



2. Zoning Ordinances: For your protection the local government frequently zones some areas, for example for single houses only, for multiple dwellings; for retail stores, for manufacturing, etc. Unless the local governing body change, its zoning ordinance, no filling station, for instance, can go up next to you in a residential area. Neither could you turn your home into a store. In any case, you should find out what your

neighborhood zoning rules are.

3. Building Codes: Be Certain that the plans and construction will meet the requirements of the local building code as to size, location and structure. Municipal ordinances usually impose strict standards for the building, the plumbing and the electrical wiring. In many cases only licensed building trademen are permitted to make the installations.

4. Financing: Financing tracts protect both you and the lender. Unless you pay cash, you will use credit to pay for your house, most likely a deed of trust or a land contract. Your installments often include principal, interest, insurance and taxes. Under a land contract the lender holds title to your house until you pay for it. If you fall behind, the holder can take the house back. With a deed of trust, the lender has a lien which he can foreclose if you default. You may get some

of your money back on the principal; but you may also have to
make up any loss the lender in
