





O'cont. Fish Hatchery Has Heaviest In Histor **ear**

More than thirty thousand ap plications for additional fish from Texas hatcheries were on the books Sept. 1, when time for taking applications for this year's production closed. This figure has been given by Joe Marks, Chief Engineer of the Game and Fish commission.

"This year's hatchery produc tion will amount to some 13 million fish distributed to lakes, streams, and ponds Broughout the state," the Chief Engineer said.

Production of the hatcheries

was curtailed some because of flood damage, principally at the San Angelo hatchery, Repair work at this hatchery has been in progress for some time, and the water supply to the hatchery will be completed in another 30 days. Meantime, bids are now being taken on additional drainage work. An engineer was sent to the Dundee hatchery near Wichita Falls this week to survey improvements that must be made there, as well as to repair damage.

"Heavy rains in the spring filled every farm tank in Texas," the Chief Engineer said. "Many of these tanks had never been stocked before. We are attempting to supply them with fish as fast as possible."

In tests conducted in Kansas deep tillage for wind erosion control has been found to be most effective on land where deep sand, 12 to 24 inchs, covers a layer of clay, says Jack Barton, extension soil and water conservation specialist. Turning hte clay to the surface does help because a rough surface gives the best resistance wind erosion, he adds.



For instance, mighty as our Congress is, the Constitution does not give it certain powers:

1. Neither Congress nor any body else can suspend the writ of habeas corpus (unless the public cafety demands it during rebellon or invasion.) All officers or others must obey a cour and bring in anyone in their custody to set whether he is held alwfully.

2. Congress cannot pass "bills of attainder," special acts to punish someone. Congress cannot bypass the courts.

3. Congress cannot pass an ex facto law a law which makes an act a crime which was not one hen done, or which punishes th offender more than called for when done. 4. Congress cannot tax exports







from any state nor by regulation favor one state's ports over another's, nor make one state's vessels clear or pay duties to another in order to enter.

Besides these denials from within, the constitution curbs ongress and the executive ju diciary in the amendments, especially the first ten.

Among other things, Congress cannot make a law respecting an establishment of religion or pro hibiting its free exercise, or ab ridging the freedom of speech of the press or the right of the people peaceably to assembly and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

The constitution also curbs th courts (for example, they cannot deny a person a fair hearing duly represented by counsel.) It curbs the executive (he cannot, for example, take private property for public use without just compensation.) The constitution, which divide the work of the three branches of government, winds up by telling where the rest of the power rests -just in case anybody gets any fancy ideas of dictatorship. There are things no state can do, for nstance, -"make or enforce any aw which shall abridge the priv
