country.

Prosperity Much in Evidence in the Muleshoe Section

There were 100 cars of maize, kafir and other feeds shipped from Muleshoe during the past twelve days. Besides this, there is still a large quantity of these products stacked on the local feed yards and combines and threshers are still running over this territory.

About 400 bales of cotton have been ginned in Muleshoe to date and the local gin is still running full time when the weather will permit the farmers to bring their cotton to town. Bad weather has hampered the farmers in gathering their crops and much cotton is still in the fields.

These facts bear evidence that this section of the country is in a prosperous condition, and that Muleshoe is holding its own as a market and shipping point.

SPIRIT OF CHRISTMAS CHEER AND GOOD WILL PREVAILS IN MULESHOE

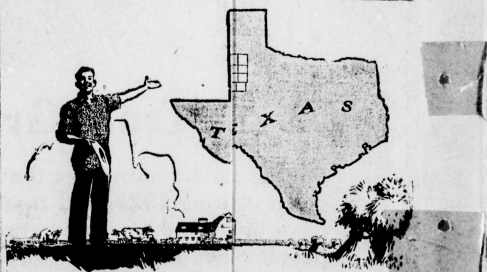

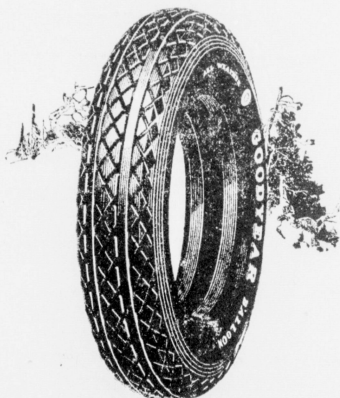

ABOUT STATE HIGHWAY BONDS

The adoption of a proposal for a constitutional amendment to allow the issuance of bonds for the building of highways and numerous suggested traffic regulations was the principal work accomplished by Gov. Moody's special highway legislation committee

of 31, which met in Austin recently. The much disputed plan for the issuance of state bonds was adopted by a vote of 16 to 11. This is the plan that R. S. Sterling, Chairman of the State Highway Commission, has been advocating for several months. The issuance of state bonds would not exceed \$225,000,000 at any time. The proceedings and report of the

Committee's recommendations will be made to Gov. Moody by a sub-committee composed of Roger Gillis, Del Rio; W. B. Marsh, Dallas; T. L. Wynne, Athens; John Singleton, Waxahatchie and John Darroutzette of Galveston.

The committee report will be submitted to the 41st Legislature in January and the various committeemen will be called to appear before joint sessions of the highway committees of the Senate and House, Gov. Moody said.

The meetings of the Sub-committee on Finance, which preceded the meeting of the whole committee, were marked with many stormy debates over several plans submitted. The principal item of contention being the plan for the constitutional amendment to allow state bond issues. The work of the Sub-committee on Finance was adopted by the whole Committee with few changes.

It is suggested to the Legislature that, pending the adoption of the proposed amendment, provision be made by tax on gasoline and use of revenues from license and weight fees to finance an immediate program of \$20,000,000 worth of state highway construction and \$10,000,000 for maintenance work.

No part of the principal of interest on the proposed bonds would be paid from the ad valorem tax "until all other lawful sources of revenue have been exhausted." Counties and road districts would be reimbursed for state road work that they have already paid for. This reimbursement would be from the proceeds of the bond issue.

The following recommendations for legislation were made by the License and Weight Fee Sub-Committee:

"That all license and weight fees be based on weight. That there be 20 percent reduction in all fees for non-commercial cars. That gross receipts and seat taxes be imposed on commercial vehicles such as buses and trucks, and that all such tax revenues go to the highway maintenance fund. That there be a distinction between private and public buses and trucks. That all funds coming from license and weight fees be divided with counties; the county to get all of first \$25,000 and 50 per cent of next \$75,000 and 75 percent of all additional collections with a limit to any county of \$150,000.

Canned Foods On The Farm



COMMERCIAL canned foods on the farm have more than an academic interest to many farm housewives. Some foods, such as pineapples and fish, cannot be canned on the ordinary farm. Some farmers do not plant kitchen gardens, so the staple fruits and vegetables have to be bought. But let a farm woman, Mrs. Gertrude M. Elliott of New Paltz, New York, tell her story:

Real Farmers

She says, "Our farm, comprising one hundred fifteen acres, embraces dairying, poultry raising, fruit growing and forage crops. I say this in introduction to prove we are farmers. Since we have no garden, we find it advisable to buy canned foods daily."

Mrs. Virginia Egbert was a Lubbock housewife.

Rev. W. B. Hicks was attending to business affairs in Lubbock Tuesday.

"In the vegetable line for winter's use we stock up with cases of peas, corn, string beans, beets, tomatoes, asparagus and pumpkin (for pies).

"As for fruit, we preserve plums and pears because we have them, and apples are available practically all the year. The other fruits like peaches, pineapple, grapefruit and huckleberries, we buy by the case.

"We always have a supply of canned shortening, soups, pork and beans, and salmon on hand.

"With such a supply of canned foods, together with our home canning, we are prepared for unexpected callers at a minute's notice. Then, too, we are always sure that our canned foods won't spoil as our canned ones often do, and it is just as cheap ultimately, since it saves time, energy and a great deal of unnecessary fatigue."

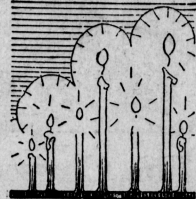

Food For Christmas Dinner

EVEN from early times the Christmas dinner was one of the important features of this holiday. For instance, a song that was sung before Prince Henry of England when he visited St. John's College, Oxford, in 1607, goes:

*The Bear is dead,
So, here is his head,
What man could have done more,
Than his head off to strike,
Meleager like,
And bring it as I do before?*

A Real Mynce Pye

So few of us have ever tasted bear's head that it is hard to say positively that any man "could have done more," but certainly we can sympathize with the old lord in the ballad who cries:

*Sit ye, Knights, with victuals nigh,
A bumper of ale, and real Mynce Pye!*

Not So Much Variety

Regardless, however, of what the knights and princes of olden times ate, they probably had no better food than we and undoubtedly, they did not have so much variety. For instance, look at the following menu which might be called typical of today. Why, the knights of old would never have heard of most of the items.

*Holly and Mistletoe Canapés
Chicken Curry Soup
Roast Suckling Pig Bread Stuffing
Apple Sauce
Stuffed Sweet Potatoes
Baked Onions
Stringless Beans Mock Hollandaise
Lettuce Salad with Russian Dressing
Cheese Straws
English Plum Pudding
Foamy and Hardy Sauce
Nuts Coffee Cider
Stem Raisins
Holly Canapés*

Holly canapés—can't you imagine the bluntness on the face of the knight confronted by such a term? First sauté circles of bread slices lightly in butter. Moisten a can of deviled ham with mayonnaise and spread thickly over the rounds, making it thinner at the edges. Select very tiny leaves of water-cress, and, using a toothpick, press the short stems into the mixture all around the edges of the rounds, giving a holly wreath effect. At intervals dot with "holly berries" cut from bits of pimento. Sprinkle finely chopped egg white over the center of the rounds.

To make the companion—mistletoe canapés—take a can of sardines from skin and bones, and mash. Add enough creamed butter to make a paste, and season highly with lemon juice and cayenne. Cut slices of bread into diamond shapes and

sauté in butter. Spread with the sardine mixture. Peel off the thin skin from green peppers which have been previously parboiled in water with a pinch of soda. Cut in shape of mistletoe and arrange a bunch of these in the center of each canapé. Use pickled pearl onions for berries.

And Stuffed Sweets

To make the chicken curry soup heat the contents of four twelve and one-half ounce cans of chicken broth with one and one-half tablespoons curry powder. Serve in cups with a few peas in each cup. Serve Melba toast with the soup.

Marshmallows, the ones which come fresh and soft, in a can, are delicious as stuffing for sweet potatoes. Parboil the potatoes, peel, and cut through center from end to end with an apple corer. Cut marshmallows into quarters and stuff into these cavities. Brush potatoes over with plenty of butter, sprinkle liberally with brown sugar and bake until potatoes are quite done and brown, using a hot oven.

In serving stringless beans with mock Hollandaise sauce, heat a number 2 can of stringless beans in its own liquor, then drain, saving liquid for soups. To one can medium white sauce add one-fourth cup mayonnaise and two tablespoons lemon juice and stir until smooth. Pour over the hot beans and serve at once.

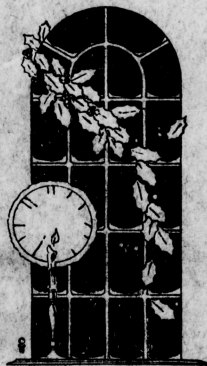
