People over this area and many other citizens over the country will not soon forget the drouth, and depression of the 30's. Especially the year 1934. We had long dry seasons and the farmers kept looking for a rain that never got

The cattlemen appealed to the Government for loans and secured them to buy feed. The drouth continued and became so bad that the Government offered to buy the cattle and most owners sold since they had already lost their value, used up in the feed loan.

Appraisers were sent over the country and prices were so low many people began canning the calves. Most cattlemen went broke in the feed loan.

During the summer of 1930, for a short time Afton was an independent district, but this independence was voted off the same year. Some of the teachers at Afton along then were Tom Porter, Clarice Lane Thannisch and Mr. and Mrs. Lowrance.


