SUPREME COURT HAS LAST WORD
The Tenth Amendment says that all powers not given to the United States government shall belong to the states or to the people.

In any showdown, one court—the Supreme Court of the United States—stays whether the federal or the state governments (or nobody) can do certain things. Hence the case of the sturdy Captain Gideon Olmstead, the first man who tested this court power. And what a time he had!

In 1778 the British ship Active captured Captain Olmstead's fishing boat upon the open sea and took his three-man crew aboard to help sail a war cargo to New York. But Olmstead and his three men drove the British below deck. While Olmstead headed for New Jersey his men kept up a battle with the crew below. After two days the American brig Convention hove to and took over and its captain, Thomas Houston, claimed the Active as a prize since there was still fighting going on.

Olmstead protested, but the brig brought in the prize to Philadelphia. Under the Articles of Confederation states like Pennsylvania had set admiralty courts to decide claims arising at sea. The Philadelphia court gave Olmstead only one-fourth the prize.

So Olmstead appealed to the committee of the Continental Congress named to review all cases of capture at sea. It decided for Captain Olmstead. The Pennsylvania court at once denied the committee's right to upset its jury's verdict.

Meanwhile, we had given up the Articles of Confederation and adopted the Constitution which lodged admiralty powers in the federal government.

For thirty-one hard-fought years the case shuttled between state and federal courts. Everybody got into the act—the governor, the legislator, Congress, and even President Madison.

In 1809 the U. S. Supreme Court upheld a lower court which had decided that the Committee of Congress was right. This was a victory for Olmstead.

lion spread. The U. S. Marshall swore in a 2,000 man posse to take over the prize money for Olmstead. Finally when President Madison himself said the Court had the backing of the U. S. Government, the Pennsylvania legislature gave in.

Night hunting occupied second place with 65 arrests, indicating that night hunting and trespassing may go together.

Hunting from automobiles was also another heavy offense for the month, with 27 arrests. There were also 27 arrests for hunting without licenses.

Fishing violations for the month were low.

For the month however, there were 471 violations that brought in fines and court costs of \$15,299.59.

The Director also warned that with warmer weather and lakes full of fish there will be many trying their skill at catching them. A license is required for all persons using a rod and reel, and for all persons between 17 and 65 who wish in public waters outside

their home courts. This license also is required for coastal fishing this year. This law, which went into effect last September 1, sets up a \$2.15 universal fishing license good for both salt and fresh water fishing. It applies to residents and non-residents. Texas is one of the few states which charges non-residents no more for a fishing license than local residents.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE DICKENS CO. FAT STOCK SHOW

Rule No. 1. Only bonafide members of 4-H and FFA are eligible to compete for premiums.

The years of active participation in the show for 4-H and FFA members are as follows: 4-H ages 9-21 inclusive; FFA membership during high school years and 3 years following graduation or leaving school.

Rule No. 2. Any 4-H or FFA member exhibiting animals and competing for premiums must be in charge of the actual feeding and care of the animals throughout the feeding period and be certified by the Vocational Agriculture teacher or County Agent in charge.

Rule No. 3. The show committee expects each exhibitor to show his animal. In case an exhibitor has more than one animal in the class, he may select some other boy or girl to show the animal. All exhibitors should have animals trained and in show condition at the time of the show. Any exhibitor may be required to remove his exhibit from the show upon determination of a committee that the animal is sick, not properly trained or is not in show condition. This committee will be composed of the Superintendent of the division and three other members of the show committee.

Rule No. 4. Winners of the Grand Champion award in any class will not be awarded the Grand Champion or Reserve Champion Award in the same class at the next show. (An exhibitor may exhibit in the class but may not win the championship award in two successive years.)

Rule No. 5. No exhibitor may compete for both Grand and Reserve Champion Awards.

Rule No. 6. In case of less than a full class as listed in the catalog the judge will award the ribbons on the merits of the individual. (The only animal in a class would not automatically win a blue ribbon.)

Rule No. 7. SWINE DIVISION

- Hogs must have been owned by exhibitor at least 90 days prior to show.
- Gilts will be shown by breeds; must be less than 1 year of age.
- Market hogs (fat barrows and gilts) will be graded according to USDA grades. (US No. 1, US No. 2, etc) and premiums paid accordingly.
- A class for sows and litters will be provided.
- First and second individuals of the different swine classes will compete for Grand and Reserve champion.
- A class for Pen of 3 fat hogs fed by one exhibitor will be provided. (Gilts fed for market may be shown in the fat barrow class as well as in this class.) Gilts shown in breeding classes are not eligible to be shown in fat classes.
- Market hogs must weigh at least 180 lbs.
- Each exhibitor is limited to a maximum of six entries in all swine classes.

Rule No. 8. SHEEP DIVISION

- Classes will be provided for fat lambs, dry lot fed and for breeding sheep.
- All sheep must have been owned by exhibitor at least 75 days prior to show.
- Fat lambs must weigh at least 70 lbs.
- Fat lambs will be divided into the following classes:
 - Fine wool (Rambouillet, Merino and crosses between these breeds.)
 - Crossbred (Hampshire, Suffolk and crosses with these breeds.)
 - Southdown, Shropshire and crosses using these breeds.
- Each exhibitor is limited to a total of six entries in the sheep division.
- Fat lambs will be made for the Champion lamb in each Fat Lamb class.

Rule No. 9. BEEF CATTLE DIVISION

- All fat steers must be dry lot fed, and the steers must have been weaned before November 9, 1957.
- Groups of three steers must have been fed by one member.
- Classes for steers: Steers weighing 850 pounds and over will show in the heavy weight class and steers weighing 849 and under will show in the light weight class.
- All steers will be judged on market classifications; that is, prime choice, good, medium and commercial.
- The first and second place steers in each class will compete for Grand and Reserve Champion Awards. Only 4-H and FFA exhibitors will compete for these awards.
- An award is to be made for the highest Rate of Gain achieved with steers. To win, the animal must have been weighed at a given time and place by the committee and then at the show. Awards are to be given for the highest gain during the period and are limited to one award per exhibitor.
- A class will be provided for Beef Breeding Cattle owned by 4-H; FFA members. Prizes will be given on the same classifications as with steers.
- Any steer which has been shown at the Dickens County 4-H, FFA show in a previous year is not eligible to be exhibited at the show.
- Steers being exhibited must not show permanent teeth.
- Steers must have been owned at least 120 days prior to the show.
- Each exhibitor will be limited to the following entry in this division:
 - Three steers,
 - Two females
 - One bull.

Rule No. 10. DAIRY CATTLE

a. Classes will be provided for heifers and milch cows owned by eligible exhibitors.

Rule No. 11. POULTRY AND RABBIT DIVISION

- a. Classes will be provided as follows:
- Pen of 3 Laying Hens.
 - Pen of 3 Fryer Chickens.
 - Pen of 3 Fryer Rabbits.
 - Breeding Rabbits, Bucks.
 - Breeding Rabbits, Does.
- b. Exhibitor will be limited to one entry in each class except Breeding Rabbit Does, in which class he may enter two animals.
- c. Exhibits must come from the regular 4-H Demonstration or FFA project for the year.

Rule No. 12. OPEN classes will be provided for any kind of livestock any person may want to exhibit. These classes will not be in competition with Junior exhibitors and ribbons only will be awarded.

Rule No. 13. MISCELLANEOUS DIVISION

- Classes will be provided for other living birds, animals, etc. which persons may wish to exhibit.
- Ribbons only will be awarded.
- Exhibitor must furnish cooping, pens etc. for his exhibit.

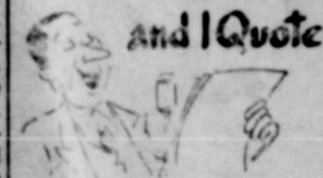

About Your HEALTH

Well over half of Texas, paralytic polio victims last year were less than five years of age, a final tabulation of the 1957 polio incidence shows.

The record discloses that of the 365 paralytic cases reported last year, 218 were pre-schoolers under five. That figures out to be 59.7 percent for Texas, compared to 45 percent for the nation as a whole.

Of the remaining Texas cases, 44 were between the ages of five and nine; 23 were in the 10-14 age group; 19 were between 15 and 19; and 61 were over 20.

Clearly revealed in these "age group distribution" figures is the necessity of placing special emphasis on the immunization of pre-school children, while at the same time keeping in mind that everyone up to 40 years of age should take the series of three shots in proper sequence.

It still takes almost eight months to take the entire series. The second shot is given two weeks after the first, and the third seven months after the second.

Parents must take the initiative in seeing that their younger children are properly immunized and in getting immunized themselves.

In the four years since the advent of Salk vaccine, its efficiency in conferring immunity against the crippling effects of polio has exceeded all expectations. This is its record of performance for the past five years.

In 1952, Texas suffered 3,994 cases of both paralytic and non-paralytic polio. That was the worst year in state history. In 1953, reported cases totalled 1,751. There were 3,037 cases in 1954; 1,831 in 1955; and 1,359 in 1956.

Now compare those yearly totals with the 729 cases last year—slightly over half the number experienced in the lightest year of the previous four.

The time for parents to take action toward having their youngsters—especially those of pre-school age—vaccinated is right now, before the polio season begins. And parents will be making a mistake if they neglect to get themselves immunized at the same time.

The tendency of many people is to take one or two doses of vaccine, and forget about the third. True, one shot does give some protection, and two give even more. But only by taking that third shot can maximum protection be assured.

Getting vaccine is no problem nowadays as it was in the beginning. Latest estimates put the nation's vaccine supply at 30 million doses.

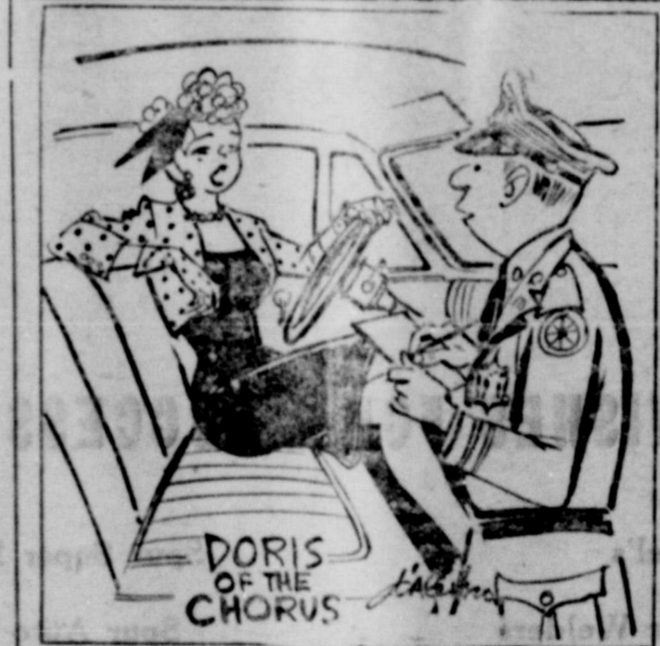

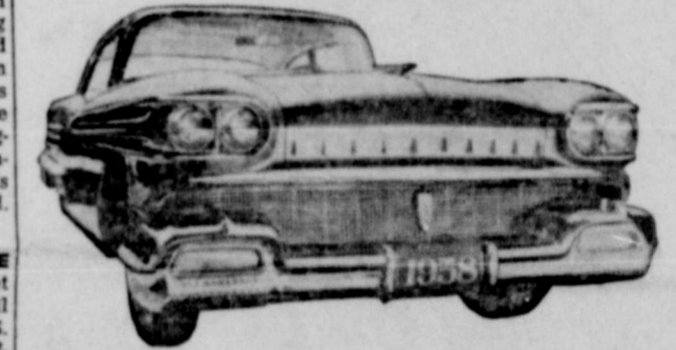

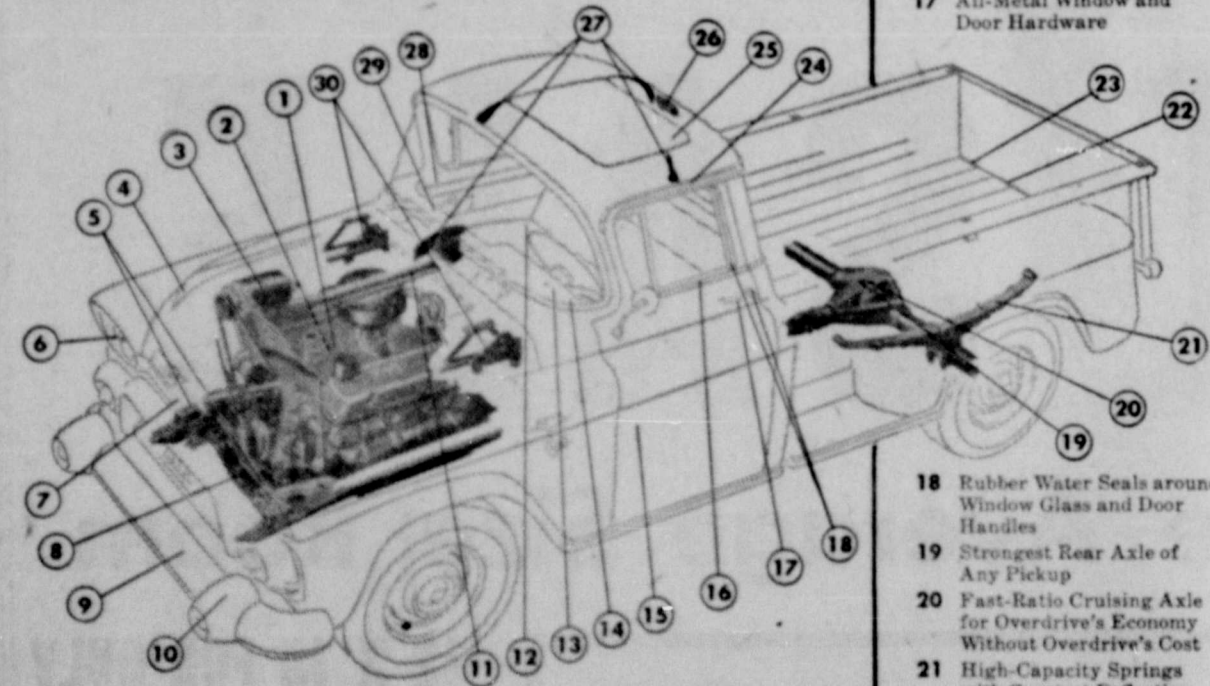
