what might be called a master plan for the future of Spur, we call your attention to conditions that exist in our schools and suggest a possible solution.

We'll state the possible solution first and then attempt to analize the problem: For the mutual benefit of all concerned, the public schools of Dickens and Girard should be consolidated with Spur.

This consolidation should come about through close harmony between the patrons, boards, faculties and students of the three the Reagan Motor Co.

Already Dickens has lost its high school. Not because of any ber of students there and the economic and scholastic advantages of consolidation. These advantages could still be further advanced consolidating the lower grades Dickens school with Spur.

At present a goodly number of Dickens parents are transferring their children to the Spur schools to give them the advantages of larger-school facilities and an opportunity to take courses that cannot be offered in the smaller

Very similiar conditions exist down at Girard, except there a high school is still maintained.

At Girard a very small number of high school scholastic necessitate the maintenance of high school facilities while just 12 miles from them is a high school plant that could absorb these students Girard and Dickens students therefore, we believe, could ob tain scholastic benefits from at-
