This week the City Commission let a contract for the third big well to be added to the water system of Spur.

There have been two news wells just completed that are producing five hundred gallons of water per minute. This new well, if it compares with the two just completed in production will make an addition of one million gallons of water supply daily to what the city had before the new wells were added.

This new supply of water will be adequate for any industry that may desire to come to our city. The water is of excellent quality and has a high purity test which makes it very fine. We are now supplied with water for a city of several thousand population and can take care of any industry that will come and this is a good field for several industries.

Our city commission has acted wisely in this matter and deserve the commendation of our people.

Conservation reserve program participants who plan to plant native grass mixtures this spring should make early arrangements for grass seed, advises SCS technician John H. Taylor. Certain species are scarce and substitutions will be necessary in some instances. Assistance in determining adapted seed mixtures and amounts of seed to plant is available from SCS technicians, points out Taylor. Grass drills are available through the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District and are in custody of the vocational agriculture teachers in Spur, Girard, and Patton Springs.

Don and Rush McGinty will plant about two hundred acres to a native grass mixture in a dead cover of sorghum. The mixtures will include switch grass, Indian grass, sand love grass and side oats grama to be planted on a sandy land site. On a hard land site they will plant a mixture of side oats grama and blue grama. The seeding will be made next week.

Arizona Cypress plants for wind-break plantings are available

again this year. Red Cedar and Chinese Elm are also available, and applications may be made with the district's bookkeeper, Nina Grace, at 407 No. Burlington in Spur.

The district's second Great Plains Conservation plan is being developed with Rex Robinson, covering his ranch northeast of Dickens. Mesquite control fencing, pear eradication, stock dams, and range chiseling are major practices for which cost-share assistance will be available under the long-time complete conservation program.

Building terraces are district cooperators Claude Gregory, H. L. Dennis, Clyde Horn, M. M. Copeland, Carl Grantham, and George Nalley. SCS technicians John F. Moore and George Stanford are assisting in the design and construction work.

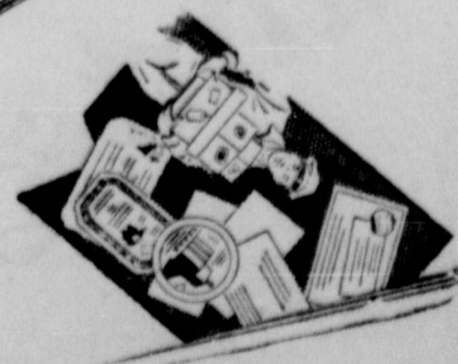

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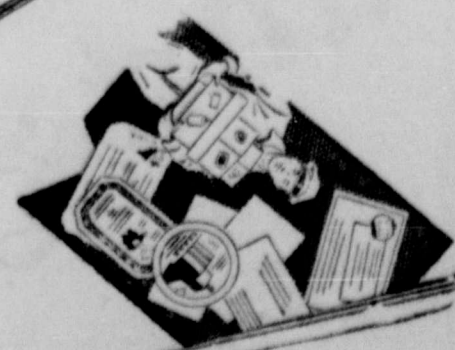

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

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## Farmer Who Owes FHA \$300 Seeks Help From Yarborough - He Got It

A 60-year-old farmer, who owns 300 acres of land near Jarrell in Williamson County, recently wrote me for assistance. His case is typical of a number I have had called to my attention in recent months. This family farmer during the drought years had borrowed over \$6,000 from the Farmers Home Administration, and had managed to repay all of it except \$300. The final \$300 was due last September but he had signed an application for extension of the loan so he could repay the \$300 next September.

He wrote me that FHA officials had turned down his extension and had demanded payment of the loan by December 31, 1957, else they were going to foreclose the mortgage, take his cows and his one second-hand tractor, which would force him off the land. On Christmas Eve, with no money on hand to meet the FHA payment demand, this elderly farmer wrote to inquire if there was anything I could do. When I questioned FHA officials about the demand, they said it was just a mistake and quickly agreed to extend the time.

But not before I found out that higher-ups in FHA officialdom had just arbitrarily ruled that "this old man should pay that \$300 now because it's too small an amount to carry on the books." To me, this is a shocking case of misadministration of a federal program intended to help farmers struggling to make a living on the farm. It is not the first such case I have heard, but it is probably the worst. It is a part of the plan being used to drive small farmers off the land.

It reflects one reason why Tex-

ans have been leaving their farms at the rate of 8,000 a year for the past five years. The drought, the floods, and the hard money policy are driving the little farmer from the land just like the Agriculture Department wants, because USDA officials just don't believe in small farmers. I believe this trend of the vanishing family farm is one of the most serious problems facing America. We don't need fewer farm families in America, we need a positive program to help the national farm economy.

First, the government must do an about face and extend credit to our family farmers, not continue to cancel it.

Second, we should raise price supports to 90 per cent of parity for several years—until the Texas farmers can get a chance to recover financially from the seven years of drought and the year of floods.

Third, I strongly advocate increasing of our soil and water conservation programs. This includes expansion of the basic soil conservation program; periodic emergency soil rebuilding program such as the \$20 million plan I led in passing last session; more money for building water conservation projects on our creeks and rivers; expansion of the Great Plains program.

Fourth, we need to fight inflation at all levels with special emphasis on opposing moves to increase REA interest rates.

All of these are important steps toward a prosperous farm economy, steps which I believe we must take in the new session of Congress.

## Hesitations from Complications

Dickens County farmers put the rush on the local ASC office the past week which resulted in the burning of midnight oil in that office with 245 farmers being signed up.

W. W. Gunn, manager of the ASC office, estimates that 35% of Dickens County cotton land is in the soil bank—with some farms yet to be signed up.

Now, it is almost a proven fact that the Soil Bank Program will be the death of small towns with businessmen looking to the future and seeing slow business—particularly in the fall—after already feeling the pangs of a fall slump.

However, many farmers won't have to look forward in anticipation of a good cotton crop and a "big fall" for themselves.

They will receive their cotton money early and that will be all for '58. And, as one farmer put it, "I'll just sign the check and turn it over to the next man."

Farmers can't be blamed for putting their land in the Soil Bank and receiving a much-needed payment which is probably already spent before it is received.

We don't think Ike's idea of abolishing cotton price supports and releasing cotton planting limitations will help the situation. That would result in plenty of cotton at "a nickel a pound", which most people have had experience with before.

After seeing the Soil Bank come as a miserable failure as a solution to this problem, the thorn in the farmers' side still remains and they won't be the only ones that will feel it. A solution to this problem won't come to some of our lawmakers over a bottle of beer, either.

It will surely be a long, drawn-out affair to ever get farm economy stabilized and a lot of people will get hurt while a sensible solution is being sought.

It just grips the heck out of us, though, to keep seeing the squeeze put on the farmers. Empty farmhouses, idle land and broke and discouraged farmers will have quick effect on our nation's economy in the future, so somebody better get busy.

Also, to add to the farmer's cotton woes, lower feed grain prices is predicted for '58. This estimation comes as a result of lower 1957 support prices, a large crop last year and the big supplies already on hand.

Seems no matter what new idea the farmer comes up with, such as planting onions, he gets a low market price for his high production cost price and by the time it goes through the middle man it increases sharply and is sold back to him at a high price.

One thing for sure—the farmer will have to branch out from the old tradition of cotton planting in years to come, and hope for a break in some other form of crop. It might even be mesquite beans but something has to break for the better sooner or later.

Demand for cotton on the market, which has decreased and resulted in its death as a money-maker, can be blamed on the cotton industry itself as well as its mis-handling by the government.

"King Cotton" began its downfall as the cotton industry fell behind in its research to create new needs for the product. While the industry was asleep, the wool and synthetic industry worked very hard to create a demand for its products and topped it off with big advertising campaigns.

The result can be seen.

The letter from Walter Lahay, Supervisor of Area I Vocational Agriculture, concerning the Spur Vocational Agriculture department drew concern and speculation around town as the public's attention was drawn to this department.

The Ag department is an important part in Spur High School's educational program, as in all schools in this part of the country.

Heavy emphasis is placed on the ag department and its work—with many school hours being set for classroom study, the caring for animals and field trips.

We think the Spur ag department has done a fine job in its efforts at class projects and top judging teams, which comes as a result of extra hours of work on the part of the supervisors and students.

However, emphasis on the needs of this department should only be seen through the needs of the school as a whole and not singled out as one single detail.

Most all departments in Spur schools are in sad shape with poor facilities prevailing in high school. Jr. high and some in East Ward. It will take a large building program to ever put Spur schools back on its feet and the longer it is put off, the worse it gets. We

The season still is open on rabbits and crows, according to the secretary. A rabbit hunt probably will be staged in the Panhandle area within the next few weeks to

kill off thousands of rabbits.

There is open season on crows at all times. Shooters are urged to use up their old shells in an effort to get rid of as many crows as possible before nesting time.

From early reports over the state the quail season has been the best in years. More cover was available during the past year. The hatch was good and more than 40,000 birds were planted in the state by the Game and Fish Commission from its Tyler hatchery.

Duck and goose shooting was erratic. Some hunters reported fine kills, while others didn't have such good luck. The occasional hunter seemed to fare better than the constant hunter. Men who hunt every day in many instances reported too much water and unsatisfactory shooting.

Throughout the remainder of the year we must concentrate on developing management practices that will produce more game for next season's harvest," the Secretary says.

"Our entire harvest depends upon proper management and land uses. We can't expect to improve the quality of our deer or increase their quantity without proper practices. It seems now that we will have the best range conditions we have had in years. A few more rains later in the year will have much to do with next season's harvest."

Twenty new game wardens will be enrolled at Texas A & M for the state's game warden school this year, according to E. M. Sprott, Director of Law Enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission.

All of the men but one joined the force in 1957. They have been
