### Chamber Re-Hires Hindman As Mgr.

Homer Hindman was re-hired last night as manager of the Spur Chamber of Commerce at the regular meeting of the board of directors. He will assume his duties on Monday, June 28.

Hindman came back to Spur in 1932 as chamber manager and resigned to become city manager. This spring he resigned his city job to go into the cafe business.

Eight representatives of surrounding communities recently met with the chamber's merchants committee to discuss problems encountered by the farmers when they come to Spur.

The second matter discussed was the closing of certain businesses on Saturday afternoon. The bank and lumberyards were mentioned specifically. It was suggested that the lumberyards rotate staying open on Saturday afternoons and closing one week day afternoon if such is necessary.

Another problem discussed was the city's police. It is reported that the rural representatives believe that there is a lack of diplomacy here and that they had "much rather receive a ticket than to listen to a lecture and get a ticket, too."

The establishment of a county-wide chamber of commerce was discussed whereby the entire county could be viewed instead of just Spur.

Similar meetings were set for the second Monday of each month at 8 p. m. The rural representatives present were M. H. Galbreath of Girard, Marion Jordan, Everett McArthur, Maurice Goodwin of East Afton, C. W. Nichols of Dickens, Clyde Horn of Red Mud, Peyton Legg of Afton and Charlie Witt of Kalgary.

## Kalgary, Clairemont Roads Assured By Highway Chief At Saturday Meeting

Dickens countians were assured of a Kalgary road and a Clairemont road within the next two and a half years by E. H. Thornton, Jr., chairman of the State Highway Commission, at a luncheon here last Saturday.

Thornton and Marshall Formby were the honor guests at the luncheon held in the Corral Room of the Hitchin Post and sponsored by several leading businessmen of Spur. Other guests included commissioners and county judges of neighboring counties.

Thornton stressed that highways in Texas are of importance second only to water. He stated that the highway commission is dependent on county commissioners courts in its work toward better and more highways for all Texas.

He stated that the commission is working on a long-range program with a goal of 35,000 miles of farm-to-market roads. He added that 24,000 miles of this have been completed. The program is designed, not on a temporary basis, but on the maximum roads that can be built, maintained and perpetuated by the funds available. One of the
