## Whoa, Now!

A personal matter recently caused us to seriously re-consider Spur and Dickens County as a place in which to live, work, worship and rear a family.

We considered every phase of our public and private lives in Spur and came up with some very satisfying conclusions.

First, Spur can be proud of its fine churches. The number of churches and the quality of their congregations appear to us as being lighthouses of the Lord in a predominantly Christian area. No church could be satisfied with its ministry, but on a comparative basis, Spur can be proud of her churches—and we want to continue to share in the blessings of such a community.

Then we considered the local schools. Granted, the current economic strain caused by the drought prevents us at this time to match some of our neighbors in physical facilities, but we believe that just as a beautiful building doesn't make a good church, a large, modern building doesn't necessarily make a good school. We feel that our children can attend Spur schools and be assured of the Christian leadership we would that they have in any public school.

Next to be considered were our personal friends and business associates. What would we trade them for? Where could we equal them or find better? We like to feel that our family has many friends here in Spur that will stick through thick and thin—that we can call on in times of need and rejoice with in times of good fortune. We like to believe that our business associates are unanimously honest, upright Christian businessmen, giving a full measure and running over. Where could they be matched?

And then finally, we considered our means of making a living in Spur. We came to Spur right out of journalism school, still wet behind the ears, having been raised in a big city. The good businessmen of Spur have continually offered us encouragement in times of disheartenment. They have tolerated our mistakes and lack of experience and know-how. They have carried us on their backs when funds were low. They have afforded us, through advertising and commercial printing a good livelihood for eight years. Where could they, as a whole, be matched?

During our eight years here we have weathered with Spur the years of drought. We have seen political skirmishes on both the city and county level. We have seen in our eight short years here new businesses come and old businesses go. We have seen our little city torn almost assunder by internal differences, only to come back with a united front when unity was needed. We have grown from a family of two to a family of six.

We feel that Spur has passed the crises, both economically and politically—and the two are very definitely connected in a small, agriculture city—and is now in store for eventual recovery on both fronts. We feel that the strength of unity will soon come to have a new meaning to citizens of Spur, having seen the futility and unpleasantness of internal division. With the beginning of a new political and civic perspective, we believe that the economy of our little city will reflect a stability that cannot accompany a community pitted against itself.

## FFA Chapter Buys Registered Flock

The Spur High School FFA chapter this year received a cash grant of \$125 from the Sears-Roebuck Company to be used in its livestock breeding program.

The grant is made each year to an Area I chapter. Spur drew the allotment from the Lubbock district for this year.

Bill Gregory, chapter advisor, states that the chapter decided to put enough money with the grant to purchase a breeding flock of registered Southdown sheep. The boys put \$250 out of the local chapter treasury with the \$125 and purchased one ram and ten ewes—all registered Southdowns.

Gregory reports that this is one of the few flocks of its kind in all West Texas. The flock is currently being kept at the chapter project barns on the campus. He states that they are available for weed grazing to anyone who has a fenced-in place to graze them.

The flock will be used in lab work, wool judging, etc. It is the first chapter breeding project ever to be had by the local chapter.

The impressive years of a child's life are those from one to seven. It is during these years that personality is conceived and bred and those impressions that last longest and determine "how the tree is bent" are imprinted and implanted to make the child what he is PERSONALLY.

What does the child remember longest and with fondest memory about you, his parent? Experts tell us that he remembers "our romping with him on the floor while he rides for his horse! He remembers the times we played ball with him! He remembers when we went fishing with him! He remembers when we went on a picnic or went swimming! The times we had fun together."

It is such a privilege to be a parent during this fast moving age and it is equally a wholesome sign when parents and children enjoy each other! Nothing but healthy personalities could possibly develop from happy family participation.

Happy parents make happy children and happy children make happy teachers. Happy children and happy teachers make happy school rooms!

Happiness, happiness, happiness is a state of the mind, mental health.

Dr. James L. Hymes Jr. of George Peabody College for Teachers from his book, "Behavior and Misbehavior; a Teacher's Guide to Action", has the following quotes: "Discipline is habit. Habit is conduct that runs true. By example and exposure parents cause children to form habits, good or bad as they may be. Good habits make the actions responses that run the child's personality. # Reese McNeill Elected Mayor With 244 Votes

## Two Spur Youths Win Tennessee Trip

Spur FFA Chapter members Kent Morgan and Robert Rex Robinson, and their advisor, Bill Gregory, left Spur yesterday for Nashville, Tenn. on an educational tour and to visit the Grand Ole Opry.

As freshmen last Spring, the two boys won the trip by selling subscriptions to the Farm and Ranch magazine.

The trip will last six days and will be made via special Greyhound bus. They will return to Spur next Monday.

Spur was one of only four schools in West Texas to qualify more than one boy for the free trip. Gregory is one of two ag teachers accompanying the 30 boys.

In charge of the entire trip and contest is Pat Patterson, circulation manager of the Farm and Ranch magazine.

## Gabriel Gets 138 In Special Election; Mayor - Elect Makes Public Statement

Reese McNeill was elected mayor of Spur Tuesday in a special election.

McNeill tallied 244 votes on the straight write-in election, besting George Gabriel's 138. Other votes were cast in a bare springing—two for Lawis Lee and one each for Roy Stovall, C. P. Seudder, Jackson East, Bill Glenn and Spencer Campbell.

The election, believed to have been the only one in Spur's history where there were no candidates on the ballot, shaped into a McNeill-Gabriel race last week end, following a published statement by Robert Lewis that he was not a candidate. However, both McNeill and Gabriel had refused to place their names on the ballot and neither openly claimed to be a candidate.

The results of the election were canvassed immediately after the results were reported by Election Judge A. Z. Hays. Mayor Pro Tem C. P. Seudder stated yesterday that McNeill will be sworn in as soon as he is duly bonded and qualified. He stated that a special meeting will be called if McNeill so desires, and if not, McNeill may take office at the next regular meeting next Tuesday.

Commenting on McNeill's election Seudder said "Speaking for myself personally, and as Mayor Pro Tem of the City of Spur, I wish to congratulate Mr. Reese McNeill on the support he received from the voters of Spur in the Tuesday election."

"It is clear to me and to the rest of the council that Mr. McNeill is the people's choice to fill the office and we, the present council pledge to work with him as Mayor of our City toward the betterment and advancement of Spur."

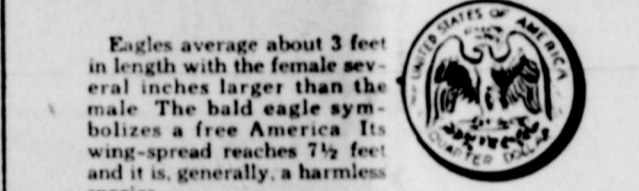

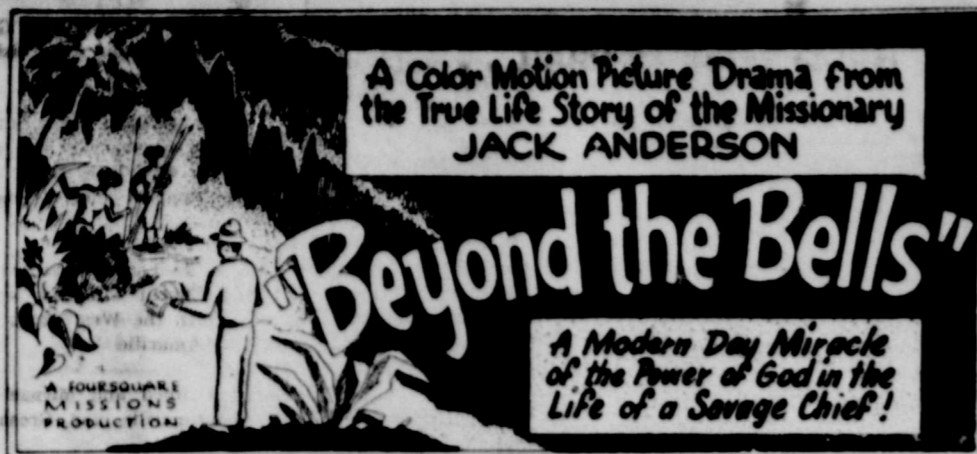

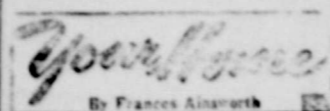

So give them your assistance and support your Spur Chamber of Commerce.



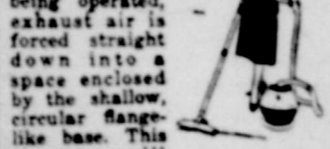

Make 3 diagonal slits in frankfurter, not quite through to bottom. Insert two pieces of cheese in each slit. Place frankfurters in buns. Wrap each frankfurter and bun loosely but securely in aluminum foil. Place on baking sheet and bake for 30 minutes.

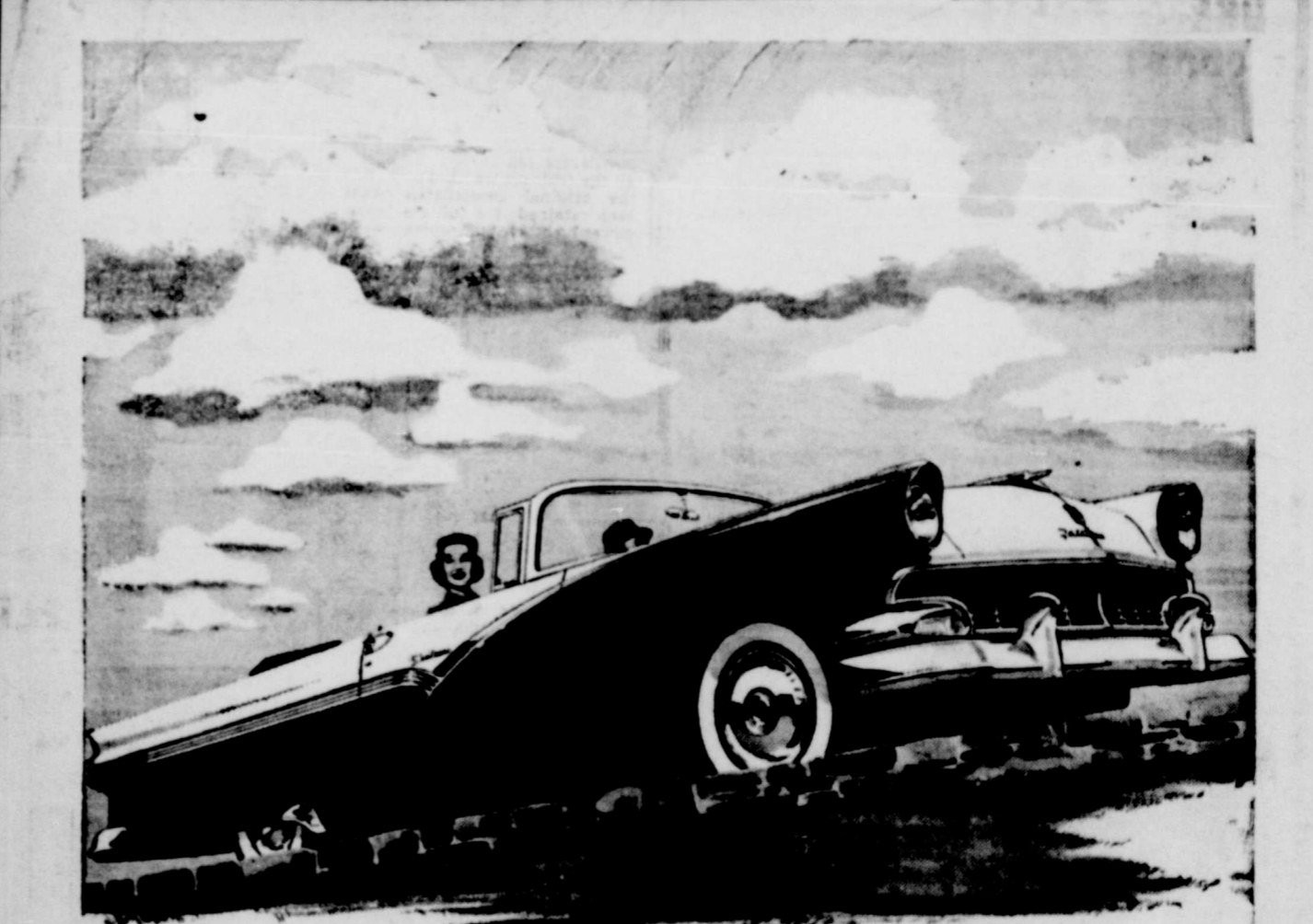

### AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENTS

Now that millions of people are taking their summer vacations and driving about the country, automobile accidents are occurring with increasing frequency. When involved in an accident, it is hard to keep your wits about you and know what to do.

It is therefore a good idea to plan in advance just what you would do in event of a smash-up. Here are a few simple rules that every driver should commit to memory:

1. Stop! Failure to stop can result in serious criminal consequences.

2. Render Aid. If anyone is injured: (1) Render first aid. (2) Stop bleeding. (3) Call a doctor or an ambulance or both. (4) Do not move an injured person in any way that could possibly add to his injury.

3. Protect the Scene from Further Damage. You may be liable for damages to approaching drivers, unless they are properly warned. If the highway is obstructed at night, have someone turn his headlight beams on the wrecked vehicles.

4. Call an Officer. Policemen, Highway Patrolmen, Sheriffs and their deputies are trained accident investigators whose testimony may be invaluable in establishing your civil claim for damages.

5. Gather Information. Write it Down. Don't trust your memory. Don't guess—be specific. Measure skid marks. Step off distances. Be sure to obtain names and addresses of witnesses. You are required by law to exhibit your driver's license to the other driver—and he must do the same.

6. Be Careful What You Say. Even if you feel you probably are to blame, it is best to make no admission. You may learn later that the other driver was equally at fault, or more so. Emotional comments can be misconstrued by others, or may be misquoted.

Whatever you say, make it factual.

7. See your Doctor if there is the slightest chance you may be injured. Serious injuries do not always result in immediate pain or bloodshed.

8. Consult Your Lawyer Immediately. The sooner your lawyer is brought into the matter, the better he can advise you and protect your rights. He can obtain statements from the witnesses while their memories are fresh and do many other things to insure that the true facts are preserved. Get your lawyer's advice before giving any interviews or statements to investigators or adjusters for the other side.

9. Inform Your Insurance Company Promptly. Failure to do so may void your policy.

10. Report the Accident to the Department of Public Safety. This is required by law if there is any injury, death, or total damages exceed \$25.00.

An official accident report form may be procured from the Police, Sheriff's Department, Highway Patrol, or State Department of

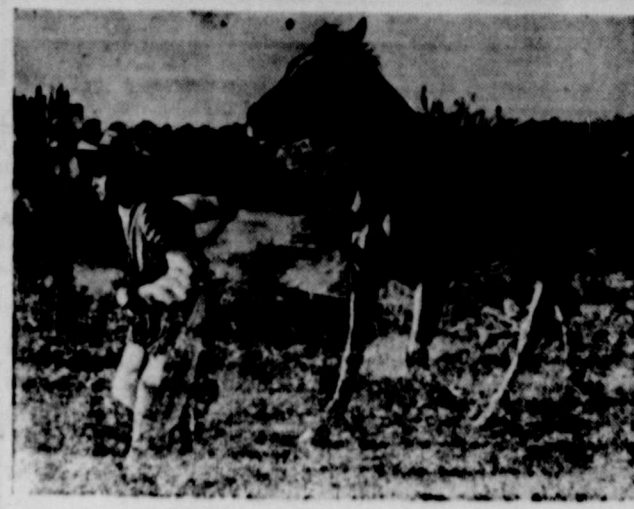
