

Every qualified voter residing in the city limits of Spur, Post, Crosbyton or Ralls, who owns either real or personal property, is eligible to vote in this election.

WHAT?

This is the Confirmation Election. This election confirms the action taken by the State Board of Water Engineers in creating the White River Water Control and Improvement District, and approves the five-man board of directors temporarily appointed by the State Board.

HOW?

By at this time confirming the water district, the voters of Spur, Ralls, Post and Crosbyton will authorize the directors to continue plans with the engineers and fiscal agents. If this election carries, at a later date the voters will have the opportunity to vote on the necessary bond issue and water contracts. The preliminary work is completed – now we are ready for the first big step as voters the Confirmation Election.

WHY?

A group of citizens from Spur, Post, Crosbyton and Ralls have, for many months now, been studying the municipal water resourses of the four cities. Careful study of the municipalities and the possibility of impounding surface water has revealed it to be both feasible and economically sound for the four cities to form a water district and erect a dam across White River in southeast Crosby County to create a 30,000-acre-ft. lake, complete with filter plant and pipe lines to the four cities.

Perhaps Spur's "Why" for the water district is unique from the other three cities. Our City Council reports that Spur is in no immediate danger of running out of water. However, any considerable growth in Spur, or a continuation of current drouth conditions could alter this "plentiful water" situation in a matter of months. Also, if Spur is ever to attract industry of any kind, an ample surface water supply will be a major consideration. Spur's unique need, however, is in water Quality more than water Quantity. According to recent reports from both the U.S. Dept. of Health and the Texas State Health Dept., Spur's water is far above the maximum solids and florine content recommended for human consumption. Many Spur families are now spending from \$50 to \$100 per year for bottled drinking water and water softeners. Spur children and adults alike now carry unsightly stains on their teeth caused by Spur water. Lake water will also mean family savings in plumbing repairs. Jaundry, some water beaters in plumbing repairs, laundry soaps, water heaters washing machines, etc., plus a conveniently located lake for recreational use.





> qualified by saying that you should not proceed, cross or turn onto the through street until you can do so without interfering with oncoming traffic. In othe: words, if an approaching car vill arrive within the intersection before you are completely clear, wait just a little longer. The same rules apply to entering a highway from a side road containing a stop

Many drivers violate the rules of right of way covering left-hand turns at intersections. When turning, left you should always be on from the opposite direction, althrough before completing your turn. Even when the intersection is cleared, do not pass through before completing your turn. Even when the intersection is cleared, do not proceed unless other oncoming traffic is far enough away to be able to see your signal and slow down to allow you to turn with safety to all concern-

Stay in the inside lane until your left-hand is entirely completed, and only then move gradually over to the right-hand lane if you wish. When turning right, stay in the right-hand lane at all times. Do not swing wide into the center lane, as to do so is unnes-

sary, unlawful and dangerous. Many detailed rules and suggestions for safe driving are included in the official "Texas Driving Handbook" which is available to any person requesting same from the Texas Department of Public Safety, Drivers License Division, Austin, Texas.
