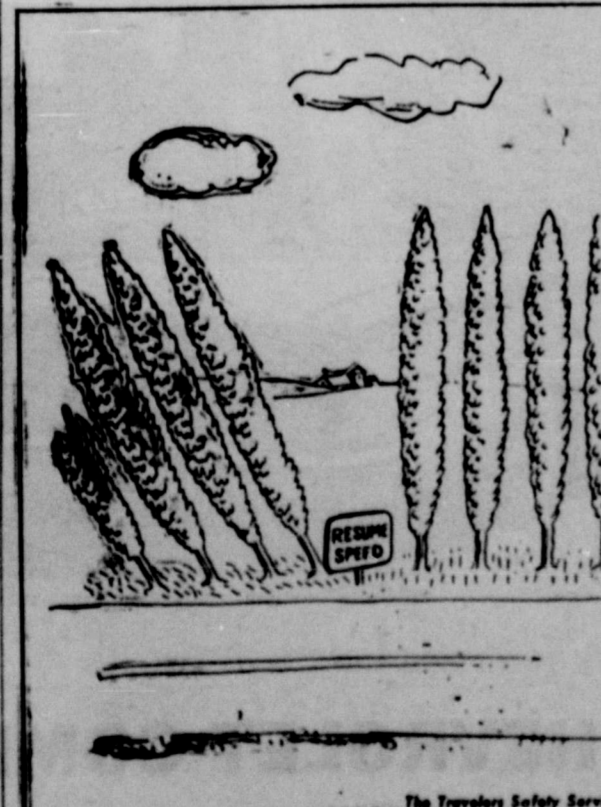
FFA Group Wins Trip To Chicago

Completion Try Due Offset Well

A southeast offset to the discovery well in Dickens County's two-well Duck Creek-Tannehill field, the Pan American Petroleum Corp. No. 1A-Girard Trust Co., has run pipe prior to completion attempt.

Bottomed at 4,650 feet, the development prospect was cased with five and one-half inch to total depth and pipe cemented with 100 sacks. Operator will drill out and complete after cement cures.

The project topped Tannehill at 4,576 feet and was cored from 4,577-627 feet. Recovery included five feet of oil-saturated sand, seven and one-half feet of sand with trace of oil, and 3 1/2 feet of shale, lime and sand without shows.

Spotting 330 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of Section 192, Block 1, H&GN survey; venture offsets the Fletcher No. 1 Copeland and is six miles southeast of Spur townsite. Lease contains 148 acres.

STATE NEWS
A new court house is about being erected at Belton, which will cost over thirteen thousand dollars.
The Quinlan Herald, of the 19th says the health of Wood county is remarkably good.
The same paper also says, for weeks past there has hardly been a day that we have not seen some one hunting a home in Texas.
We learn from the Bonham Independent that the rust is doing great injury to the oat

crop in many portions of Washington County.
The Jefferson Gazette of the 19th inst., mentions the discovery of silver in the upper portion of Cass county, which has created considerable excitement in that region.
Great numbers of sheep are annually raised in Northern Texas and shipped to the New Orleans market, where they are sold readily at from four to five dollars a head.
We learn from the Pioneer that the crops in Freestone county are backward, owing to the excessive rains. Wheat and rye look tolerably well, but the oat crop is said to be an entire failure.
Nine persons, it is stated, have recently been killed by the Indians, about twenty-five miles from Weatherford county. On Keechi Creek in that county, the people are building forts for protection.
A large drove of sheep, numbering 1200, passed through town yesterday. They were purchased in Mexico, at one dollar per head, we were told; we did not learn their destination.
In a letter received by Geo. W. Glascock, Esq., from the Assessor of Williamson county, we find the following interesting statistics:
Number of acres planted in corn, 10,908; in wheat, 14,278; in cotton, 1,206; in other crops, 963.
Seems there is no fear of starvation. All we now need is capital to build railroads, which a large emigration will certainly furnish.

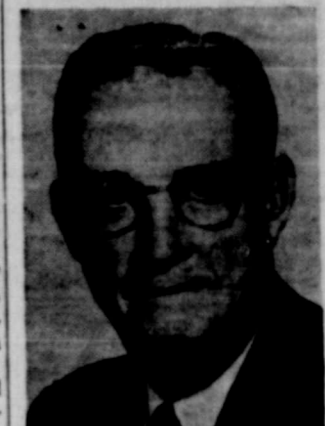

About Your HEALTH

New bread standards go into effect July 1, to assure that you get the kind of bread you pay for.

After that date, if you buy a loaf of cinnamon-raisin bread and it doesn't have raisins in it, the baker is subject to action.

The standards will require all bread and rolls to be properly baked so as to truthfully reflect their ingredients and nutritious qualities.

Patterned after federal food standards, they will be administered by the State Health Department's Food and Drug Division. A majority of the baking industry fully supports the standards.

Labeling means much more than a colorful wrapping around a loaf of bread. It includes, among other things, the advertising claims made by the baker for his product.

A food is misbranded when its labeling is false or misleading in any particular, if it is offered for sale under the name of another food, or if it is an imitation of another food (unless its label bears in prominent type the word "imitation" and immediately thereafter the name of the food imitated).

Bread is also mislabeled if it purports to be or is represented as a food for which a "standard of identity" has been described and it fails to conform to that standard.

Standards not only protect consumers in the marketplace; they also protect honest manufacturers by assuring fair competition. The consumer may select and serve standardized foods with complete confidence.

IT'S THE LAW

EVIDENCE

A trial aims to settle a dispute when the parties fail to do it themselves. For this the court needs facts. Simple? Well, no. For if the parties could agree on the facts, a settlement out of court would be easy. But as a rule each side has its own story, and the trial judge or jury must hear witnesses and view physical evidence to decide what took place. In doing this the court applies the rules of evidence.

It took centuries for the court to work out rules by which a judge can say what is proper or improper evidence.

1. In "hearsay," for example, someone who did not see the event reports what someone told him about it. Courts seldom allow such evidence, except in rare cases such as where the dying words, say, of a murdered person may be vital.

For one thing, courts frown upon hearsay because no one in court can cross-examine the eye-witness to find out what actually took place, or to judge whether his story merits belief.

2. Irrelevant testimony will also be barred by the judge. It is testimony which has no bearing on the case, even though it may be true enough.

Suppose in a battery case the jury has to find out whether Jones knocked Smith down or not. The judge would have to rule out any evidence that Jones, say, was rich and Smith poor. Such a fact, even if true, has nothing to do with the "issue." Moreover, such irrelevancies often confuse jurors or arouse their prejudices.

3. Only an expert like a doctor, an appraiser, a chemist, a pharmacist or an engineer can give opinions as evidence, and he must show his qualifications as an expert before the judge will let him express his views.

Lawyers keep inadmissible evidence out of court by making "objections." When the judge "sustains" an objection, the jury may not hear the evidence. Or if he does, the judge may "instruct" the jury to ignore it. Should the judge "overrule" the objection, the jury may hear the evidence.

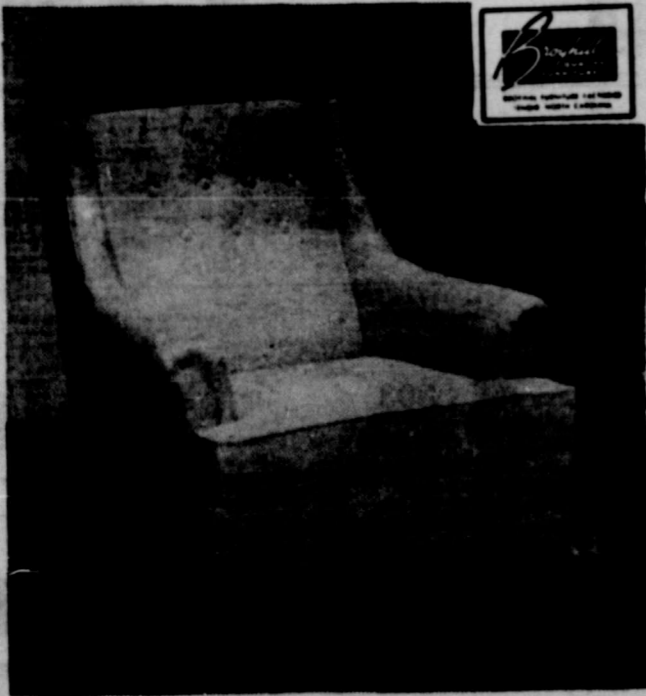

Wives, Widows Can Receive SS Benefits

Some aged wives and widows who are separated but not divorced from their husbands could be receiving monthly social security benefits on the basis of their husbands' work, if they would come in and file application, John G. Hutton, district social security manager, said today.

A 1957 change in the law did away with the requirement that a wife must be living with or supported by her husband when she files application, and that a widow must have been living with or supported by her husband at the time of his death. Now, a 62 year old wife or widow may be eligible for a monthly benefit merely on the basis of a legal marriage that is still in existence—even though they may have been separated for many years and are at opposite ends of the country. There has been no change in the law with respect to the provision that a wife can receive monthly benefits only if her husband is also receiving his benefit.

Aged wives and widows who believe that they can qualify for benefits as a result of this change in the law should contact us promptly to determine what their rights are, Hutton concluded.

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security Office will be in Spur on June 18 at 9:30 a. m. at the Justice of the Peace Office and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to Social Security.
