## PUMP INSTALLED ON FRANK STEWART FINE

Pumping equipment has been installed to take potential and complete the Robert S. Lytle No. 1 Frank Stewart, indicated discovery well in the northwestern part of Kent County, about 12 miles south of Spur.

On last reported gauges the well swabbed 50 barrels of oil in eight hours. There was no water. Production is from perforations 6,036-6,044 and 6,056-6,073 feet.

Location is 330 feet from north and 1,648 feet from west lines of Section 8, John Rodman Survey.

A meeting of all farmers in the Patton Springs school district at Afton, Texas is planned for August 10, 8:30 p. m. The purpose of the meeting, according to Odus Holly, vocational agriculture teacher, is to organize an agricultural club for the northern part of Dickens County.

Mr. Legg said the first meeting would be used to discuss organizing, the constitution and by-laws, to get members and elect a board of directors for the club.

The purpose of the Agricultural Club are to provide agricultural information to its members, advance better methods of farming, sponsor civic activities which will benefit the community, support the schools, health and neighborliness, render assistance to persons suffering misfortunes, and to promote fellowship among its members.

## LITTLE DOUG HINSON, JR. RECOVERING FROM MISHAP

Douglas Hinson, Jr., 17-month old son of Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Hinson, narrowly escaped drowning Saturday night when he tumbled away from his parents and fell into a stock tank on his family's farm 12 miles west of here.

He was found floating face down by his mother just a few minutes after his disappearance and was revived by his father who quickly administered artificial respiration. He was then rushed to the Spur Memorial Hospital under the resuscitation brought to the scene by the Spur Volunteer Fire department.

He is reported to be recovering from the accident, but is now undergoing treatment for a lung infection caused by the near-drowning.

## Proposed Constitutional Amendments Affect Dickens County; Election Nov. 2

In the fine print on page 6 last week, this week, and for the next two weeks are proposed amendments to the Constitution of the State of Texas, in the form of resolutions of the houses of the State Legislature. The proposed amendments are being published by the State of Texas, in accordance with law, and will be voted on in the November, 1954, General Election.

Four of the eleven propositions are of direct concern to citizens of Dickens County as a whole, while the other seven pertain to other localities, larger counties, specific groups, or removed from this county to the extent that only tax money is involved.

Probably the most important to the citizens of Dickens County are the two which pertain to elected county officials. Senate Joint Resolution No. 4 proposes four year terms for all county and district officers. House Joint Resolution No. 8 proposes the creation of the office of Assessor-Collector of Taxes in counties with under 10,000 population.

House Joint Resolution No. 16 proposes to allow women to serve as jurors on grand and petit juries. Senate Joint Resolution No. 7 involves the payment of assistance to aged, blind and needy minors.

## Harvey Named On County FHA Group

A. J. Harvey is the newly appointed member of the Dickens County Farmers Home Administration committee, John E. Quattlebaum, the agency's county supervisor, announced this week. The appointment became effective Aug. 2.

Harvey operates a farm north of Spur and is also store manager of Allen Auto Supply here. The other two members of the three-member committee are M. R. Costelow of Spur and Riley P. Wooten of McAadoo.

Each member is named for a three-year term and one appointment expires each year. No member completing a three-year term can succeed himself. Every agricultural county in the country has such a committee to help the FHA county supervisor adapt the agency's loan policies to local conditions including farm credit needs.

During the past year, the county committee for Dickens County has approved 242 loans out of a total of 246 applications received, Quattlebaum reports.

The FHA makes loans to family-type farm operators to buy, improve or operate efficient farms. Special livestock loans are made where temporary credit is needed to enable the operator to remain in operation.

The agency also makes emergency loans in counties or states that have been designated by the Secretary of Agriculture as areas where emergency credit is needed. However, the agency does not make loans of any type to any applicant whose needs can be handled by other credit sources.

Before any money can be borrowed through the agency, an applicant must have the approval of the county committee. In the case of a farm ownership loan, the farm to be purchased, enlarged or improved must also be approved by the committee, the county supervisor explains.

**Wool Growers Urged to Back Promotion Plan**  
FLAGSTAFF, ARIZ. — Although consumer appreciation for wool has risen sharply during the last year, intensified promotion is needed to strengthen wool's markets. Max F. Schmitt, President of The Wool Bureau, has told the annual meeting of the Executive Committee of the American Wool Council.  
The program of wool promotion, which this year for the first time includes consumer advertising, should have the wholehearted support of the nation's wool growers, Mr. Schmitt said.  
In this increasingly competitive era, he explained, it only does wool compete with other fibers, but wool products vie with an ever-widening range of consumer goods for their share of the consumer dollar. Wool growers must accept promotion as essential to the job of marketing their product profitably, he added.  
Wool promotion efforts to date represent a "solid beginning" to a carefully planned, long-range program, Mr. Schmitt stated. Nothing that the consumer respect for wool is currently at a high level, Mr. Schmitt said.  
"Basic performance qualities long taken for granted in wool are now eagerly sought by the consumer, who has found—sometimes from bitter experience—that nothing measures up to wool in service and value."  
Mr. Schmitt told the committee that careful planning and judicious spending are helping to stretch the wool promotion dollar. It will go still further, and produce even more, if the nation's wool growers give the wool promotion program their determined, day-to-day support, he added.  
In addition to consumer advertising, the intensified wool promotion program will include expanded operations of The Wool Bureau's Pacific Coast office in Los Angeles, Mr. Schmitt reported.

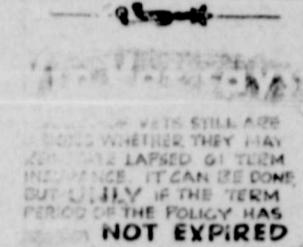

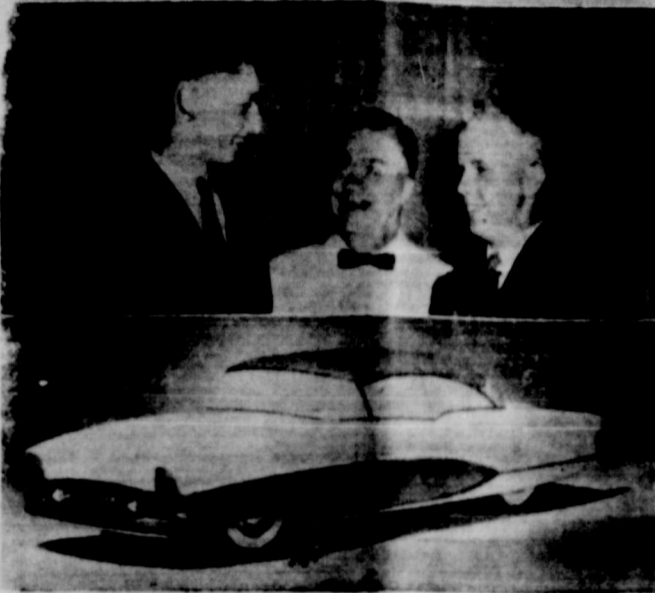

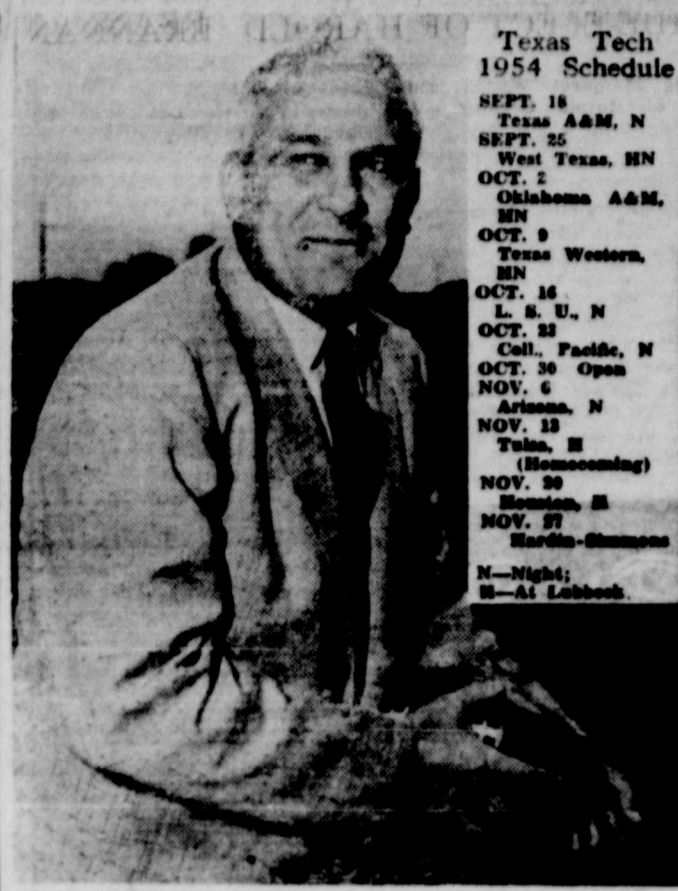
