Cotton Plans Ready For PCG

Concrete recommendations of the panel of cotton experts from all phases of the industry, which met in Lubbock in November at a Short Staple Research Conference, have been announced by the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. Joe Long of Dickens County said this week.

The organization will use these recommendations in formulating a long range and immediate program for improvement of cotton produced and marketed on the South Plains. They will be presented to the directors at the P. C. G.'s January meeting.

George W. Pfeiffenberger, Executive Vice-President of the PCG, explained the recommendations were made in brief form at the conclusion of the research meeting last November. Since then various chairmen of the panel have worked out details on the recommendations and submitted them to the PCG.

Genetics and Breeding recommendations were broken down into fields of cotton improvement research which needs to be emphasized. These include work on fiber properties, boll types, earliness and disease resistance, and their reaction to environment.

In connection with this phase, Dr. Henry Barker, Washington, D. C., with the U. S. Department of Agriculture, announced that a cotton geneticist will be assigned to work on these problems at the Lubbock Experiment Station as soon as a qualified person is located.

D. F. C. Is Awarded To Widow Of Late Lt. Henry Parsons

First Lt. Henry T. Parsons Friday was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross in a posthumous ceremony for the dead flier.

His widow, who now lives in Portales, N. M., was given the medal by Brig. Gen. William W. Momyer. Parsons' parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lem Parsons, live in Spur, Texas.

Mr. and Mrs. Parsons attended the ceremony in honor of their son on Friday, December 21st at Clovis.

Parsons was stationed at Shaw Air Force Base, S. C., and he and two other Air Force men were killed last year when Parsons' RF 94F was in collision with a T-33 trainer.

The citation said the DFC was given Parsons for his heroism while partaking in 1955 air exercises "under extremely hazardous conditions, but did not amplify."

Neither his widow nor General Momyer knew what Parsons had done to merit award of the DFC, they said. The medal was sent to Clovis Air Force Base for presentation because it is the closest one to the widow's residence.

Water District Board Agrees On 8 1/2 Sections For White River Lake

The directors and committees of the White River Water Control and Improvement District met in Ralls on Dec. 20. The board adopted a recommendation from the land committee calling for the purchase of approximately eight and a half sections of land and for all shoreline and adjacent land of the lake to be owned and controlled by the district.

Following the adoption of this recommendation the land committee was instructed to proceed with negotiations for obtaining options on the land.

Ransom Galloway of Henry, Seay and Black, the district's fiscal agent, reported that as soon as the cost of land estimate could be obtained, Mr. Freeze could complete the preliminary estimates and could be presented to the board for approval.

Efforts are being made to have this information ready by Jan. 15 for board approval, and then to call for the exclusion hearing on or about Feb. 15.

The land committee members present were M. A. McLaughlin and Powell Shyles.

Tom Bouchier, president of the board, appointed George Samson, Jim Cox, Cap McNeill and Lynn Buzbee to work as a committee to obtain information on concessions and recreation.

The next meeting was set for Jan. 17 at 6:30 p. m. in Post.

Texas Don't Know Traffic Laws; Seven Misconceptions Listed

The past eighteen years experience of the Texas Safety Association reveals that many Texas drivers and pedestrians have misconceptions about traffic laws. Here are seven such misconceptions—how is your score?

1. The driver on the right always has the right-of-way at an intersection. Not so; Texas law states that the car entering the intersection first has the right-of-way. When two cars approach the intersection from different directions at approximately the same time the driver of the vehicle on the left shall yield the right-of-way to the vehicle on the right.

2. Pedestrians must yield to cars at intersections where there are no traffic lights. Wrong! The law gives pedestrians the right-of-way, with certain limitations, at all marked crosswalks.

3. When a school bus stops to pick up or discharge children, you have to stop if you are behind it and traveling in the same direction. This is only partly correct. Texas law requires you to stop in such cases no matter in which direction you are driving.

4. You don't have to stop on yellow when a traffic signal is changing from green to red. That's wrong! The Caution, or yellow light is a signal that the red or Stop signal will be exhibited immediately thereafter and vehicular traffic shall not enter or be crossing the intersection when the red or Stop signal is exhibited.

5. You can make a turn any time as long as you signal. That's incorrect. To make a turn, you have to be in the proper lane and you are required to signal at least 100 feet before you turn.

SCS To Step Up Plains Program

State Conservationist H. N. Smith of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service today announced plans to take quick action to put into effect the stepped-up Great Plains program in this state.

Smith said that he has called a conference of state leaders of agricultural programs and agencies in Texas for Jan. 11 at College Station to blue-print the plan of action on the farm and range lands of the 35 counties in that portion of the state.

Administrative responsibility for and leadership in the Great Plains program was recently placed on the Soil Conservation Service by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson.

Smith pointed out that Secretary Benson's order provided for the combining of the resources of the Department of Agriculture's various agencies in a step-by-step process for making long-time adjustments in land use, cropping systems, and in the treatment of cultivated lands and range, under the climatic hazards of the Great Plains.

The Great Plains program, brought into being by Public Law 1021 only last August, is designed to give farmers and ranchers, in the Great Plains area of the 10 involved states, both immediate and long-range help in the use of their within its capabilities. Smith pointed out.

He explained that Public Law 1021 authorized an appropriation of not over \$150 million for a 15-year period. Funds to aid farmers and ranchers are expected to be available after July 1, 1957. Expenditures may not exceed \$25 million in any one year.

The program will apply in counties to be designated by the Secretary of Agriculture in portions of Colorado, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Texas, and Wyoming. The continued drought in these states has emphasized the need for such a program to help develop a more stable farm and ranch economy in this region," Smith said.

Wind erosion conditions in the Great Plains area of Texas are serious with 403,000 acres damaged during October and November. Approximately 6,500,000 acres in a 68 county area of north-west Texas are in condition to be damaged by wind erosion this winter and spring. Smith announced.

Ratliff Takes Oath As District Judge

W-Texas Shows Building Boom

Eighty-seven West Texas cities experienced a construction boom in 1956 that totaled almost 400 million dollars, according to a survey conducted by "West Texas Today," the monthly publication of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Estimates for 1957 indicate that the boom will continue, and probably surpass that recorded in the 12 months preceding. Results of the survey are published in the December issue of the magazine.

Construction dollars spent in the 87 cities from November 1, 1955, to November 1, 1956, totaled \$385,996,316. More than half of the money was spent for construction of residential dwellings. Residential construction totaled \$202,464,510.

Commercial construction, which totaled almost 80 million dollars, accounted for the second largest portion of each construction dollar. New schools, which cost more than 30 million dollars, ranked third in money spent on construction.

Other major projects which claimed a large percentage of each construction dollar were: sewer and water facilities, 27 million dollars; street construction and paving, 14 million; state and federal buildings, nearly seven million; and city and county buildings, more than five million.

In addition, approximately two million dollars was spent on church construction. Miscellaneous types of construction accounted for more than 17 million dollars.
