Of this deficit, the hospital ac

The water fund showed the largest profit for the year, netting the city \$9,724.29. The electric department showed a profit of \$1,069.49, and the gas department showed a deficit of \$1.835.

Compared with the budget set up for the city last June by ex-Mayor Walter Gruben and the city council, the electric fund fell shortest in meeting expectations. The budget anticipated a profit of \$18,337.00 on a gross revenue of \$78,200. The actual gross revenue was \$74,481.88.

The 1954-55 consolidated statement showed a net deficit of \$13.098.74.

The largest deviation from the budget was in the anticipated ex penditure in the electric department. The budget called for an expenditure of \$59.862.48, while this year's stateament shows an expenditure of \$73,412.39-a difference of over \$13,000.
