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Whoa, Now!

The Democratic Primary is just a couple weeks away and politics will have to really snap to it to cause any real noise in the area. We find everything unusually quiet.

With the exception of a sheriff candidate, commissioner candidate or constable candidate handing us a card now and then, there is very little attention being paid to the coming primary.

We'll make a few guesses, anyway, not necessarily how we'll vote personally, but how we expect to see it all come out.

For governor, it looks to us like Ralph Yarborough is finally going to make it—even quoting another candidate "There ain't gonna be no run-off!"

We can do nothing but predict a victory for Judge Chapman in his two-man race for Associate Justice. We don't know his opponent, but we do know that he is as capable and desiring Christian man as we have ever known. With the courts of our land in hands as devoted and capable as the hands of Judge Chapman, American justice in both criminal and civil courts will continue to be a lighthouse throughout the world.

With all due respects to our friend Mac Brummett, we can't see much probability for him to unseat as competent and well-liked man as John Stapleton for District Attorney.

The sheriff's race—now there's the one to watch! We'll just have to play this one safe and predict a run-off between Johnny Koonsman and Sheriff Rogers.

We'll not take guesses at any but the Precinct 3 Commissioner's race. And here in Precinct 3 we'll predict Commissioner Watson to retain his seat, but we'll leave the possibility of a run-off.

And if the third time's the charm, maybe Roscoe McCombs will upset Constable Finch. As for the referendum issues, we see no point to be made or issue to be settled by any or all of them. We would even go on to say that they are an insult to the intelligence of the voters of the Democratic party in Texas.

Naturally, intergration to the extent some have visualized it, is difficult for many to accept. But to consider the issues to be "voted on", we can find nothing within them that would speed or deter intergration. If the constitution and the U. S. Supreme Court mean anything at all to the people of Texas, the No. 1 issue (see pertaining story this page) has no meaning at all. The ultimate would be either no schools at all or schools in direct contradiction to the supreme court.

Under No. 2, well, we understand the State already has laws preventing intermarriage of the whites and Negroes. No. 3 has been harped on already with millions of words and columns of newspaper space, and still we ask with many others—Just what is interposition? Does it mean civil war? Does it mean secession from the Union? Does it mean Texas telling Uncle Sam how things should be? If it will work on intergration, couldn't we make it work on income tax?

Howsoever, it's on the ballot and we'll all get to vote for or agin' them. But we still don't see what difference it'll make. 242 Dickens County Farmers Sign For Soil Bank; Dead Line Is July 20

Dickens County farmers 242 strong, had signed up for 1956 Soil Bank participation by 3 p. m. yesterday afternoon, states W. W. Gunn, county ASC office manager.

Gunn adds that this number includes both cotton and wheat agreements.

To get in the Soil Bank, county farmers must sign agreements at the ASC office by July 20. "When you sign an agreement with your County Committee and have cotton growing on the land, you must mow or plow it up by July 31," he reports.

Cotton farmers signed up so far will be entitled to an average of approximately \$600.00 per farm. An estimate was not made on wheat farms.

Gunn reminds farmers again

that if they sign an agreement to go into the Soil Bank, they must not graze or harvest any crop off soil bank land until after Jan. 1, 1957. Soil bank land must be kept free from cockleburrs, Johnson grass, Russian thistle (tumble weed) or bindweed. He adds that a farmer can plant the Soil Bank land in any of the small grains, but must not graze before Jan. 1, 1957.

Payments for Soil Bank participation will be made through the county ASC office as soon after July 31 as the signers can be processed.

Cotton Being Measured

Measuring crews for marketing quotas are now at work and have made a good start on county cotton farms. The County Committee urges farmers to cooperate in every way with the measurers to assure an accurate record. It is pointed out that these measurements are for marketing quotas, and that Soil Bank measurements will all be made after July 31.

Farm Safety Week

The President of the United States has proclaimed the week beginning July 22, 1956, as National Farm Safety Week, and requests all persons and organizations interested in farm life and welfare to join in this annual campaign to reduce the tragic loss of life from farm and rural accidents.

65 Are Added To "Blood Bank"; Three Days Left

The annual blood-typing program being sponsored by the local VFW Auxiliary has added 65 members to the "Walking Blood Bank" of the Spur Memorial Hospital, reports Mrs. E. B. Blumberg.

The free blood-typing service continues through Saturday and many more members are expected. The remaining schedule of the week-long project is as follows:

Thursday, July 12, 6 to 8 p. m. Friday, July 13, 3 to 5 p. m. Saturday, July 14, 3 to 6 p. m.

The service is done by experienced lab personnel assisted by members of the auxiliary. It includes typing, filing, and furnishing a blood type card.

The program was initiated last year by the auxiliary and over 200 area folks answered the call. The two-fold purpose of the program, states Mrs. Blumberg, is to have blood types on file in case of accident or illness of the one typed, and to have of file of potential donors when blood is needed by someone else. However, she points out that the use of blood from donors is purely voluntary.

Primary Ballots Now Available to Absentee Voters

No. 2 is for or against specific legislation perfecting State laws against intermarriage between white persons and negroes.

No. 3 is for or against the use of interposition to halt illegal Federal encroachment.

Absentee balloting will continue up until three days before the election.

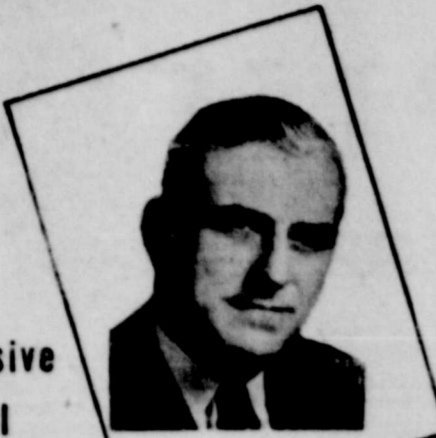
SWIMMING PARTY
