It's just not going to be the same around the bank after May 1 with Bill Andrews not there. Mr. Andrews has carried an extremely heavy load and responsibility during the past couple of years. Probably he has had to patiently and understandingly listen to more hard luck tales than anyone in Spur. Personally, we have carried our troubles to him often and though not always obtained the advice or cash we sought, we have always received a warm welcome, a listening and sympathetic ear, and due consideration from a man of his responsibilities.

To us, Mr. Andrews has been a vital part of Spur. We respect him highly both as a banker and as an outstanding citizen of our city.

The editor goes on to point out that local agents help support the schools, churches, fire department, etc. in the local community. He concludes that "Cheap insurance is like any other cheap commodity; it's very apt to be more expensive in the long run."

## W. T. ANDREWS RESIGNS

### HOBERT LEWIS TO TAKE OVER PRESIDENCY OF BANK MAY 1

Clifford B. Jones, president of the Spur Security Bank, announced this week the resignation of W. T. Andrews as executive vice-president, due to ill health.

He explains that Andrews' ill health is not of a serious nature, but requiring relief from heavy responsibilities. The resignation is effective May 1. Andrews retains his directorship in the bank, and stated last night that his immediate plans call for plenty of rest.

Hobert Lewis, currently president of the First National Bank of Brownfield, has been selected to the presidency of the local bank, succeeding Jones who has resigned the presidency to accept chairmanship of the board. Andrews has been with the Spur bank for nearly 40 years. His many friends in this area and in state banking circles will regret to learn of his present retirement, Jones said.

Lewis is not a newcomer to Spur, having served as a vice-president and director of the

Spur bank from 1937 until 1947. According to Andrews, these changes will not effect the position of vice-president Foy Vernon or other directors or employees at this time.

## Steele, Reagan, King Elected Trustees

M. L. (Mac) Steele, John King, Jr. and Leon Reagan were elected trustees of the Spur Independent School district last Saturday. The large turn-out of voters retained Reagan for another term, along with electing two newcomers, Steele and King. The 236 voters cast 165 in favor of Steele, 150 for King and 19 for Reagan.

The board will meet Monday night, April 12 to re-organize. Other candidates were Everett Martin, A. V. Hoover and Earl Burnett.

## COUNTY ASKED TO GIVE \$660.80 IN NATIONWIDE CANCER DRIVE

The Dickens County Crusade Against Cancer is under full swing now reports Bill Barrett, central committee chairman.

Barrett states that the drive for funds to fight cancer will get underway this week, but that it is the aim of the committee first to educate Dickens countyans concerning cancer, and then secondly to try to reach the county's goal of \$660.80.

Films are available through the central committee and may be obtained for showing in any organization or group. Barrett states that when possible a projectionist and representative of the committee will accompany the films when shown.

Already films have been viewed by the Rotary Club, the Lions Club, the Harmony club, the Dry Lake community, and two

different groups at Dickens. The Spur VFW post and the Spur colored folks have already set dates to view the films.

In connection with the information drive, Barrett urges everyone to study the small pamphlets being distributed concerning the seven danger signs. The reading of one of these small pamphlets could easily lead to additional years of life for one who might have cancer in an early stage.

Statistically, Barrett points out that there are 23 million live people in the United States who are destined to die with cancer. Of these, Barrett reports, well over 7 million are going to die that could be cured. "Our goal is to save our pro rata share of this 7 million," stresses Barrett.

The Spur Rotary Club will be on hand Saturday noon to prepare and serve the barbecue, and the Spur Lions Club will be in charge of the pancake supper Saturday night.

## Insurance Agencies Announce New \$50 Deductible Clause

Spur's four insurance agencies jointly announced this week a recent revising of extended coverage and windstorm rates and rules which stipulates that insurance customers may now obtain \$50 deductible clauses on windstorm and hail policies.

The old law limited such policies to \$100 deductible. Both the agencies and their customers have desired the \$50 deductible clause since it was ruled out several years ago.

A spokesman for the local agencies explains that the \$50 deductible clause costs very little more, and in their opinion, is much to be desired by the insured.

As an example of the new law, it is explained that on a residence insured against wind and hail for \$5,000 the \$50 deductible clause will cost only \$4.00 per year over the cost of the \$100.00 deductible. Insurance customers may now obtain a \$50 deductible clause at a still higher rate. However, the spokesman for the local agencies is of the opinion that this rate is higher than the average insured would want to pay.

The Spur agencies making this announcement include Gibson's Insurance Company, H. S. Holly Insurance Agency, Jack Rector Insurance Agency and Starcher Insurance Agency.

French Fry Vegetables? Delicious!



Want a new taste thrill? Then French fry vegetables, suggests Winifred S. Carter who directs The Household Information Service for Procter & Gamble. We're all familiar with French fried potatoes, but many of us stop right there, never thinking of treating other vegetables to the deep-fry method. And that's a pity. Because vegetables, so cooked, have a new taste, the kind of taste every imaginative cook searches for.

Start with cauliflower and carrots, Mrs. Carter says. You'll need no special equipment beyond your frying basket and absorbent paper for draining. And work fast. These delicious morsels have a way of disappearing from right under the cook's nose.

Here's the recipe: French Fried Carrots and Cauliflower Makes about 4 servings. 1 medium head cauliflower, 5-6 small, cooked carrots, 1 cup sifted flour, 1 cup milk, 1 egg, 1 teaspoon melted Crisco. Separate cauliflower into small flower-ettes. Dip the cauliflower and carrots into the batter made from flour, milk, egg and 1 teaspoon melted Crisco. Fry in deep Crisco heated to 365°F. (or when an inch cube of bread browns in 60 seconds). Fry small quantities of the vegetables at a time, until tender and slightly brown. Drain on absorbent paper. Season.

THE X-RAY

By Science Features

The X-ray, a comparatively recent invention, is now one of the most widely used medical tools both for diagnosing illnesses and for treatment. Discovered almost accidentally by a German physicist, Wilhelm Konrad von Roentgen, in 1895, the X-ray became almost immediately accepted as a tremendous aid to the doctor. Photographs, showing the inside of the body, allowed the doctor to see the exact location of a cancer or the disturbance under consideration. Prior to that, it was a hit-or-miss proposition, with the doctor probing and guessing.

An X-ray is the radiation of a certain very short ray of light. When Roentgen discovered these rays, he didn't know exactly what they were, so he labelled them "X" rays.

These rays are also employed to treat various diseases. A two-million-volt machine has shown promise in the treatment of cancer and the ray has helped to reduce the "blue baby" menace, to name two of the newer uses that have been developed.

There are many different types of machines and methods that have been devised for special purposes. The dentist uses the machine to spot tooth decay; by using certain dyes, a specialist can see what is happening in the body's vital organs, and most doctors have a fluoroscope in their office to view the living body.

Roentgen never made anything out of his discovery and died of cancer when he was 78 years old. But, as hundreds of experts continue to work on his principle and devise more effective aids for the patient, the rest of the world benefits from his invention.
