

squeeze on farmers. Reports will obtained from about \$ 10,000 farm operators throughout the United States. Every farmer's re-port will be held absolutely con-fidential and used only in combination with those from other farmers to obtain Regional and United States totals. The final results will be used by Government agencies. State colleges, legislators, and agricultural groups interested in farm expenditures and their relationship to farm income.

The survey will obtain information on the buying habits of American farmers both as to the kinds of goods and service and their relative importance. This information will be used in revising and modernizing the index of prices Paid Farmers, including interest, taxes, and wage rates-also known as the Party Index. It will also be used to improve estimates of net farm income. The Parity Index is used in calculating parity prices of farm products.

Because of the great changes that have occurred not only in prices and income but also in production techniques, farm families are spending more money and spending it differently today than they did in 1940. The great need for up-to-date and accurate information on farm expeniture, promoted the congress to authorize a part. 9

There are many reasons why the nation's farm youth



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


