Southwestern Bell To Conduct Telephone Survey In Spur

Every telephone customer in Spur will receive a post card in the next few days, asking from the Telephone Company for his comments and criticisms of his telephone service and the company that provides it, according to Jim Garrett, manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company here.

Garrett calls the project a post card canvass. "In making the canvass, we'll mail a double post card to each customer. The cards will be mailed next Monday, so people will start receiving them Tuesday or Wednesday. We hope that everyone will take a minute to fill out the return half of the card and mail it to me."

"We are not seeking simpli-

ments," the manager points out. "If any of our customers have criticisms, we would like to know them. Comments like these help us to give customers the kind of service they want."

Similar post card canvasses are planned for every town where Southwestern Bell Telephone Company operates. The purpose is to find out what customers have complaints so that the Company can try to remove the causes of the complaints.

"That's our most important job—giving customers the kind of service they desire," Garrett said. "We'll contact every one who replies unfavorable and make every effort to clear up the source of his dissatisfaction."

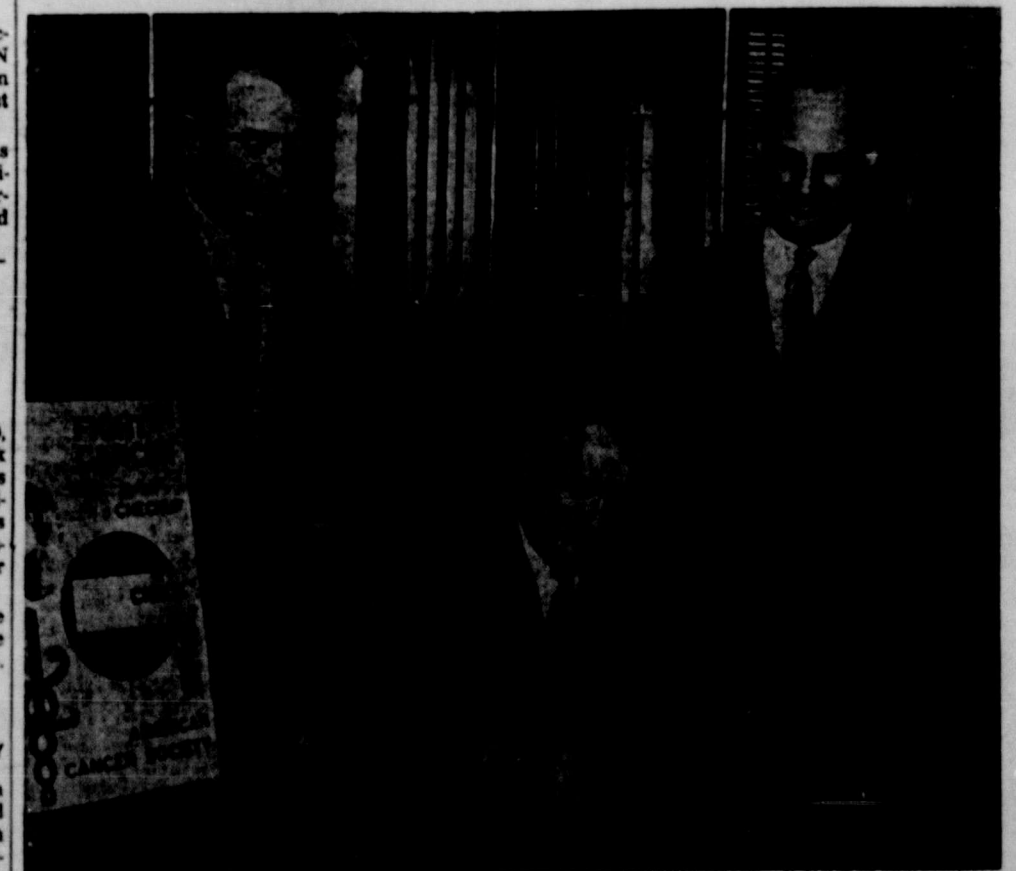

BAND PARENTS MAKE STATEMENT IN FAVOR OF CONTINUING MUNICIPAL BAND

In order to settle unfounded rumors as to the purpose of the election to be held on April 1, 1958, regarding the abolition of the Municipal Band, which is now functioning, the parents of band members wish to point out to the voters some of the important reasons for leaving the matter as it now is. For a number of years, the City of Spur has maintained a Municipal Band as provided in its ordinances of several years ago by providing funds each year, usually in the amount of \$1,000.00 per year, to the Spur High School Band. In exchange for these funds, the Spur High School Band has performed as a Municipal Band at countless functions which were outside the regular scope of school activities. If you will think back over the many times you have seen our band perform at functions which had no remote connection with the school activities, you will agree that a Municipal Band has functioned whenever called upon to do so.

A good deal of street talk has been heard to the effect that this election is for the purpose of getting rid of an old law having to do with some band which was organized many years ago and which is long since out of existence. This is not correct, as the present law resulted from an election held in 1941, and such law, which is an ordinance of the city, was passed in 1942. In 1945, an election was held for the same purpose as the present election, namely, to do away with the municipal band and that election resulted in a vote of 109 to 11 in favor of maintaining the band. Now the voters are again being asked to do away with the municipal band by means of the present election, if it results in abolishing the municipal band, will be to deprive the school band of the financial support which the city has given it in past years under this law. There has been some talk of increased taxes as a result of this election, but no provisions have been made for such a tax. So, it is impossible to believe that increased taxes will result if this election carries. If our understanding of the matter is correct, there has never been any authority to assess and collect a "Band Tax." Also since the wording of the ballot does not grant such authority, there can be no increase in taxes.

We feel that the voters of the city should carefully consider the effect of their votes on this election. The school band needs this financial support, and we feel that the City of Spur is getting the services of a fine Municipal Band at a very nominal cost each year.

Our band is operated at a total cost each year of about \$8000.00 and of this amount the City of Spur has borne about \$1,000.00, which is about 1/8th of the total cost. None of the city money is used for salaries, but is used for the purchase of equipment, for repairs, and for music. We feel that the many appearances of this band in public have probably been in the proportions of 2/3rd for school activities and 1/3rd for municipal activities, such as parades, rodeos, meetings, and other civic affairs. Surely the City of Spur is getting value received for its money so spent.

Some people have argued that the City of Spur can function without a Municipal Band, and that is certainly true, but instead of cutting down on the fine things we do have in our town, we should all support them and make them better. It is equally true that we could get along without garbage collection, without police protection, without fire protection, and without a lot of other fine services, but you can well imagine the kind of town we would have as a result.

Think this matter over carefully before you vote in this election, and we feel confident that you will vote to continue the present system. Vote "FOR" the band in this election.

BAND PARENTS ORGANIZATION

TO THE CITIZENS OF SPUR

On petition of 10% of the qualified voters of Spur the City Council has called an election to repeal or retain the Ordinance to establish and maintain a municipal band. This was originally voted when the City had a Municipal Band, separate from the Public Schools. Later it was agreed that this contribution be paid to the School Band. Since February 15, 1942, this contribution from the City has been \$12,741.88.

The Council asks re-consideration of this Ordinance for the following reasons:

1. It is not legal. The original vote was to establish and maintain a Municipal Band — not a School Band.
2. The tax is unequal. Citizens of Spur are paying a tax to support the Band that is not matched by people in the remainder of the Spur Independent School District. Since 1947 this has been \$1,000.00 per year.
3. The Spur Independent School District has adequate power to tax for support of the band. The City tax rate is at the legal maximum and revenues can only be increased by raising valuations. This is contrary to the policy of the council.
4. City tax monies are, in effect, being diverted to the Spur Independent School District.
5. The Council appreciates the Spur School Band and its contributions to the City, but believes that these services are those that any school band renders its home town.

We, the Council, request that you vote on this issue.

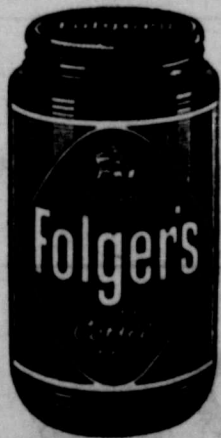

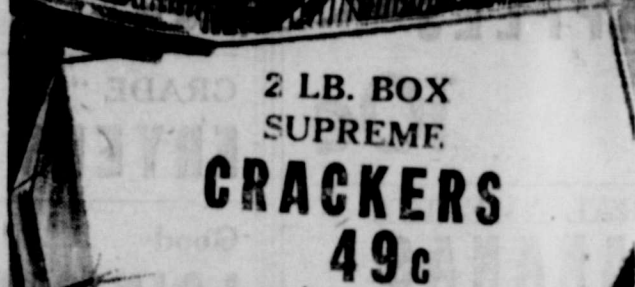
