Way Back When

"Not expecting to be in a cart, or flood either, I was not dressed suitably for this journey, my attire being a light lawn dress, with lace yoke and sleeves, high topped shoes which soon filled with water, and a white chip straw sailor hat with a flowering green sash. The sash soon faded and dripping wet made streaks of green that covered my dress."

"Good fortune smiled on me, however, for we got into Dickens City at 2:00 a. m. under cover of

darkness." The next day I went to Cottonwood where I met the trustees; J. M. Jones, Will Austin, and W. R. Stafford. After talking to the trustees I learned they had planned for a summer school and wanted me to begin teaching at once. I was worn out and blistered from my journey. The next night I received another shock when I found the good ladies of Cottonwood had planned a musical and an elaborate supper in my honor, or you might say to break in the new 'school marm'."

Since the freighters were gone to Quanah for supplies, and did not return with coal-oil, this musical was carried on by the light of the moon, which was again in my favor. I shall never forget had the ladies furnished cream (no face lotions then) in trying to relieve my blisters, and made me presentable for the musical, which was held at the Halle farm, (the present Ted McInroe home). Two of the most pleasant years of my life were spent in this fine community.

"I shall name a few pupils I had that I can locate now: Gussie Stafford, (Mrs. Author Sterns, Plainview), Lillie Hext, now Mrs. Joe Rose of the Duncan Flat Community, Mrs. Herman Marshall and Mrs. Charlie Brooks of Roaring Springs (nieces of C. C. Hall), and Sydney Smith of Shamrock, Texas. Mrs. John Smith is the nearest one who was a patron of this school." Unquote. Later Mrs. Green had as trustees; George Loyd and Mr. P. J. Hext.

The school where Mrs. Green taught was a big one-room, about an 18x20' building. After the first year another room was added and a primary teacher hired for part of the year, until spring, when the big boys began dropping out to plow. Then the trustees ask Miss Myra if she thought she could handle the whole school. She did and drew a larger salary. The salaries were small those days, usually being from \$35.00 to \$40.00 per month. Though that was off-set since board, room, and other expenses were nominal and in keeping with the salary paid. Board and room ranged from \$6.00 to \$10.00 per month. The school-room work, generally speaking, was heavy and difficult, according to Mrs. Green. There was no such thing as a graded school system, but the patrons were wonderful in their friendly co-operation and helpful encouragement.

Mrs. Green recalls one day the school house caught fire and was merely burning away in the roof. She was frantic since there was no water at all at the school. Water was hauled from Cottonwood (Afton) in a barrel, and the barrel happened to be there and he stood on the desk and took his pocket knife and cut a large hole in the shingles in a circle around the fire. And the fire fell on the floor and was stomped out. This man was George Davis, and he saved the day and the school house.

Hog producers are advised by Extension Economist John G. McHaney to keep a close watch on future production trends. On the other hand, a package left on the seat of a bus is "mis-laid" rather than lost. In one southern state, a pocketbook left in a barbershop by a customer was held to have been "left", not "lost". The barber was arrested and convicted of larceny when he spent the money that was in it.

Under the law the finder of either lost or mislaid property should make a "reasonable effort" to find the real owner.

When articles are left on a train or bus, in a public hotel room, or even when dropped on a shop floor, under circumstances indicating that the true owner will later return to claim them, such items are not considered lost. The proper custodian to hold them for the owners return would be the proprietor or other person in charge.

Remaining unclaimed, the property sometimes goes to this custodian, sometimes to the finder. The distinction here appears to be whether the place it is found is private or semi-private, or a place used by the general public.

WE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SPUR, TEXAS RECOMMEND

THAT THE CITIZENS OF SPUR VOTE

FOR

authorizing the City Council of the City of Spur, Texas, to lease the lighting and electric distribution system and plant owned by the City of Spur for a cash rental of \$22,500 per year for a period of 40 years.

First, this is a request that all qualified persons vote in the City election May 18th. The issue is too important to be decided by a light vote.

None of us propose to tell you how you should vote. We do want you to know the facts upon which we have called this election.

This Lease proposal is the result of many months of study and negotiation, with the West Texas Utilities Company and others in an attempt to obtain cheaper fuel, or other sources of power or electricity. We regret that it falls to our lot to recommend leasing the City electric system. It has stood as a symbol of our independence and self sufficiency, but it is becoming a hollow symbol.

At the same time, and over the 28 years the City Plant has been in existence, the controversy of City Plant versus Utilities has been a major source of disagreement, dissension and distrust in our community. As a unified people we have never "fought" the Utility Company - rather, we have fought one another.

Increasing costs of all elements that go into production of electricity in our plant, and no way to pass these costs on to the consumer in higher rates have brought us to the point of little return on the investment and no profits with which to meet bond and interest payments. The

alternatives are, cheaper fuel, a larger proportion of the business, or lease of the system.

We have never had the proportion of the business that we should expect our citizens to give their City electric system. In that time we have never succeeded in getting natural gas—the cheaper fuel we need. If we do not lease, we can meet bond and interest payments on the system only by taxation or increased electric rates. Our taxes need to be reduced, not increased, and our electric rates are already higher than towns in this area. We can recommend neither of these courses.

Copies of the proposed lease agreement are in the City Office. A summary is printed below.

We asked West Texas Utilities personnel to let us make this decision without interference or pressure. We also asked that no individual or group receive any commission, payment or compensation of any kind if the lease were made. We believe they have kept this agreement.

We have not signed a lease agreement—and we are still negotiating to make this the best lease we can get. The issue is this: Will you vote for a lease of \$900,000.00 over the next 40 years, plus franchise tax of over \$100,000.00 over that period, or do you vote that we keep a plant and system that is no longer making the profit to meet bond and interest needs?

HERE IS A BRIEF CONDENSATION OF THE PROPOSED CONTRACT:

A Condensation of the PROPOSED LEASE CONTRACT

between the City of Spur and the West Texas Utilities Company.

(The proposed lease contract, in double spaced typewriting, covers 18 legal size pages. The following is a mere condensation of the contract, and is an attempt to cover the high lights and basic provisions. Complete copies of the contract are on file at the City office and are open to inspection to all persons who are interested in all of the exact details.)

PROPERTY COVERED BY THE LEASE: All of the properties comprising the City's electric generating plant and distribution system, including land, buildings and machinery, except such items which are specifically excepted from the lease.

PROPERTY SPECIFICALLY EXCEPTED AND NOT COVERED BY LEASE: Cash, bills, notes and accounts receivable as of the effective date of the lease; all office furniture, fixtures, equipment and office supplies; all automobiles and trucks; the new Enterprise engine and all appurtenances thereto; all traffic sig-

nal lights; the sheet metal covered building located behind the main plant building; all electric operating material and supplies on hand, including fuel and lubricating oils; and all income from minerals and royalties and leases on minerals in connection with the City's properties.

RIGHTS GRANTED BY THE COMPANY: The right to operate and maintain the leased property within the City and the right to use the streets and alleys and other public ways of the City for the operation of an electric distribution system to serve the electric needs and requirements of the inhabitants of the City.

TERM OF THE LEASE: Forty (40) years.

CONSIDERATION TO BE PAID BY COMPANY TO CITY: The sum of \$22,500.00 per year, plus a franchise tax payment amounting to two percent (2%) of the sum total of the annual revenue received by the Company from its domestic and commercial customers in the City of Spur, but such franchise tax is not to be paid on revenues received for services provided for industrial, municipal or other governmental uses. Such annual rental of \$22,

500.00 and such franchise tax are to be paid in equal monthly installments throughout the 40 years term of the lease contract, making each monthly installment the sum of \$1,875.00 (for rental) plus the proper sum for franchise tax.

OBLIGATIONS CONCERNING REVENUE BONDS AGAINST THE CITY'S SYSTEM: City obligates itself to pay such bonds and the interest thereon as they fall due, with the Company agreeing, however, that if any bond or interest is not paid at maturity or if any bonds should be accelerated due to any default or act on the part of the City, Company will have the right to pay any and all of such matured bonds and interest and accelerated bonds, and Company will have the right to pay any judgment which might be procured against City so that the lease properties will not be in jeopardy; and with it being agreed that if the Company does take up and pay off any judgment or bonds or interest, on which City may have defaulted, then, in addition to having the right to be repaid by City, Company will have the right

to charge its actual interest cost on bonds or borrowed money so that Company will not lose on such bonds, either by way of corpus or because of interest; and in such events, Company will have the right to withhold one-half of the rentals and franchise taxes due the City under the lease, as same fall due, in order to reimburse itself.

CUSTOMER DEPOSITS: City shall pay to Company within 30 days after lease the amount of all refundable deposits, and Company assumes the liability to refund such deposits.

AGREEMENTS AS TO BOOKS AND RECORDS: City to furnish Company with a list of depositors, and City to make available to Company all records and other data as might be useful to the company in setting up its books of accounts on the leased property, with same to be done with due regards to the convenience of the City.

OTHER OBLIGATIONS OF COMPANY: Company will merge the two distribution systems and keep it in good working order so as to render customers in Spur adequate electric service at all

times. Company will carry insurance on the leased property. Company will pay taxes to the city on all of its property, except the lease property. Company will place in effect its standard rates for electric services. None of these rates are higher than present rates. Some are lower. Average: 8% lower.

POWER FOR MUNICIPAL OPERATIONS: City will purchase electric service from the Company.

DISPOSITION OF CITY'S DIESEL ENGINES: Company shall maintain such engines as are covered by lease until Company has either put in new generating equipment or has provided two-way transmission line service to Spur, at which time the Company may call upon the City to sell or otherwise dispose of such diesel engines and City shall have 12 months to sell or dispose of same.

RIGHTS AT THE END OF THE 40 YEAR LEASE TERM: At the end of the 40 years period, the City shall have the option to acquire the leased properties by reimbursing Company for the agreed value of Company's portion of the merged distribution

system at the date of the lease and for all expenditures made by the Company thereafter on the system, less a sum equal to an annual rate of depreciation of two and one-half percent per year. Or if the City does not elect to acquire the leased properties, the company will have the option to extend the lease agreement for an additional term at a cash rental to be then agreed upon by the City and the Company, or the Company, in lieu of such lease extension, may pay the City a cash consideration in an amount to be then agreed upon for full and final purchase of the City's assets in the merged electric system as of that date, and if the City and the Company cannot agree on the amount of cash consideration, same shall be established by an inventory and appraisal of the leased property by independent engineers or by a disinterested committee of three persons, the details of the selection of which are provided for in the lease contract.

2 tablespoons cold water	1 teaspoon grated lime rind
3 egg yolks	Few drops green food coloring
1/3 cup lime juice	1 baked 9-inch pie shell, chilled
1/4 teaspoon salt	
1/2 cup sugar	
3 egg whites	
1/2 cup cream, whipped and sweetened	
3/4 cup Baker's Angel Flake Coconut, plain or toasted	

Combine gelatin and cold water in mixing bowl; mix well. Beat egg yolks until light. Add lime juice, salt, and 1/2 cup sugar. Cook in double boiler over hot, not boiling, water until thickened. Pour over gelatin and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Chill until slightly thickened.

GARBAGE & TRASH REGULATIONS

The present rate of garbage and trash disposal is exceptionally high. The City is called on to remove many large dead trees, and the weed and trash accumulations are at an all time high. Help the disposal crew by complying with the following regulations:

- All garbage and trash must be burned at the time placed in the barrel so that cans and unburnable refuse will collect in the bottom.
- All flowers, grass, and weeds which the residents wants hauled as trash must be piled at the side of the garbage barrel so that it can be picked up with a fork.

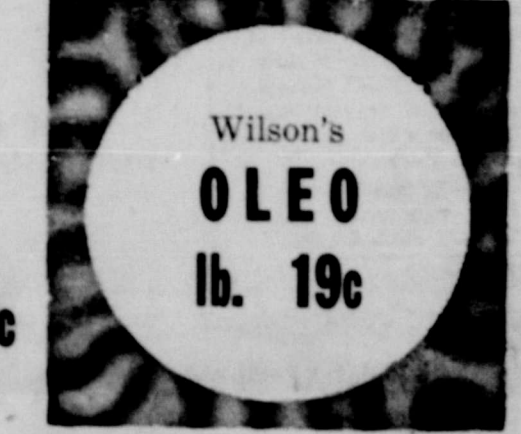

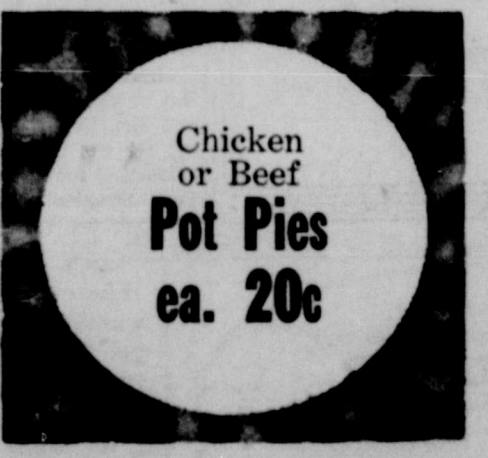
