Twenty-three persons have died in sixteen traffic accidents during January and February

WAC Set. Nancy J. Berlin and Set in the Texas Highway Patrol District 5-A; according to Captain E. L. Posey, Comman Officer. In addition, the High-way Patrol has investigated 135 accidents injuring 237 persons plus 263 property damage acci-dents amounting to \$294,470

damage. Captain Posey advised that speed was the number one con-tributing factor in the 414 accidents investigated by his men. He urged all motorists to observe speed limits and help prevent accidents by voluntary complying with all traffic laws.






