The recent Fifty-fifth Legislature recognized the need for flood ontrol as well as the assurance of quate future water supply for those reasons they voted to ose an amendment to the Tex-Constitution which, if approv voters in a special election held November 5, 1957, uld authorize the creation of body to be known as the "Texas

Water Development Board." This Board, if created, would have authority to issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00. If more funds should be required at some later date, the Legislature would be authorized to provide for the issuance and sale of an additional \$100,000.00 in bonds. A two-thirds vote of the Legislature would be

required for this authorization. Proceeds from the sale of the onds could not be expended directly nor given away, but could be loaned to various governmental authorities for certain authorized purposes. Eligible borrowers would include cities, counties, river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts, and inter-
