### Chamber of Commerce Doings . . . CHAMBER OPPOSES SUSPENSION OF SPUR - STAMFORD BUS SCHEDULE

We have all been very busy this week getting ready for our rodeo July 21, 22, 23 and 24. As it has been set up one week, we have all been working day and night trying to get our town decorated in a colorful atmosphere for our visitors. We think that by the first of the week all the windows will be completed with welcome signs, western pictures, etc.

There have not been as many float entries for the parade next Wednesday as there should be. Anyone wanting to enter a float in the parade, please contact the chamber office for information.

Cecil Godfrey has given \$50 in prize money to be divided into five prizes for entries in the parade.

We would like to inform all concerned that the streets will not be blocked for the parade this year.

The parade will start at 4 p. m. Wednesday, with all entries reporting down by the city light plant at 3:30 p. m.

Our town was advised this week by the TN&O Bus Commission that the Railroad Commission has granted them a suspension to discontinue the bus line from Spur to Stamford for one year effective July 20.

The chamber of commerce is doing everything in its power to stop this action and has contacted both the bus company and the Railroad Commission regarding it. We will keep everyone posted as things go along, and we assure you we will do everything we can to keep this bus service in operation.

The merchants committee and rural representatives from each community met Monday night in their regular session in regard to what we can do to help each community in our trade territory.

The rural representatives expressed their appreciation for the employees' and employers' parking their cars off the main street. They stated that they have noticed a great improvement in Spur's parking problem.

Among other things discussed was the need of grain storage and elevators in Spur. Also, that a cotton warehouse would be of great benefit to this county, was discussed. A committee to investigate these two important projects was appointed.

We have three of our volunteer fire boys attending a two-weeks' course at College Station for training in fire fighting in order to save the citizens of Spur five percent on their fire rate.

These boys are Chief John King, Jr., Bill R. Barrett and Bill Powell. Their employers are to be commended for letting these boys off to attend this course to add to the safety of our lives and property. The employers are Chandler Funeral Home, Ritter Hardware, and the City of Spur.

Spur is fortunate in having such a good volunteer fire department. It has one of the best ratings in West Texas.

CITY DRUG, LIONS TO DO BATTLE TONIGHT; SEASON ENDS TUESDAY

The much-improved Hoover-McAteeer Hotrods, need one win in the next two games to join City Drug, Lions and Spur Milk in the championship playoff of the 1934 Spur Softball League.

The Milk Boys clinched the third spot Tuesday night as they obliterated the Lions team 12-4.

The VFW has a slim, outside mathematical chance at the playoff, but their chances seem slight as it would take an Edwards-Kelley win over the Hotrods tonight and then a Spur Milk win from the Hotrods next Tuesday to bring them into a tie for the fourth place slot.

The Lions dropped into second place this week, following two losses; one to the Hotrods and one to Spur Milk.

Last Thursday night the VFW pounded the Farmall boys 21-1 in the opener, followed by the 9-1 drubbing handed the Lions by Hoover-McAteeer.

Tuesday night the City Drug boys stepped into first place by walloping the VFW 17-4. Spur Milk broke out a new pitcher, Lawson Smith, to top the Lions 12-4 in the nightcap.

Tonight the Farmall boys and Hotrods vie in the opener, and City Drug will be out to finish

on top when they meet the Lions in the nightcap.

The regular season will wind up next Tuesday with VFW and Hoover-McAteeer in the 7:30 tilt, and Spur Milk versus Edwards-Kelley in the finale.

The championship playoff will start following the rodeo with the top four teams drawing for first-round, one-game elimination. The two winners will then play two-out-of-three for the championship.

### MERCURY HITS 106 TUESDAY AS HEAT WAVE CONTINUES

The mercury soared to a sizzling 106 degrees here Tuesday to top a week's siege of 100-plus readings for the area.

Last Saturday it was 101, on Sunday it got to 104, Monday saw 105 and yesterday it hit 102.

County agent Charles Taylor reports that the cotton over the county is holding up very well during the heat wave, but will be in dire need of a rain within the next couple of weeks.

It is reported to be fruiting up in some areas where earlier planting was possible.

The insect problem over the county is reported to be pretty well in hand, with only a few grasshoppers and fleahoppers detected working on the crops.

However, Taylor reports, if and when we do get a good rain, along with it will come the possibility of boll worms.

At present about the only spraying that is being done is in the irrigated sections where watering has been started.

Taylor reports that the country's early feed is just about beyond hope of making much of a crop. It is heading out without moisture enough to make a full mature head. However, he reports, the late feed is holding out very good during the hot dry weather and will probably hold out fairly good a little longer without rain. In general, however, all major phases of farming over the county are in need of general rains.

Taylor reports that approximately 250,000 bushels made up the county's 1934 wheat harvest, with land averaging from eight to ten bushels to the acre.

### PARADE TO OPEN FESTIVITIES AT 4 p. m. NEXT WEDNESDAY

The 1934 Spur Cowboy Jubilee will open here next Wednesday, July 21, with a big downtown parade at 4 p. m.

The first rodeo performance will open at 8 p. m. next Wednesday, with performances at the same time each night through Saturday.

The dates for the annual rodeo were revised in a recent meeting of the rodeo association directors because of the conflict with other shows in West Texas.

This year's Jubilee is expected to attract around 500 contestants and entries in the various events and contests. Rodeo Association President Eric Swenson reports that entries are already pouring into the rodeo office and a good entry is anticipated.

The show will include all ages cowboys and cowgirls, with the youngsters and oldsters competing in racing, roping and riding.

**\$50 in Parade Prizes**

The first prize money of the '34 show will go to winners in the big parade Wednesday afternoon at 4 p. m.

Cecil Godfrey has given \$50 for prize money which will be awarded as follows: \$15 to most typical old cowboy, \$15 to first place float, \$10 to most original float, \$5 to most typical cowgirl under 15 years old, and \$5 to the most typical cowboy under 15 years old.

**Championship Palmetto Polo**

The Dickens County Sheriff's Posse, world's champion Palmetto Polo team, will host visiting posess and riding clubs at a big barbecue in the park at 5 p. m. Wednesday.

Following the feast, the hosts will lay their championship on the line to be challenged by one of the following teams: Fisher County Sheriff's Posse, Cottle-King Sheriff's Posse, Terry County Sheriff's Posse, 3-R Riding Club of Colorado City, or the Hereford Riders, Inc.

The championship game will be played in the rodeo arena beginning at 6:30. One ticket entitles a fan to both the Palmetto Polo game and the regular 8 p. m. performance.

Riding club trophies will be presented to three clubs or posess in Wednesday's parade. A polo championship trophy will be presented to the polo winner.

Admission to this year's show will be \$1.00 for everyone over 12 years of age.

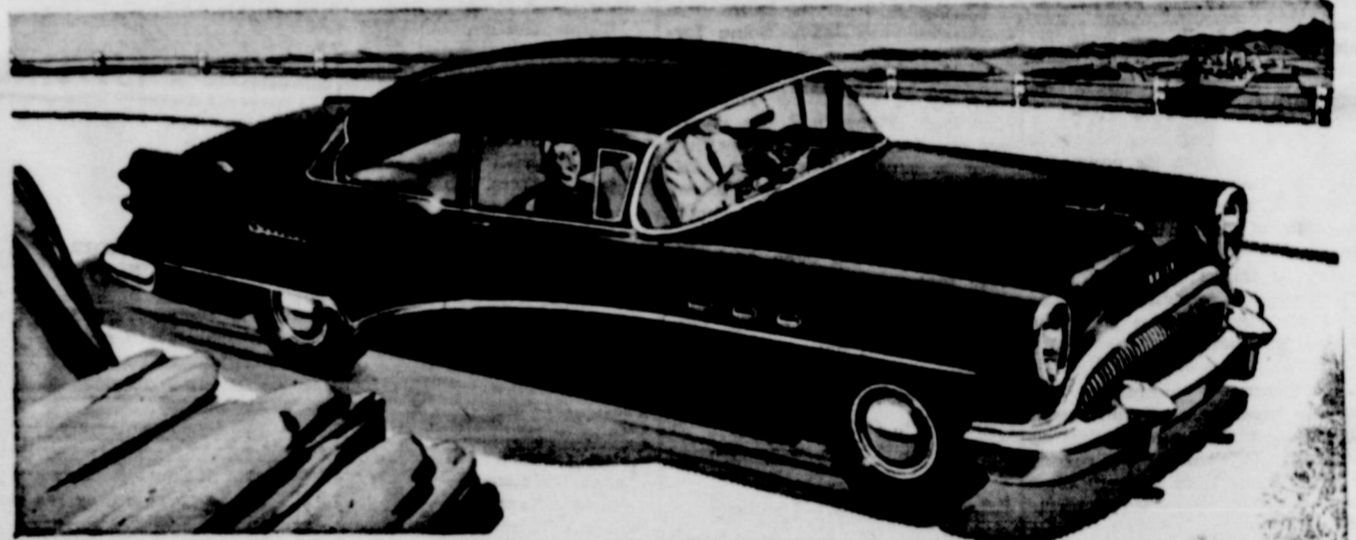

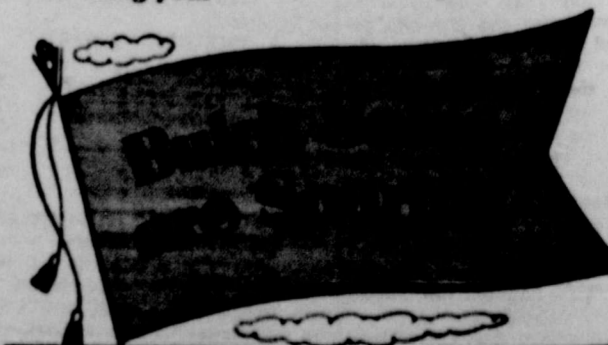

Department of Agriculture and the Land-Grant College and Universities in the development of an educational program that is constantly exploring new frontiers of research, service and training.

Current project of the Foundation include, a National 4-H Center, the International Farm Youth Exchange, research in the development of needs of youth, training in human relations for youth leaders and an experimental project in public affairs discussions for rural young men and women's groups.

Chairman Merrett has already held one conference with Texas Extension Director G. G. Gibson regarding plans for the campaign and other will be arranged with interested persons before contacts are made on local basis.

**SCIENCE and your Health**

**DISHPAN HANDS**  
By Science Features

A woman's work is never done, according to an old maxim, but very few people regard housework as injurious. Yet the housewife does know occupational diseases. Dishpan hands, as it is known when more serious, housewives' eczema, is becoming more and more common.

In a study of 145 cases of eczema of the hands Dr. Matthew J. Brunner of Chicago found that 108 patients were housewives. The doctor described the ailments as starting with dryness, redness and scaling which, when the condition became more severe, led to cracks in the skin, crusting and blistering.

Continued dunkings in hot water and soap are responsible for the condition, along with other household culprits such as ammonia, water, bleaches, detergents and solvents (as in waxes and polishes). Treatment, based on the idea that the eczema is primarily due to irritation and the skin is extremely sensitive to household agents, is simple. The doctor said that "cosmetic cleansing cream are sometimes useful," and the petrolatum, isoc acid and zinc oxide ointments are also recommended.

Serious outbreaks demand the attention of a physician who will check for secondary infection. Dr. Brunner reported that "antibiotics are given orally and sometimes produce spectacular improvement." Terramycin orally administered five to seven days was preferred over drugs that are applied to the skin to fight infection.

The most important point for the patient is to remove the irritant causes. Possibly to the dismay of other members of the family, Dr. Brunner stated that "the patient is urged to do only a minimum amount of housework . . . and to resist the aid of husband or children in dishwashing and other "when duties."

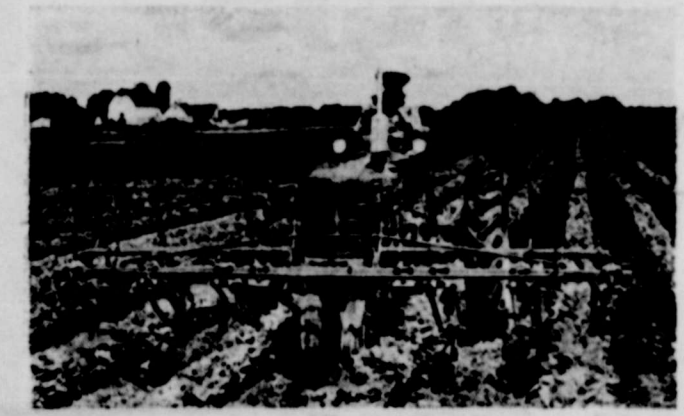


