Legal or not, we don't know, but it's an idea that would save the county expense of opening all the polls and aping election judges, printing ballots, etc. to elect one man to State office.

The election in County Precincts 2 and 4 could be held with a minimum of expense in August.

Notice where Orville Faubus gained an easy victory in Arkansas primary. The victory would appear to be a direct slap at the Eisenhower Regime who sent bayonets into Central High School in Arkansas to force integration.

The City has received easements from the Highway Department concerning the paving of Hill St. An Appraisal Board, headed by E. F. Shurgart, is expected to start to work immediately appraising property that will be affected. Spur might get that highway after all.

VFW Auxiliary Sponsors Blood Typing Service

The Ladies Auxiliary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 7212, Spur, will sponsor their annual "Walking Blood Bank" or, free blood typing project, August 6-9 at the Spur Memorial Hospital.

This service will be done by experienced lab technicians. The Auxiliary will assist by registering the volunteers and working an up to date file for the Hospital.

The technician, Carroll B. Lassiter, at Spur Memorial Hospital, Mrs. Dupree Allen and James Gordon have volunteered their services without charge. The usual charge for this service is \$3.00.

The purpose of the program is two-fold; one is to have the blood type on file at the hospital in case of an accident or illness of the one typed, and the other is to have a file of potential blood donors when blood is needed by another individual.

The "bank" is set up on a strictly voluntary basis and by taking advantage of the free typing service does not necessarily commit anyone to give a transfusion. For the past three years many persons in Spur and surrounding communities volunteered to have their blood typed. Race or age is not a factor and all ages and races may volunteer.

Each person typed will be given an identification card with his blood type and RH factor. Possession of this card might prove valuable in case of an accident.

Volunteers are cordially invited to come by the Spur Memorial Hospital at a time designated below. The typing is painless and 10 to 15 minutes is all that is required to fill out information forms and complete the process.

Lt. Don McGinty Is Attending Radar School

Second Lieutenant Donald D. McGinty is attending the eight-week radar course of the USAF Aircraft Controllers School at Tyndall Air Force Base, near Panama City, Florida.

The 22 year old Air Force Officer is the son of Mrs. Oscar M. McGinty of Spur and husband of Norma O'Neal McGinty of Jacksboro, Texas.

McGinty is being taught to direct, through the use of ground radar and radio, our jet fighter planes within firing range of enemy aircraft. His primary duty during peace time is to control rocket-toting jets in practice intercepts—simulating conditions of an actual air attack.

He is also learning to use his radar equipment to assist aircraft that become lost and to navigate aircraft around storms.

Upon being graduated from the school in October, 1958, he will be assigned to an Air Defense unit somewhere in the United States or overseas to help fortify the radar network guarding this country and the free world.

Spur Swimming Pool To Offer Two Courses In Lifesaving

Miss Wandell Emery, Ft. Worth, will conduct classes in Life Saving at the Spur Swimming Pool next week providing enough pupils are interested in enrolling.

The senior lifesaving course requires that a person should be able to swim 440 yards, be in good health, must be 16 or over and attend classes two hours per day for a total of 17 in order to receive a Senior Lifesaving Certificate.

The junior lifesaving course requires an age limit of 12-15 years and a course requirement of 15 hours.

Two Commissioners Face Run-Off; Yarborough, Daniel In Easy Win

A total of 1707 voters turned out Saturday to cast their vote in the First Democratic Primary. This represents a total of 1,321 voters who actually paid their poll tax, according to Tax Assessor-Collector Sheriff C. E. Rogers. The remaining 386 votes were cast by voters with a belief to be a little above average, although poll tax payments were down.

Official count of the ballots Tuesday did not turn up any changes. There will be a runoff in the commissioners race in both precincts 2 and 4. Jack Lawson is in the runoff in precinct 2 with present commissioner E. J. Offield. In precinct 4, incumbent Henry Edwards will face Charlie Gage.

Run-off election is scheduled for August 23.

Heavy Rains, Wind, Hit Area Near Highway; Trees Uprooted

Proof Of Age Needed For Social Security

You may get your first social security check faster if you have proof of your age available at the time you file your claim, according to John G. Hutton, district manager of the Social Security Administration.

"But don't delay filing your claim just because you don't have proof of your age handy," he added.

While a birth or baptismal certificate is generally the best proof of age, certain other documents or records are acceptable, Hutton explained. He suggests that persons who believe they may have difficulty in locating proof of age communicate with his office for specific information on what types of proof are acceptable and how they may be obtained.

"Some people," Hutton said, "have gone to the trouble of establishing a 'delayed' record of birth for social security purposes. Not only is this unnecessary, but in some instances, such a record is by itself unrepresentative."

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security Office will be in Dickens on August 6, 1958 at 1:30 p. m. at the City Hall and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to Social Security.
