With farmers in this section of the state receiving below average prices for their cotton, the State Comptroller, R. S. Calvert, has been tossing around estimates that the State Legislators will have to raise \$100,000,000 in new revenue taxes. This news will be accepted around here like the plague.

Gov. Daniel is said to be opposed to such a tax hike. Just where would this new tax originate? Should it be a sales tax or a state income tax? For many years Texas has been attracting industry and business because there was no sales tax and no state income tax.

New Mexico has a sales tax, we know. And if you've ever made a purchase over there you've paid this tax. It appears to us to be a very distasteful one, both to the merchants who have to collect it, and to the tourists and natives who have to pay it.

In 1956, Texans paid \$3,800,000,000 in taxes to over 3,000 separate governmental entities. This includes both state and federal taxes. State taxes were over \$1,000,000,000 from a total state income of \$15,000,000,000.

What is the solution? Either we raise the money from a sales tax, income tax or some other revenue assessment, or we don't spend that extra \$100,000,000 that Mr. Calvert says we'll need. That will mean the Legislators will have to sharpen their paring knives and have them ready when the next session gets underway in January, 1959.

## Local Teachers To Attend Dallas Reading Clinic; Study Completed

A study of the present reading program in the fourth, fifth and sixth grades is now underway in the Spur Schools according to Bob Nunley, superintendent.

A consultant from the Texas Education Agency was here last week to aid in this study along with East Ward faculty members, principal H. M. Allison and Nunley. The goal of the study is a more aggressive reading program.

Four teachers, Mrs. Bill Henry, Mrs. Ethel McArthur, Mrs. Margaret Waggoner, J. E. Bachman, along with Allison and Nunley will go to Dallas this week end to attend a reading clinic at Southern Methodist University.

Leaders in reading instruction from other areas will conduct lectures and demonstrations. Problems that the local personnel will face are an adequate testing and evaluation program and selection of materials to be used in the revised program.

Achievement tests given recently in the primary and elementary grades indicated that the children in these grades are reading on the average above their grade level, but the administration and faculty are of the opinion that improvement can be made and that par-

ents will see much better study as a result of the reading study.

## Chamber Doings... Ballots Due In By Saturday

Saturday is the last day merchants have to turn in their ballots to elect four new Chamber of Commerce directors. Twelve names are on the ballot that was mailed last week.

The Chamber is sponsoring an award, as in past years, for the best essay written by a junior or senior student in Spur High School on the topic: "Spur, Pro and Con." The winners of this contest will be announced at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet that will be held March 20.

A committee has been appointed to select the outstanding citizen of the year. The person chosen may be a man or woman. The winner will be recognized at the banquet and will receive an award for outstanding achievements for the year 1957.

Nominations for this honor may be made by calling Arner Watson, president of the Chamber of Commerce.

The merchants committee is working on a trades day program for Spur. Each business house will be contacted by this committee in the next few days.

## Mayor Sets Election For April 1

The Spur City Council has called an election for April 1 to determine whether or not the City shall continue to support a municipal band. The action was taken after the Council was presented with a petition signed by 42 qualified voters asking that the election be called.

The City has paid \$12,741.88 to the Spur Independent School District for the support of a municipal band since 1941 according to City officials. School officials have corroborated this fact.

The payments have been in various amounts, but in the last few years have been for \$1,000 although this amount is not specified. The act merely states that the tax shall be appropriated from City revenues not to exceed three mills for each one dollar of taxable value of property within the city.

The support of a municipal band by the City has been the center of controversy for some time. The opposition points out that although the appropriations must come from City revenues, the City has not collected a band tax in the past several years, although such a tax was collected immediately after the municipal band was created.

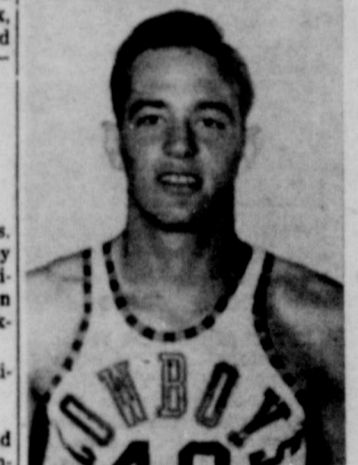
An opinion handed down by L. D. Ratliff, now District Judge, states that: "We do find that for several years after the band was created, a special tax, called a Band Tax, was assessed

and collected by the City but we do not find any authority for such assessment and levy and we note that it has not been collected for a good many years. This tax amounts to about a mill per one dollar valuation of taxable property within the City."

The City Council passed a resolution at its Monday night meeting calling for the election. The resolution was passed by unanimous vote, and is published on another page of this paper in its legal form. The petition received by the Council contained 42 names, one more than was required by law. (It had to represent ten per cent of the total number of votes cast in the last City election, which was 406.)

The resolution provided that the following was to appear on the ballot:

For the establishment and maintenance of a band;  
Against the establishment and maintenance of a band.

**REDUCE PIG LOSSES**  
Pig losses, due to crushing and chilling, can be greatly reduced by the use of pig brooders, suggests E. M. Regenbrecht, extension swine husbandman. The most critical time in a pig's life is the first few hours after birth when chilling and crushing take about 25 percent of all losses. County agents can supply detailed information on pig brooders and how they should be used, says the specialist.

**BROILER OUTPUT UP**  
The 1957 production of broilers in the United States was approximately 1,400 million birds and the 1958 output may go higher reports Marshall Miller, associate extension poultry marketing specialist. Per capita consumption of broilers has jumped from about 4.3 lbs. ready-to-cook basis, to more than 18 lbs. from 1947 to the present.

**18 Broiler Houses In Operation In Vicinity As Industry Grows**

The broiler industry has been growing at a rapid rate.

A generation ago, commercial broilers were almost unknown and 10 years ago production totaled only 310 million birds, reports Marshall Miller, associate extension poultry marketing specialist.

But the 1957 production is estimated at 1,400 million birds and he adds that it will probably go even higher in 1958.

In the Spur area, there are currently 18 broiler houses in operation, producing around

200,000 broilers last year.

The per-capita consumption of broilers has jumped from about 4.3 pounds, ready-to-cook basis, in 1947, to more than 18 pounds.

There are several factors which have contributed to this tremendous growth, Miller says.

First, he points out, the industry has proved its ability to adapt its methods to the changing consumer demands and marketing conditions of recent years. It has learned to provide the consumers with the products they want, at the times and places and in the forms they want them, and at prices they are willing to pay.

The industry has also taken over much of the processing that used to be left up to the consumer.

The next thing pointed out by the specialist is the the broiler industry has increased the scale of production, processing, and distribution. In contrast with the small flocks common in former years, the 50,000 farms reporting sale of broilers in 1954 had average sales of 21,000 birds.

The industry has adopted much new technology and more research is underway in order that progress may continue, he says. In production, a 4.1 ratio of feed consumed to pounds of live weight produced was common not many years ago. Today, the average is only slightly above 2.5:1. Processing plants have made equally remarkable gains in efficiency.

With such a record, it is no wonder that the broiler industry often is viewed as an example of things to come in agriculture and in food marketing.

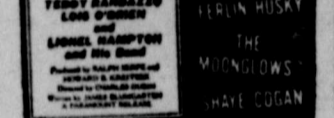

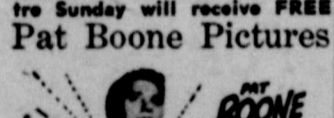

## Duck Creek Soil Conservation District NEWS NOTES

Great Plains Conservation Program contracts and conservation plans have been developed recently with C. E. and Paul Dale Hagins, and Emmett Hobson, reports John H. Taylor, S. C. S. technician.

Hagins' four year contract calls for conservation practices as brush control, dams, diversions, terraces, and range seeding. The three year contract with Hobson calls for waterway development and seeding, retirement and range seeding of cropland being converted to grassland, range seeding and diversion construction. Robert Collier is developing a plan at this time in the program with S. C. S. assistance.

District supervisors have placed an order for the purchase of four shredders for use by district cooperators. A small rental charge will be made for their use. It is expected that they will be used in connection with cover crop and weed control operations in range or grass seeding work.

Bland Draper, Range Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service, recently reported for duty with the Spur Work Unit. He was transferred from the Crystal City office. His wife and two daughters will join him as soon as housing facilities are secured here.

Seeding of native range grasses on conservation reserve land is receiving top attention by cooperators and S.C.S. technicians at this time. Seeding operations were completed last week on 208 acres on the McGinty ranch. The seeding mixture included switch grass, side oats grama, Indian grass, and lovegrass, and Blue gramma.

Robert McAteer is seeding about 300 acres now. G. B. Morris plans to start his seeding operations soon. Z. Mayo and Jerald Watts are contracting seeding operations with grass drills for those who wish to have work done on a contract basis.

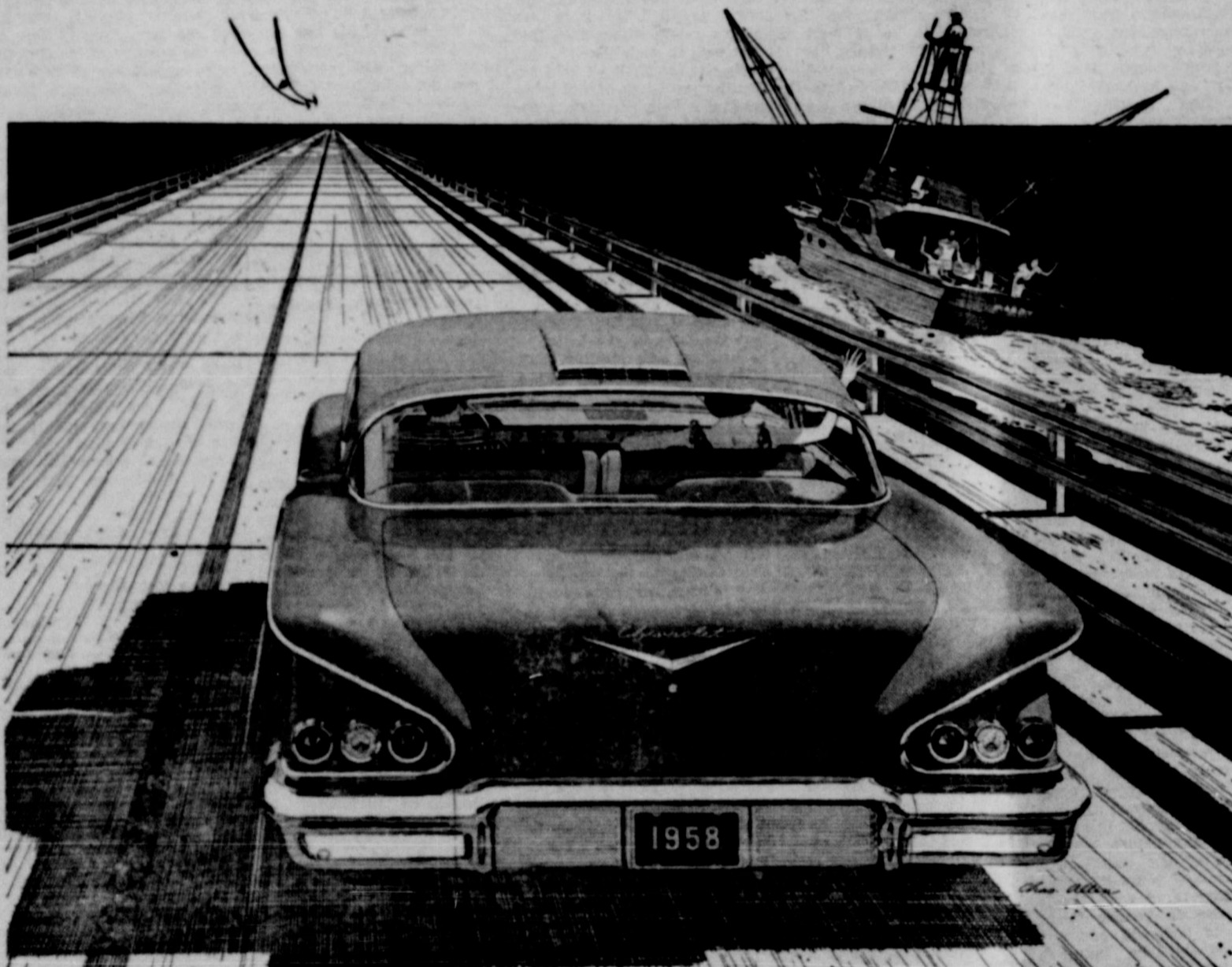

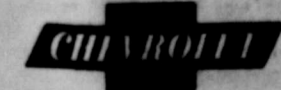

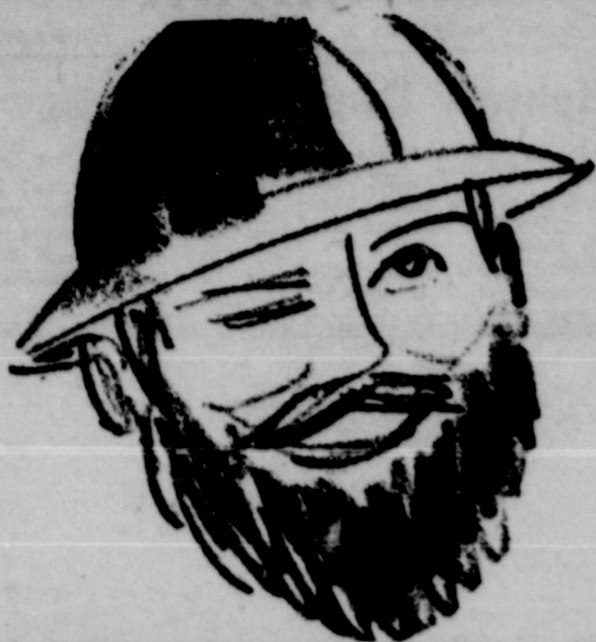
