Lease Election Carries

Pledges Sought To Build Stadium For Spur Little, Pony Leagues

Plans were begun here Monday evening for the construction of a permanent stadium for the Spur Little League and Pony League.

About 40 interested persons met at the high school to elect new league commissioners and start the ball rolling toward raising funds for the stadium. Commissioners elected are R. L. Walker, John Green and Joe Watson.

The Spur school board has authorized the use of the school property west of the high school building for the stadium.

The newly-elected league officials began at once to obtain

pledges and donations toward the construction of the stadium. By yesterday afternoon the trio had cash and pledges totaling over \$1,000. However, they say that at least another \$1,000 is needed to guarantee the youths a first class, properly lighted stadium.

Meeting Next Monday

Supporters of the project will hold another meeting next Monday evening at 8 o'clock at the high school study hall to make further plans. The commissioners hope to have sufficient funds collected or pledged by that time. They will not be able to contact everyone who is interested in the stadium, so ask that donations or pledges be mailed or brought to the Texas Spur office or handed to one of them personally.

Prospective team members are working out nearly every day on Spur's vacant lots, just waiting for the opportunity to get the season underway. It is hoped that this year's league plans will be ready by Monday night's meeting.

Veterans Plan May 30 Program

Memorial Day services will be held at the grave of the unknown soldier in the Spur cemetery on May 30 sponsored jointly by the local VFW and American Legion posts.

The Dickens County minister's association and the ladies' auxiliaries of both posts will also assist in the Memorial service which will begin at 11 a. m.

Members of the two veterans' organizations also will visit and place flags on all veterans' graves in Dickens County and Girard.

All veterans, families and loved ones of veterans are invited and urged to attend this service.

281-128 Vote Okeys W. T. U. Proposal

The voters of Spur voted 281 to 128 last Saturday in favor of leasing the city light plant and electrical distribution system to West Texas Utilities company.

The over-2-to-1 approval of the proposal gave the city council the go-ahead on negotiations with the utilities company to get the city out of the electricity business for at least the next 40 years. The proposal calls for an annual rental of \$22,500, plus a 2% franchise tax and other considerations.

It is reported that the city is now working toward an agreement with the holders of bonds against the plant and the lease agreement will be consummated at an early date.

Area Soaked By Two More Inches

Another two inches of rain at the Spur experiment station in the past week boosts the month's total to 4.40.

Last Friday 1.90 inches flooded the area and brought both Docum and Duck creeks out of their banks.

Early Wednesday morning a spectacular electrical storm entertained area folks who would get up and watch it. The station reported only .18 of moisture while to the south, east and north of town up to one inch was reported.

This morning a brief shower followed on the heels of a spring norther that arrived shortly before midnight.

MIN. SOIL TEMP. AT 61

The experiment station reports that the minimum soil temperature average for the last ten days is 61 degrees at a six-inch depth. At 12 inches it is 63 degrees.

The average at six inches for this week is 63 degrees. A minimum soil temperature of at least 60 degrees is considered planting time for cotton.

LIGHT PLANT WHISTLE IS TORNADO WARNING

The City of Spur has authorized the use of the air whistle at the city light plant to be used as a local tornado warning, reports Mayor Reese McNeill.

On occasion the fire whistle has been used, but the mayor states that a dual meaning of the fire alarm is confusing and could cause undue complications.

Most folks will remember the air whistle as the one that used to be blown at noon each day.

Water Board Plans Possible Joint Bond, Contract Election

Directors and board members of the White River Municipal Water District met with bondsman, Ransom Galloway, at a regular meeting in the Post City Hall, Thursday night, May 17.

It was brought out that the engineer's estimate of \$3.5 million should stand. However, to properly handle any future release of cost figures, the appointment of a publicity committee in recent estimates and reports, was discussed. It was noted that figures have been wrong and the committee wants all future news releases to be as accurate as possible and all future estimates on costs will be given careful consideration and examination before they are released.

The land committee had met the previous Thursday and reported favorable negotiations are underway with land owners. However, the committee was instructed to submit in writing to the land owners a final proposition, indicating that settlement time is at hand.

The bond election and the water contract election were discussed, along with the possibility of holding the two at the same time. Some definite plans on the two elections are expected to be announced in June, with the elections possibly in July or August.

Ransom Galloway presented a water contract of another city to the board which was cited as being very "tough" legally, but a "darn good contract." Brief discussion was held about the contract and a condensed form was passed out to the members to take home and read since the contract was so complicated.

Lynn Buzbee reported on a recent survey conducted by the Spur Chamber of Commerce concerning its census and it was pointed out that the present 12 inch pipe allowed for Spur would not be big enough to accommodate its population and that Spur would need a 16 inch pipe for its present and future needs. The board agreed to submit this proposal to the engineers and to act upon their price estimation for

this increase accordingly. The overall price increase for this change would be small and the board will probably authorize the change at the next meeting.

The board received letters of resignation from Jack Roberts and J. P. Cox which were prompted by a state law which prohibits them from serving as city officials and on the WRMD at the same time. Two new directors were appointed.

The equalization board will meet in Crosbyton at 2 p. m. on Thursday, May 30, with the secretary and president and the next general meeting of the board will be in Spur on June 20.

There is no way to "measure" by A, B, C, D, etc. or by a percentage of 100 what and how much these children learned. I wish to pose no one would want to ruin this part of a music program and speech program by trying to place an abominable grade on the thing.

From some statistics appearing in the National Parent Teacher Magazine just recently we have these thought provoking figures. "Children learn: 10 percent of what they hear; 70 percent of what they see; and 90 percent of what they do."

It is the solemn duty of every tax payer in Spur Independent School District to be able to evaluate what he is getting for his tax dollar in the form of learning for his child, and if he doesn't have a child, what is his tax dollar buying in education for his neighbor's child?

Let each of us, this sunny summer, dedicate some time (30 minutes a week) to a seeking of information and an exploration of some of the "straws that break the camel's back" in the education of our children. Some of the "straws" we need to study are:

1. Is my child ready to learn?
2. What does the school do to motivate my child to develop a healthy personality?
3. What does the school provide for my child in these fields: child art and crafts, speech, dramatics, elementary science, educational games, elementary physical education and visual education.
4. Is there a fairer and better

way to evaluate pupil progress than giving A B C's and 100's etc? What do other up-to-date schools do about grading? What do the doctors in education recommend on grading and reporting to parents? Let's read, talk, explore ideas so that we can more intelligently discuss and decide what is good for our children in education! Never Rest 'Till Spur Schools are Best!

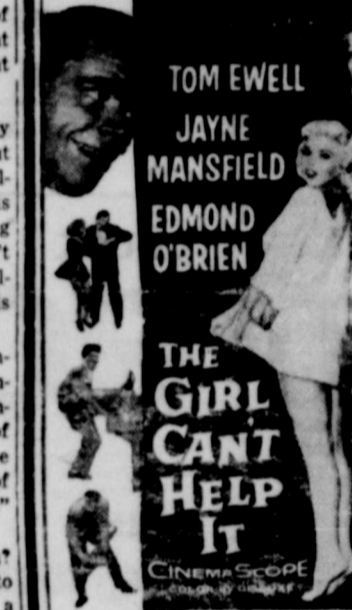

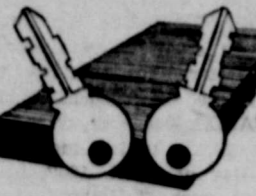

Way Back When

Mrs. Green later taught school in the Flag Springs community in Motley county and now resides in Roaring Springs, Texas along with her "Old-Time Cowboy" Mr. Duff Green. Their seven children all finished high school at Roaring Springs. That in itself is quite a record.

Mrs. Green said somehow she always felt she had a small part in helping the children of these communities until a few years ago at our "Old Settlers Reunion" when a former pupil of her's came up and said "Air you Mrs. Duff Green?" She answered "Yes." He said, "I went to school to you at Flag Springs in 1904 and I haint never knowed nothin' 'cept what you larned me, and I hain't never seed a better teacher." Mrs. Green wants to know, now would you call that wasted effort?

For no other reason, other than that it was short and easy to write, she submitted the name of "Acton", but there was already an Acton, Texas in Hood County so she was asked if the word "Afton" would be agreeable and she accepted it. That is how we have the name today.

Mrs. Myra Kelly Green will long be remembered by many people not only as a teacher but as a kind and true friend.

Mrs. Joe Rose, the former Lilly Hext, and a pupil of Mrs. Green's, remembers her as such. Mrs. Green has grandchildren in school and finishing high school now but I am told by her friends in Roaring Springs that she still takes an active part in PTA in Roaring Springs school and greatly enjoys ballgames and other activities.

Some other early day teachers were Miss Fanny Kelly, sister of Mrs. Green, Joe Hilton, Minor Wilson, Ella Hamilton, Marshall Kendrick (1904), Miss Anna Reynolds and S. A. Cobb.

When we think of school consolidation these days we usually think of our present school system, and when it consolidated. But "Way Back When" there was some more consolidation took place, believe me.

How many remember the old school of New Hope, Liberty, Amity, and Gravel Hill. If you remember them, you may be telling your age. We are going to have some stories later, and experiences of some of the pupils that attended these old schools and also those that later made up our present consolidation, which were Afton, Prairie Chapel, Duncan Flat, Croton, Wichita, Midway, and Chandler Flat.

Remember When?
You caught the itch and grandma would boil a plug of chewing tobacco to smear on it?

Girls sometimes wore garters made out of Model T inner tubes? And boys and girls both wore long, black cotton stockings over long handle underwear legs? Every morning in winter, while shivering and dressing, you gave a certain twist to those old baggy long handle legs, and lapped them over to make the stockings fit over them. Then came the high top shoes.

Kids had to take high doses of "tonic" in the spring. This tonic usually was sulphur and molasses.

And girls held those old curling irons in the lamp globe and heated them to "frizz" their hair? I do mean "frizz".

Religious Growth
As the usual case, the church played an important role in the history of the community.

Our mode of transportation is very different from the day we rode to church in the horse drawn carriages or hitched our pony to the old hitching post. Our way of dressing has changed somewhat and it seems to me even our manners in church are different, for it is very seldom we see a soul shout for joy anymore, during services. In the old days when a good soul felt like shouting, brother, he or she did so, and no one looked down their noses at them. I'm for it.

It seems about the only thing that remains the same is the Book. From it I hope we get a spark of the old timers' true faith.

The old oil lamp burned low many nights before the preacher said "Amen". Then the kids were roused from their pallets, along with the water jar, and possible remains of a few teacakes, and hustled off home.

PRIMITIVE BAPTIST CHURCH OF AFTON

The first minutes of the church from the record, as quoted from memory, by Newman Young, Afton.

"A group of people assembled at Cottonwood in Dickens County, on Saturday before the third Sunday in September 1904, for the purpose of organizing a church, of which said members were: J. J. Mary E. Daisy, Wylie, and Hugh J. McCarty and Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Harvey. The presbyter was composed of Elder J. R. Bolinger, Elder J. R. McCarty, and Elder W. G. Morris, together with Deacons of the Fairview Primitive Baptist Church of Paducah."

After the organization according to Newman Young, quote, "The church elected W. F. McCarty clerk of the church and Elder W. G. Morris, Pastor, who served the church until 1928, and served it well. Once in the drouth years of 1917-18 he called the members together and told them that he realized the conditions, and that he would bear his own expenses to come and serve them. This attitude he kept until he gave up the care of the church. The records indicate that two years prior to his resignation, the church began its largest gathering which reached the peak of attendance in 1930. He gave up the church due to his health and advised them to call a young man to serve them, which they did, who was Elder J. W. West, who served 8 years. Other pastors have been T. A. Dunn, V. J. Lowrance, V. F. Lowrance, and L. J. McCarty."

This, of course, was true to form since they have won this for several years.

In interscholastic League literary events, Spur again was well represented at the district meet. A picture memory team from the fourth grade was the winner in district competition. Spur had entries in declamation, spelling and number sense in the district meet also. While they did not win firsts, they did well in the competition.

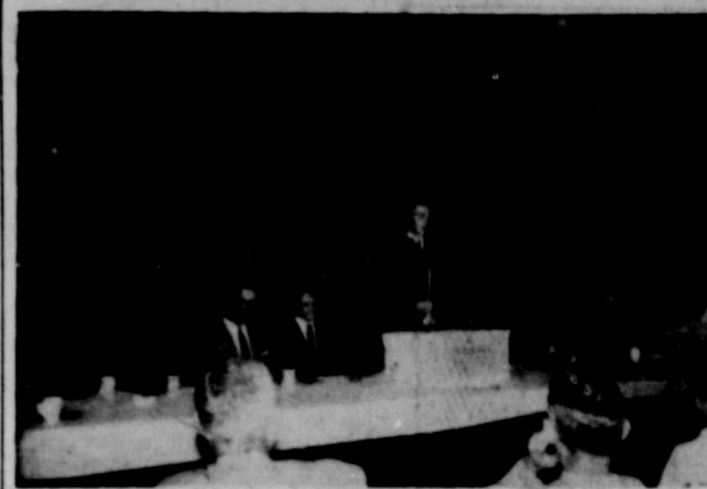
In the music realm some good things happened in Spur this year. Our band put on good shows at the football games in the fall. Then shortly after football season they participated in the regional marching contest and came back with a second division rating. The high school choir did some good work in the regional meet getting a second division rating also. Our choir was represented in the All-State choir in Dallas by Travis Watson. Others in the choir made alternates. A good number of soloists competed in the regional meet and Spur had four firsts and three seconds. The Spring Music Festival was a treat for all the patrons. Both bands and all three choirs presented a good program. Then as

a climax to the year an operetta was presented by second grade students in May.

At the time all of this was going on, we still taught reading, English, mathematics, history and other academic subjects. Another first was won by Robert Beeson in typewriting. This was the first time in many years that a Spur representative had won this honor. We hope that a good instructional program has been carried on this year, along with the other activities.

A study was launched in the fall on increased graduation requirements. To intensify the child's learning and to make him more prepared to meet the world we have decided to increase the number of credits for graduation. The 1958 class will have to have 16 credits, the 1959 class will have 17 credits, and the 1961 class will have 19 credits when they graduate.

This year also a summer school will be offered those students in junior high and high school who are behind in their work. The students electing to take summer school work are to report to the high school building Monday, May 27 at 9 a. m. If there is sufficient demand the work will be offered. Students must pay tuition to attend. Classes will be for two hours a day for six weeks. This has been a good year. But we are not satisfied. We are already looking ahead to next year when we will have a better year.
