Wreck Injuries Fatal To Quitaque Youth

Funeral services for R. J. Finney, 19, Quitaque, were held at 3 p. m. Monday afternoon in Turkey.

Memorial Hospital but died about midnight. Wesley Rhodes, 20, and Glen Hairgrove, 18, were also injured in the wreck. Rhodes is in an Abilene Hospital where he is undergoing treatment for a serious eye injury. Hairgrove

received lacerations around the head, was hospitalized in Spur Memorial Hospital and later released.

The wreck occurred when a 1955 Ford driven by Rhodes went out of control on a curve approaching Dockum Creek bridge. The mishap occurred about 9:45 p. m.

All three youths were thrown from the car, which overturned three times according to investigating Highway Patrolmen. The car came to rest against a sign board about 75 feet from the pavement.

A three car collision occurred in November on the Dockum Creek bridge. In this mishap, Gene Slaton was severely injured.

Only 11 Days Left For Car Inspection

Roughly, 1 out of 5 Texas autos have not been inspected as required by State law and there remains but 11 more working days prior to the inspection deadline on April 15.

Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety said today that some 700,000 motor vehicles must still pass through the inspection lines prior to that date if their owners are to avoid being handed tickets for violation of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Law. Enforcement will begin April 16, he said.

FINAL FIGURES SHOW . . .

State, County Produce More Cotton, Quality Below Par

Total number of bales of cotton ginned and harvested from the 23 member counties of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. off the 1957-58 crop according to the Bureau of Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, is 1,970,520 bales.

Final figures for 1957 show that Dickens County had a higher yield than in 1956—18,961, compared to 17,517.

The Bureau of the census released the figures as of March 24. The 1957-58 crop total compares to approximately 1,650,000 bales produced in 1956-57.

For the entire state of Texas production was higher in 1957 than it was in 1956. The '57 crop total was 3,800,425 for the State as compared to 3,555,160 bales in '56.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has reported that 1957 ginnings contained the smallest proportion of higher-grade cotton of any crop in the past years.

"The schools were competing against a standard and not in direct competition with each other," choir director Norman Arnett points out.

A sprinkling of Spur voters turned out Tuesday and voted to continue to support a municipal band. The issue carried 111 to 71.

At the same time, they elected D. L. Knight, Loyd Robertson and Rex Holder to City Council posts as aldermen. Robertson and Holder were seeking re-election.

The aldermen were sworn in at a called meeting of the Council Tuesday night to comply with a law which says city officials must take office within five days following election. The Council meets regularly each Monday night.

South Dickens Draws Wildcat

Dallas-based Fletcher Oil and Gas Drilling Corp. has spotted location for a 5,000-foot wildcat in southern Dickens County.

New operation, designated the No. 1 L. C. Horn, is to go down 1,980 feet from south and 2,059 feet from east lines of Section 210, Block 1, H&GN survey.

It locates two miles east of the Duck Creek-Tannehill field and about five miles southeast of Spur townsite. Lease contains 80 acres and estimated elevation at well-site is 2,178.

Pan American No. 1-J Swanson, discovery offset in the Croton Creek-Tannehill field, coming out of hole with fish. Hole is bottomed at 4,470 feet.

Contract Let For Farm Road

A contract for the construction of grading, structures, base and surfacing on Farm-to-Market Road 1061 in Dickens and Kent County was awarded in Austin this week, J. C. Roberts, District Highway Engineer has announced.

The firm of Harry Campbell, Abilene, submitted the low bid of \$160,236.49 on the project which runs from FM Road 261 south to Kent county line; from Dickens County line south 4.8 miles and from 500 feet west of FM Road 1228, west 0.6 mile, a distance of 7.5 miles.

Resident Engineer Homer Ray of Snyder will be in charge of the project for the highway department, and it is estimated that the work will take 130 days to complete.

ANTI-RECESSION MEASURE

Expanded Farm Housing Loan Program Announced By FHA

An expanded farm housing loan program, designed to speed up farm building construction improvement as well as act as an additional anti-recession measure, was announced today by Walter T. McKay, Farmers Home Administration State Director, according to John E. Quattlebaum, the agency's local County Supervisor.

Now an owner of a farm in agricultural production and on which the operator plans to produce at least \$400 worth of farm commodities for sale or home use may qualify for the 4 percent long-term housing loan provided that he meets other standard eligibility requirements.

Formerly an eligible applicant had to own a farm that produced a more substantial part of the operator's annual cash income.

Loans may be made to build, improve, or repair farm houses or other essential farm buildings, and to provide water for farmstead and household use.

Mr. Quattlebaum said that in addition to financing major construction, the loan funds can help meet many other improvements to the home as well as to farm service buildings. While tenants and farm laborers are not eligible, the owner may borrow to do the construction work or make improvements for them.

The loans are made to farm owners who need credit to finance building improvements or repairs, but find that adequate credit is not available through banks or other regular credit channels. The interest rate is 4 percent and loans may be amortized over periods up to 33 years.

Eligibility for loan assistance is determined by the three-member County Farmers Home Administration committee, and applications are now being accepted.

COTTON SHOWS HIGH YIELD

Highest yields of cotton and lowest salinity content in the soil were obtained on double (cantaloupe) beds in tests conducted on El Paso Valley soils by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

The conventional single row bed produced the poorest seed germination and lowest yields of any type bed tested. Other type beds included sloping double bed, flat planted and furrow planted.

COTTON LABOR HIGH

Ten hours of labor are required in cotton production for grass and weed control, making it the second highest cost item for this crop, says Fred C. Elliott, extension cotton specialist. But, he adds, this figure can be greatly reduced if recommended control practices are followed. He advises a visit with the local county agent for detailed information.

Still Room For Improvement In School Parking

Wayne Beadle, City Police officer, reports that traffic tangles around the schools have been relieved to some extent, but there is still room for improvement.

"It would help immensely if drivers would be more careful about selecting parking places," Beadle says. "Some people are prone to pull into a parking place even though it is on the wrong side of the street."

"We are merely trying to make the streets around the schools a safer place for the children. We appreciate the cooperative spirit of both school officials and drivers," Beadle says.
