Spur citizens who are undecid ed about the White River Water District election coming up the 17th, missed a golden opportunity to hear arguments for and against the feasibility of the project Tuesday night.

All 12 of the directors, representing Crosbyton, Post, Ralls and Spur were gathered at East Ward for the purpose of answering estions and discussing the \$4,-000,000 lake project.

Only a handful of people, out side of the directors, were present. However, a lively discussion was carried out.

The meeting was preceded by an earlier one attended by the Spur City Council. Immediately after the regular director's meeting, the City Council adjourned to the City Hall where they voted unanimously to support the White River Municipal Water District Directors. The Spur directors of the district, George Gabriel, Lynn Buzbee and E. B. Blumberg, had announced earlier they were 100 Foreman Chapel per cent for the lake project.

Several arguments against the lake were offered at the meetings. One being that the project is not feasible as it now stands unless the oil companies-who have verbally agreed to purchase water at the rate of 25 cents per 1,000 gallons-will sign a contract so stating before the bond election







# THE SAME WATER RATE!

Before the confirmation election last October 27 setting up the White River Water District, the taxpayers of Crosbyton, Ralls, Post and Spur were informed in a printed brochure that water from the proposed reservoir would cost the cities 30c per 1,000 gallons. Added to this would be the cost of distribution. This still remains the maximum rate that would be charged the cities if the bond issue is approved August 17. There has been no change in this figure since the first estimates were made.

# TAX RATE THE SAME!

You were told that the average home owner in the four cities would pay a tax of approximately \$11.25 per year, less than \$1.00 per month. This figure remains about the same. If 30c per 1,000 gallons is charged for water, the tax rate will be 12 cents on the \$100 valuation. Valuations will be about 80 per cent of actual value. For instance, if you have a \$10,000 home it will be valued at approximately \$8,000. With a tax rate of 12 cents, your annual tax would be \$9.60. The engineer estimates this tax can be done away with completely in four or five years.

## **HERE'S WHAT HAPPENS**

You are probably wondering how the above is possible, since the bond issue is \$4,000,000, rather than the first estimate of \$2,500,000. The answer is simple-your directors have found a source of revenue which will take care of the increase in cost of the project. Oil companies operating in Garza and Kent Counties have been contacted, and they have said they will contract to buy enough water from the White River Reservoir if it is built to make the payments on that \$1,500,000 additional cost. The oil companies would use this water to flood their wells to make them produce more, a common practice in oil fields where water is available. With these oil companies contracting for the surplus water in the lake, it puts the proposition right back where it was last October as far as the four cities are concerned—it will cost the cities no more than we first anticipated.

## AN IRONCLAD GUARANTEE!

Voters have an ironclad guarantee that the project won't cost them any more than this, too. Their guarantee is that the bond companies have said flatly that they cannot buy more than \$2,500,000 of the bonds. If something should happen and the contracts with the oil companies are not signed, then the dam cannot be built even though the bonds have been approved, simply because the bonds cannot be sold. This is about as good a guarantee as a voter could have in seeing that his interests are protected.

## LET'S GIVE THEM A CHANCE

Let's give the directors of the White River Water District a chance build the White River Dam and reservoir, and the supply lines to the four cities. They can do nothing unless we approve the bond issue. If the bond issue is approved, then they can go to the oil companies with contracts. If the contracts are secured, the directors can then go to a government agency to sell the remaining \$1,500,000 in bonds. Should the directors fail in securing these contracts and selling the additional bonds, then the dam will not be built. Let's give them a chance and VOTE FOR the bonds August 17.
