## Area Ranchers Receive Bass, Blue Gills From Uncle Sam To Stock Ponds

Two dozen area farmers and ranchers received bass and blue-gill fingerlings to stock their tanks with Tuesday of this week.

The small fish were furnished by the U. S. Department of Interior Fish and Wildlife Service, through the local cooperation of J. H. Taylor and the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District.

Taylor reports that the fish are distributed at the rate of 750 bass and 375 blue gills per surface acre of water. These are the first to come to the Spur area from this source since 1952. He reports, however, that a few stocking fish have been available through the Texas State hatchery.

All ponds approved for the fish have been inspected and approved by the SCS prior to the acceptance of applications.

Taylor reports that applications may be made for the fish through the SCS or through the county agent's office. Some of the ranchers receiving fish Tuesday had had their applications in since November of 1952. Taylor explains that the delay was caused by the water shortage at San Angelo where they originated until the recent assignment of the area to the Fort Worth district. Similar delays are not anticipated in the future, states Taylor.

Only bass and blue gills are now available, states Taylor, but channel cat will be available this fall.

Taylor estimates that the fingerlings will grow approximately ten inches by the first year.
