We haven't decided whether our presence was just not wanted or extremely immaterial at the meeting in Dickens Monday afternoon—but anyway, we didn't even know about it until Tuesday morning.

What transpired at the meeting appears elsewhere herein, but what is about to happen seems more worthy of editorial comment.

IF (with emphasis) the county commissioners stick with their decision to discontinue the extension department's offices and personnel in Dickens County on Oct. 31, they will have eliminated one of the vital components of the advancement of the county's agriculture in the past, present and future. Back in the horse and buggy days the individual farmer knew little about new farming ideas, new crops, new practices, and had only his immediate neighbors from which to obtain advice and assistance when cattle got sick, bugs invaded crops, fields failed to produce profitable crops, rains and wind carried his top soil off, etc. Today the extension service, through the county agents, brings to every farmer in the county the results of the vast system of experimental farms, laboratories and services set up by the state and federal government for the advancement of agriculture. It is the county agent that aids directly in getting the programs and ideas of progressive farming into action on the individual farm. He works directly with the farmer in following through on the projects designed for the sole purpose of raising the income and standard of living of rural folks.

The county agent might be compared with the connecting rods on your car or tractor—if you can't get the power behind the pistons to the crankshaft, your power isn't worth much. Likewise, if we can't get the modern advancements in agriculture on the individual farms, the advancements remain only in theory and aren't worth much practically.

Our county attorney reportedly suggested a way of financing the extension service in our county through these trying times by issuing script or time warrants in the amount of the salaries involved. If that's the only way to keep this vital service in our county, we should let our commissioners know beyond a shadow of a doubt that that's what we want.

(When such stalwarts in the county's agriculture as Joe Rose and Elmer Shugart agree on anything—it's bound to be good for the entire county!)

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**Red Cross Group To Meet October 12**  
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A meeting to form local policy has been scheduled for Tuesday night October 12 at 7:30 o'clock. The meeting will be held at the Dickens County courthouse annex. Attending the meeting will be members of the county commissioners court, a representative from each community in the county, and members of the local Red Cross board of directors.

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At the outset of the meeting County Judge W. H. Hindman explained to the group the financial situation of the county. He pointed out that the county was out of money in the general fund and there was no money at the present time with which to continue the three offices.

County Attorney Alfred Walker spoke to the group stating that funds cannot legally be transferred from public improvement funds, road and bridge funds, jury fund, etc. to pay county salaries.

Walker also pointed out a way that the office could be continued if the court saw fit by means of deficit financing. This would mean the issuance of time warrants or scrip to the employees, to be paid back from 1955 tax collections. He pointed out that such a plan might necessitate an increase in tax evaluations next year.

## City Light Plant Needs New Unit Says Manager

### Revenue Bond Suggested To Finance Extension Improvement Program

City Manager W. W. Spray recently submitted a report to the City Commission and to the citizens of Spur stating that the present city light and power plant will be unable to satisfactorily carry the needs of the city next summer, assuming a natural and normal increase in electrical consumption. The report included a plan whereby the needs of the city could be satisfactorily met by the installation of a new LP gas-burning generator.

According to Spray such a unit could generate enough electricity to serve the town, leaving the present generators as stand-bys.

Included in the report were plans for the complete modernization of the entire system, including new street light circuits, repaired or replaced faulty or overloaded lines, new lines to certain sections of the city and a steady-frequency current to assure the proper operation of electrical appliances.

To finance such a project, designed to put the city's light business on a modern, paying basis, Spray suggests a revenue bond issue sufficient to cover the entire cost.

He points out that the fuel saving, alone, would more than make payments on such a bond. He explains that to generate two million kilowatt hours by the present units the fuel oil costs \$18,600.00. To generate the same KW's with LP gas in a new unit would cost only \$8,720.00, or a saving of \$9,880. He adds that the saving on excessive line loss, lube oil, repairs and maintenance would add considerably more to this figure.

Concerning the proposed revenue bond to finance the project, Spray states that not one cent of tax money would or could ever be used to pay it. Such a bond is payable only out of revenue from the light plant.

The City Manager adds that "We feel certain that you want and deserve the best electrical service possible and we feel that this is the way to obtain it."

Mayor George Gabriel states that the commission will call a revenue bond election only if the citizens of Spur indicate that they want it.

Both the city manager and the City Commission solicit the comments, opinions or suggestions from the people on this issue, states Mayor Gabriel.

### X-ray Unit Available To Dickens Co. Folk

Plans for a mass x-ray survey to be made of the residents of Dickens county were outlined in a meeting of HD club representatives and health officials on Thursday morning, Sept. 23.

Philip Gauss of the State Health Department discussed the need for the survey and pre-survey plans. He announced that the mobile x-ray unit would be available to Dickens county on Friday, Saturday and Monday, Oct. 29 - Nov. 1.

Faye McArthur was elected general chairman of the group and the showroom of Godfrey Motor company, Spur, was chosen as the location for setting up the unit. The x-rays will be made from 8:30 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. each of the three days scheduled.

The last mass x-ray survey in Dickens county was made in 1949 with 2035 persons being x-rayed. This is approximately 34% of the eligible population

### P. L. & R. Requires Complete Address On 2nd Class Mail

Effective Oct. 20, the Spur Post Office will require all second class mail to properly and completely addressed, states Guy Karr, postmaster.

Mail affected by the postal regulation includes newspapers, magazines and periodicals.

The regulation pertains primarily to post office box holders and city delivery patrons. Complete addresses on second class matter will include either the correct box number or street address.

Karr requests that all box holders and city delivery patrons to inform their publishers at once of correct mailing addresses. The regulation covering this requirement is already in effect but to prevent Spurites from missing any copies or editions, a deadline of Oct. 20 has been set to get correct addresses to publishers.

After Oct. 20 second class mail will not be delivered without complete and correct addresses, states Karr.

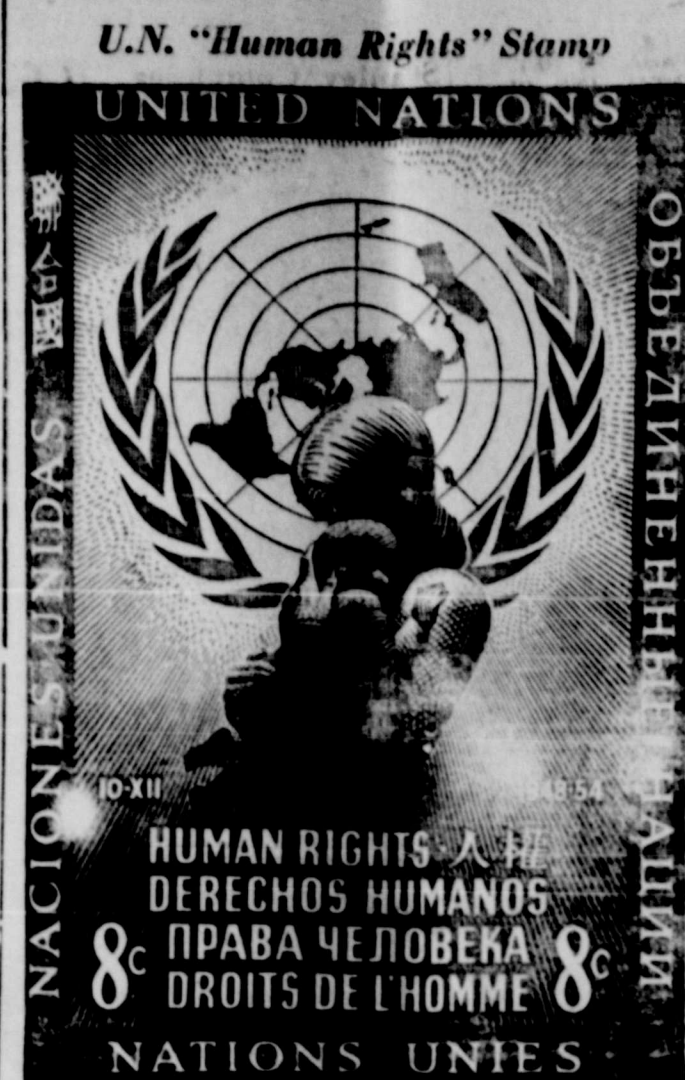

**COUNTY FAILS TO GET EXPERIMENTAL USE OF COTTON BURR FOR FEED**

The Dickens County Farm Bureau recently sought to be included in an experimental project of using cotton burrs for feed or other purposes from gins with a one-fan burr blower. Present regulations call for burrs to be blown through two fans to destroy pink boll worms if they are to be returned to the farm.
