



AN OPEN LETTER TO THE CITIZENS OF SPUR

Due to the deep concern and multiple accusations arising over the circulation of some anonymous publications of recent date, I would like to make a personal contribution toward partially clarifying the charged atmosphere.

I refer paticularly to the printed circular in which was listed a series of statements, all of which were essentially a reiteration and recapitulation of street conversation "quotes" which had been freely passed around town during the past several weeks. I had heard this sampling of statements before, - - - you had heard them before, - - - now all saw how they looked in print. I realized some time ago that I was a good primary target for many of these barbs, but to me this was of only passing concern, since I had taken a strong stand on some controversial city fasnes, and expected such a reaction in return.

Consequently, I am hereby assuming full and total responsibility for passing them on. There were no city bosses, no directors, no coaches, no associates or accomplices consulted or involved in any form or fashion, in the compilation of this circular.

As far as the Spur Volunteer Fire Department is concerned, I yield to none in support of this select group of boys, many of whom are my closest personal friends. I would never knowingly or willingly make a statement that for a moment would reflect on the integrity of this organization and its members. I have said it before and I will sav it again that this is one of the finest organizations in this section of the country. both as an operating unit and as to the makeup of its individual

My stand on the Fire Department is nothing new nor is it one of political expediency, for I have made it a matter of public record many times in the past few years.

In my personal files I have correspondence from the State Fire Insurance Commissioner of Texas attesting to my support. So it can be plainly seen from the record that I am not any "Johnny-comelately", when it comes down to a proven aflegiance to the local Fire Department.

I am happy to be informed that a large number of individuals have been awakened this past week to a greater appreciation for the valiant service rendered by the Fire Department, and its intrinsic value as a progressive organization in this community. So it appears that, after all, some good to this organization has already resulted from this civil turbulence.

I have no comment to make about the three lettters that were circulated through the mail. I know nothing about their origin. I personally did not endorse their contents, either. It would be interesting and still more clarifying if their originator would also drop their veil of anonymity and come out with the true facts.

In closing, I am in agreement with the Editor that prevailing practices of fighting "fire with fire" is not in the best interests of Spur: - that the time has come when some common denominator of effort must be found wherein a majority and not too much smaller minority can agree to mobilize their resources and settle their petty differences on the basis of "what is best for Spur", - leaving out forever the base "personality ingredients". The combined efforts of every citizen is needed at this very moment to help in the solution of the many civic problems that are presently at hand. The mandate is clear - - 4 the Citizens must "close ranks", and that very soon, if Spur is to go forward as it should.



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
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
