SMALL BUSINESS

BY C. WILSON HARDER

The sudden departure of William D. Mitchell as head of the Small Business Administration seems to cast light on Administration's attitude toward small business.

Mitchell was first head of new agency set up to make loans to business when Reconstruction Finance Corporation was dropped. RFC records showed Congress consistently made money on small business loans. A fact that did not receive the publicity that C. W. Harder, a few political maneuverers with RFC funds received.

But Mitchell apparently decided that Congress has wrong idea. As he viewed the situation, rather than extend loans to independent business that require them, he preferred to give them advice. With SBA acting as a small business management consultant service.

But independent businessmen took the stand conversation in his submission for cash, and also there are better sources available on management problems than a 41 year old attorney.

In setting up SBA lending authority Congress acted on a realistic appraisal of the immediate situation. Under present tax laws, it has been impossible for independent businesses to lay aside from profits the cash reserves needed to expand.

Many sound business enterprises are placed in financial straits because of a low cash position due to the use of cash to pay taxes. This fact is best evidenced by the record of the RFC. Most small business loans were paid off on a short term basis.

But Mitchell ignored the immediate facts, preferring a "pie in the sky" attitude.

He also neglected to recognize Congress is getting touchier about run-arounds from agency heads. Small business leaders laid the facts before Congressmen, especially Sen. Edward J. Thye, chairman of the Senate Small Business Committee.

Shortly thereafter Mitchell was called to the White House at which time his resignation was accepted, with the usual note of regret and appreciation of past services noticeably missing.

Mitchell wanted to give independent businessmen lessons on how to swim.

But Congress feels independent businessmen already know how to swim. All they need is a climate conducive to swimming.

An interesting note on "you can't take it with you; neither can you give it away."

In London, E. C. Bruce, who claims to represent Coastwise International, Inc., acting as agent for the U. S. in disposing of butter acquired under the price support program, complains that he has been unable to give away 20,000 tons of butter. British balk at paying 1/2 per pound transportation charges.

But it can be assumed that astute British businessmen have not lost the opportunity this offer presents.

Undoubtedly they are musing on free U. S. butter to hammer down price of butter here, away from Denmark and Holland. You may not "butter up" U. S. relations with these two strategically located allies.

FLOUR BAG GOES FROM KITCHEN TO BEDROOM



The flour bag does double duty, first in the kitchen and then in the bedroom, this pretty housewife shows. A new 25-lb. flour container can easily be converted into a pillow case. A full-length seam divides the container into two compartments, since ordinarily a bag large enough to become a pillowcase would have to be 30-lb. size. When the seam is ripped, the bag is ready to be laundered. The flour sack-pillow case comes in plain white, white with pink borders, or floral prints with solid borders, the National Cotton Council reports.

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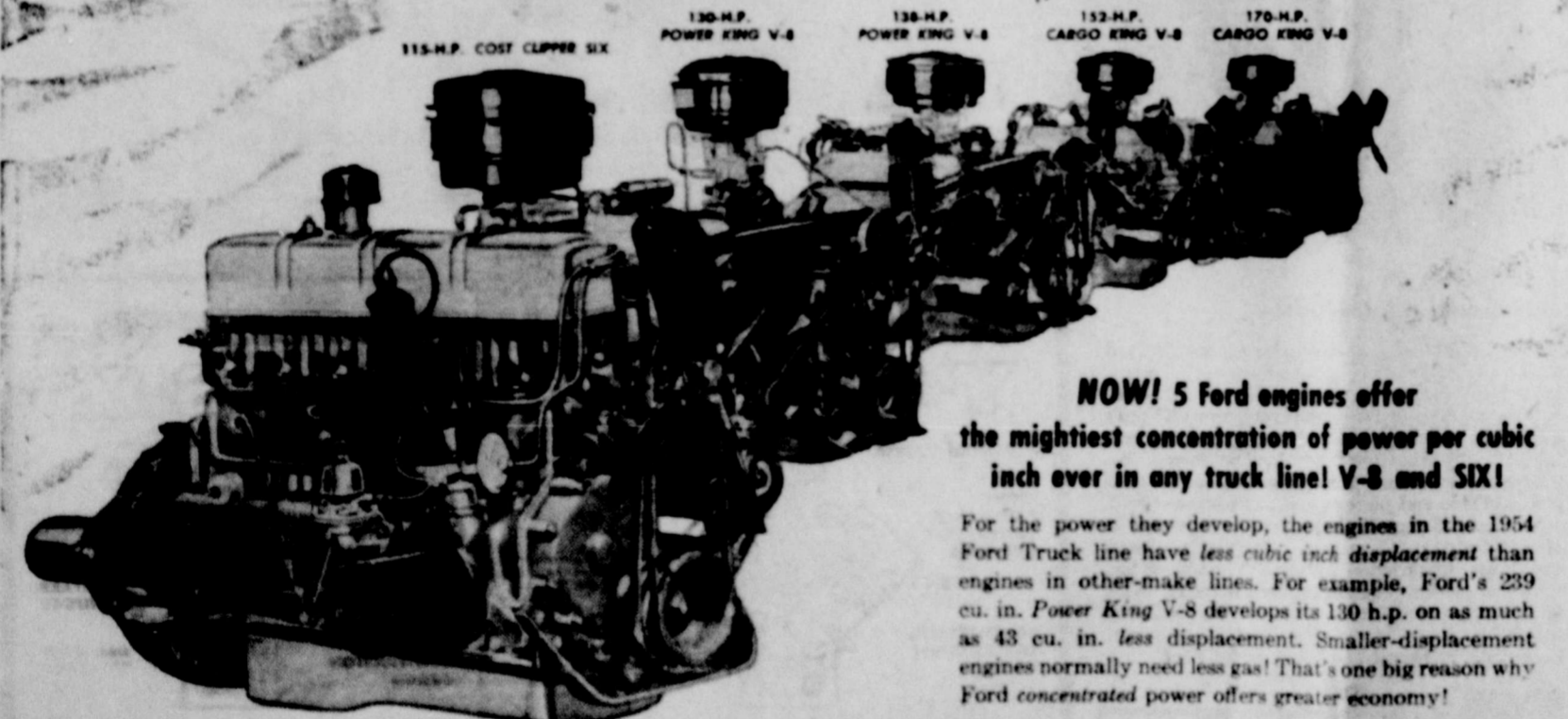
