Chamber of Commerce Doings . . . SURVEY INDICATES SOLUTION TO LOCAL PARKING PROBLEM

The recent poll conducted by the merchants committee resulted as follows:
1. For parking meters 10. Against parking meters 42.
2. Willing to cooperate in plan for all merchants and employees to park in back Yoe 58. No 2.
3. Favor plan to gravel and improve rear area parking. Yes 47. No 10.
4. Closing at 5:30 p. m. Yes 40. No 14.

The above survey indicates that we can greatly improve our parking with action on the cooperative plan.
The committee has seriously considered the use of courtesy tickets, two-hour parking limits, and other measures to make more front street parking space available for the town's customers. We all favor the volunteer cooperative plan indicated above and point out that only with the wholehearted cooperation of all merchants and employees can this program be successful.

All merchants were informed of these results last week, and last Monday was set as the time for everyone to start practicing it. Since that time we have noticed a definite improvement.

We have even had several rural folks tell us that they have noticed the difference and that they and their neighbors appreciate it.

But still there are a few cars that remain on Burlington all day long. If one of them is yours, why not park it in the rear and let a farmer, housewife or visitor to our city have your parking space?

New folks and families are moving into our town faster than a lot of folks realize. At present our little file box of available housing is about empty.

Very often now-days we have inquiries about rent property and if you or your neighbor has a house or an apartment, furnished or unfurnished, we would appreciate your letting us know about it. No, we're not in the rentals business or the classified ad business, but if we can

be of service along this line to our citizens and to new-comers we are glad to do so.

Many of these new folks are coming to make their permanent home and we all want them to feel welcome and at home from the very start. Won't you do your share along this line?

Let's get to work on a little project here in town that will very likely save the life or limbs of one or more of us.

We've been very fortunate—even "lucky" that there have been no serious accidents on Hill Street in recent years. Such a narrow, winding highway through our city is just an invitation to a serious accident.

What can be done about it? It could very easily be widened from eight to ten feet, straightened out and lighted so as to be much safer and much more convenient to both home folks and traveling folks. And we feel that the time to do it is before several of us or our neighbors get killed on it.

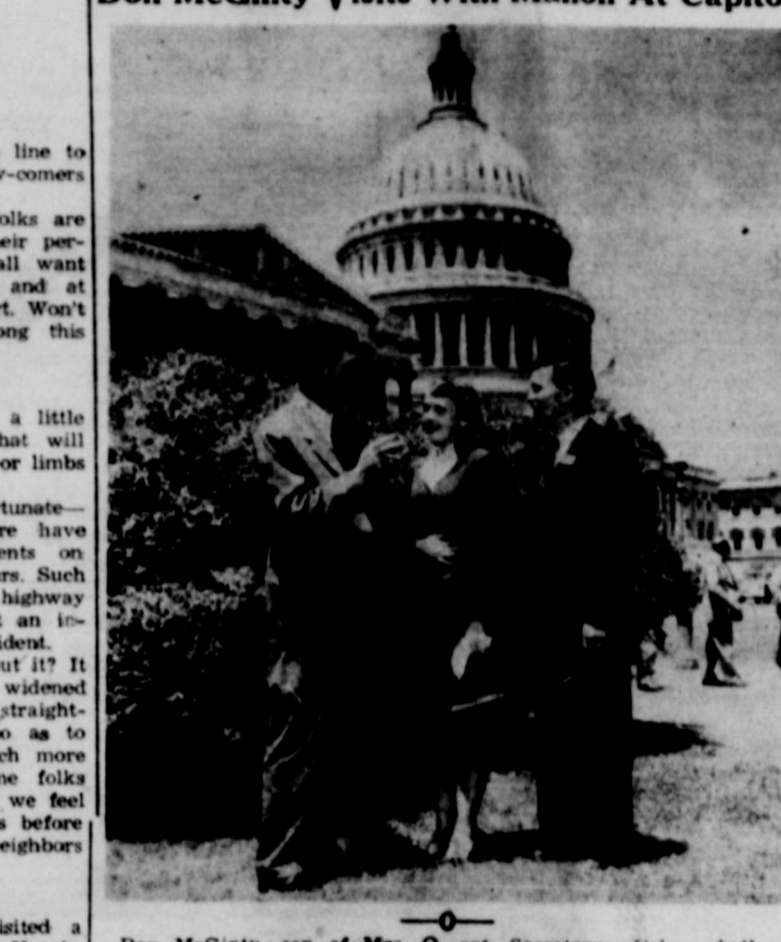
We went out and visited a while this week with U. A. Burkholder, manager of the Kimbell Milling Co. He is here supervising the construction of his company's new grain storage plant.

Jubilee Plans Progressing

Clock Fund Hits \$816; Benefit Polo Game Here July 16
Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 28, 29, 30, and 31, are the days for the 1954 staging of the annual Spur Cowboy Jubilee.

In recent years the annual Spur show has become known as one of the biggest, fastest, tuffest rodeos in the West. Participants in all event range around 500, and the annual prize money is well over \$2,500.

The annual show is held in the Jones Memorial stadium "just over the hill" from Spur, where a natural arena is nestled in the side of a hill overlooking the rich farm lands of Dickens county.

Eight Big Events
The agenda this year calls for eight major events in the rodeo, designed to attract entries from an age span of at least 60 years.

On Saturday afternoon the old timers will hold their annual roping event. This contest requires no entry fee and is always a highlight of the entire show, as the oldsters show the youngsters how it used to be done.

At the other end of the age bracket will be the junior boys flag race and breakaway and the junior girls' flag race and barrel race.

The regular rodeo event, which include double muzzing, calf roping, bareback roping, wild mare race and head-and-heeling.

In the livestock division, girl sponsors from over a wide area of Texas and neighboring states will compete for six cowgirl sponsor prizes. The two top performers will be named Champion Cowgirl of West Texas and Champion Cowgirl of Dickens County.

Mrs. John F. Moore Jr. (Doris), will again be hostess to the visiting cowgirls.

City Goes Western
With the Dickens County Sheriff's posse assuming the obligation for enforcement, the entire city of Spur will "go western" for the ten days preceding the opening of the Jubilee.

The posse has named Dick Samson as "judge" for the western period and rumors are that Judge Samson's court will be conducted in such a manner that Roy Bean will thereafter be considered a piker.

ALLAN SHIVERS SHOULD NOT BE RUNNING

ALLAN SHIVERS SHOULD NOT BE RUNNING FOR ANOTHER TERM AS GOVERNOR OF TEXAS. Seeking election three times, destroys a Texas tradition that has lasted since the days of the Republic.

Only one man has ever served longer than Governor Shivers will have when his term ends next January. He was Elisha M. Pease who was twice elected in 1853 and 1855; in the Reconstruction days he was appointed governor by General Phil Sheridan, commanding the invading Northern forces, and served another two years and two months or six years and two months in all.

At the end of his present term, Governor Shivers will have served five years and six months. He succeeded Governor Beauford Jester on July 11, 1919. Another term will give him better than 7 1/2 years as governor. That's too long.

Nobody else ever ran for a third elective term except Jim Ferguson and after his impeachment and removal early in his second term.

Henderson, Rumbels, Sam Houston, Cook, Roberts, Ross, Long, Culbertson, Lanham, Campbell, Hobbs, Moody, Allred and the other go've ones didn't Shivers does.

He seeks to break the record of Sheridan's stooge.

There was no demand for Mr. Shivers' candidacy. Congressmen Lloyd Denton of McAllen and Supreme Court Justice Will Wilson of Dallas, both fine and able gentlemen, would have run if Mr. Shivers had decided to retire to private life, as he told us he would in December, 1932.

But for some reason, Mr. Shivers changed his mind and decided he was indispensable, so he sided with Texas tradition and is running for what amounts to a fourth term.

Let us hope the next Legislature will submit to the people a constitutional amendment limiting governors to two elective terms. The Nation suffered so much from the breaking of the two-term presidential tradition that Mr. Shivers, born and raised a Democrat, found it good to support Republican Eisenhower in 1932.

We do not quarrel with him for that, for we did likewise. But we would call his attention to the fact that had the tradition, which Thomas Jefferson thought no man would ever break, been observed the Nation would be better off. The building up of a national machine would not have happened had the two-term tradition been continued.

Perhaps Governor Shivers is building a machine of his own. Three years ago he went into Duval County illegally, tried to take over the election machinery and succeeded fairly well. Then a complaint and unthinking Legislature gave him the privilege of doing that by passing a law he requested.

So he went back to Duval County with his 10,000 men and they went up a hill and intimidated voters and captured the power of the local officials.

We hold no brief for George Parr, the Duke of Duval. He can take care of himself. But Shivers did come into El Paso County, for any reason, or none, and interfere with our elections. Or he can go into any of the 251 counties of Texas.

That law should be repealed and the people given the protection only a limitation of terms can give.

Governor Shivers is an attractive man. We like him. But an attractive personality should not be allowed to overthrow an honored principle.

We wish he hadn't made this attempt to run again. We respect American and Texas traditions and we have noted in history and in experience that when tradition is flouted, the people suffer. Allan Shivers has brought Texas to a crisis. Shall the tradition, violated only in the hungry days after the War De-

ALLAN SHIVERS SHOULD NOT BE RUNNING

ALLAN SHIVERS SHOULD NOT BE RUNNING for another term as governor of Texas. Seeking election three times, destroys a Texas tradition that has lasted since the days of the Republic.

Only one man has ever served longer than Governor Shivers. He served his term from 1911 to 1915. He was Elisha M. Pease who was twice elected in 1853 and 1855; in the Reconstruction days he was appointed governor by General Phil Sheridan, commanding the invading Northern forces, and served another two years and two months or six years and two months in all.

At the end of his present term, Governor Shivers will have served five years and six months. He succeeded Governor Beasford Justice on July 11, 1948. Another term will give him better than 7 1/2 years as governor. That's too long.

Nobody else ever ran for a third elective term except Jim Ferguson and after his impeachment and removal early in his second term.

Henderson, Rummels, Sam Houston, Cook, Roberts, Ross, George, Calbertson, Lamborn, Campbell, Hobbs, Moody, Alfred and the other good ones didn't Shivers do.

He seeks to break the record of Sheridan's stonps.

There was no demand for Mr. Shivers' candidacy. Congressman Lloyd Beasford of McAllen and Supreme Court Justice Will Wilson of Dallas, both fine and able gentlemen, would have run if Mr. Shivers had decided to retire to private life, as he told us he would in December, 1952.

But for some reason, Mr. Shivers changed his mind and decided he was indispensable, so he kicked aside Texas tradition and is running for what amounts to a fourth term.

Let us hope the next Legislature will submit to the people a constitutional amendment limiting governors to two elective terms. The Nation suffered so much from the breaking of the two-term presidential tradition that Mr. Shivers, born and raised a Democrat, found it good to support Republican Eisenhower in 1952.

We do not quarrel with him for that, for we did likewise. But we would call his attention to the fact that had the tradition, which Thomas Jefferson thought no man would ever break, been observed, the building up of a national machine would not have happened had the two-term tradition been continued.

Perhaps Governor Shivers is building a machine of his own. Three years ago he went into Duval County illegally, tried to take over the election machinery and succeeded fairly well. Then a complaint and withdrawal. Legislature gave him the privilege of doing that by passing a law he requested.

So he went back to Duval County with his factory and they beat up a man and intimidated others and violated the powers of the local officials.

We hold no brief for George Parr, the Duke of Duval. He can take care of himself. But Shivers can't come into El Paso County, too, for any reason, or none, and interfere with our elections. Or he can go into any of the 251 counties of Texas.

The law should be repeated and it's people who the prohibition only a limitation of terms can give.

Governor Shivers is an attractive man. We like him. But an attractive personality should not be allowed to overthrow an honored principle.

We wish he hadn't made this decision to run again. We respect American and Texan tradition and we have noted in history and in experience that when tradition is flouted, the people suffer. Allan Shivers has brought Texas to a crisis. Shall the tradition, violated only in the hungry days after the War Between the States, be again violated?

We have sought justification for the Governor's act in his record of accomplishment, and we were astounded at what we discovered:

The cupboard is bare.

It is, indeed, too bad that Texas has been deprived of the privilege of considering Will Wilson and Lloyd Beasford, as well as Candidate Yarborough, as a successor to the Governor.

Allan Shivers would not, it is realized it, deliberately hurt Texas. But he is doing just that by forcing himself upon the people. For Texas' sake, he shouldn't be running.

World War II Vets Have Three Years On G. I. Home Plan

World War II veterans have three more years (until June 27, 1957) in which to use their GI rights to buy a home.

More than 3,000,000 veterans have purchased homes under the liberalized plan offered by the GI bill, which became effective June 27, 1947, for a 10-year period.

In reminding veterans of the three years remaining for purchases, Ralph G. Campbell, president of the Home Builders Association of Fort Worth, said the home-buying veterans have compiled a remarkable repayment record. The Veterans Administration has had to pay claims only one-half of one per cent of all the GI home loans made.

Actual losses to date amount to less than one-tenth of one per cent.

"This is indeed a magnificent record and a high tribute to the character and sense of community responsibility of ex-service men," Campbell said.

Here are the six steps the former serviceman takes in getting a GI loan: Find a home you want to buy, (2) Go to a builder or a bank, building and loan association or other lender, (3) present your plan and your original discharge or separation papers, (4) property is appraised by VA approved appraisers, (5) certificate of reasonable value goes to the lender, (6) if application is approved, the loan is made.
