The origin of the device of the stars and stripes in the flag of the United States is said to have been suggested by Benjamin Franklic at a dinner party. The flag was to have thirteen alternating red and white stripes with a field of blue.

The design of the stars and stripes, known as the Betsy Ross flag, was presented to the con-

passed the following resolution "Resolved: That the flag of the United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white, that the union be represented by stars in a blue field." Congress ordered years later that the number of the original stripes never






