TEC Starts Cotton Wage Survey To Determine Chopping Rates

A letter was received this week come by the office on Saturday from Loyan Walker, Manager, morning and pick up tickets for It reads as follows: The Farm compliments of the Spur Cham-bill. Placement Division of the Texas ber of Commerce. Employment Commission has notified this office of their plans to start wage surveys for cotton chopping in West Texas.

Upon completion of the sur veys, the TEC will send this information to the Regional Office. U. S. Department of Labor, Dallas, Texas. The Labor Department will in turn make a determination as to the prevailing wage rate a dollar. Solicit promoters know for cotton chopping.

When prevailing rates are es tablished, notices will be posted in courthouses, postoffices, county agent offices and local TEC offices. The local newspapers and radio stations will be asked to publicize this information to the area which they serve.

It is very important that each farmer who contracts "bracero" labor knows the prevailing wage rate so that he won't encounter partment for failure to pay the prevailing rate.

Dog Killed By Game Warden

Fox shot the dog Tuesday, and it could not be determined definitely if the animal was rabid for the bullet entered the brain, thus destroying the head for laboratory tests.

The animal was killed in the Gabriel Addition where he had been seen running with several other dogs. It has not been established that he bit another animal, but if he did, they too will probably become rabid.

Parents are urged to be on the look out for symptoms of rabies in their pets and to take precautionary measures withe children.

Dr. J. F. Hughes, city health officer, requests that suspected rabid animals not be shot through the head, so laboratory tests can be made.

A dog should receive a booster shot for rabies once a year according to health officials. The vaccinations does not last indefintely. Only 20 animals were vaccinated by Lubbock veterarian Dr. R. S. Byrd on June 13 according to city officials.

Texas Quota Set At 547 Men For **August Draft**

The state quota for Texas draft boards in August calls for 547 men, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, G. L. Godfrey

The state's August call of 547 ompares with a quota of 661 for July and June and 662 for May. The August call is the state's share of a national call for 11,000 men. The national call was 13,000 Roaring Springs from 1917 until JULY 4TH GAMES-

At the same time he announced the August quota for induction. Colonel Schwartz also announced a call for 1,561 men to take preinduction physical and mental examinations in August.

The men to be examined come from approximately half the local boards. Those not receiving such a call in August will receive one in September.

Local board quotas for the August induction and pre-induction examination are scheduled to be mailed by state Selective Service headquarters Wednesday.

The August quota will be filled with men who are at least 22 years dor. old on August 1, with the exception of volunteers or delinquents who may be younger.

Before the buffalo herds were practically extinct, Dickens county was Indian country, white settlers respected the fact and stayed out

Go back yonder about 1847 or 1848, when Texas got tired of being a republic and fighting her battles by her lonesome, she joined the government of the United States of America, joined mostly to get protection from Indian raids. Then the U. S. government established a chain of forts across Texas, to give the pioneer settle ments a little protection.

Ft. Richardson at Jacksboro Texas, Ft. Benknap in Young County, Ft. Griffin in Shakleford county, Ft. Cooper a little town above on the Clear Fork of the Brazos river, Ft. Phantom-Hill in Jones County, Ft. Chadbourne in Coke County, then on to the Rio Grande River. So far as any authoritive facts

The Last Indian battle of note took place in 1874. Most of the buffalo were gone by 1877 so far as Dickens county is concerned. when the first cattle-men landed in Dickens county, and a few set tlers of one sort or of another.






