

The death of an intestate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems regarding distribu ion of his seperate estate. In the preceding column, we investigated the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife Now we shall see that, where seperate property is invoved, a completely different set of rules applies in determining heirship and apportioning the estate among the rightful clai-

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before mar-riage, and that which is acquired after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be com-munity property until the con-trary is clearly proved.

There are several health risks in travel to strange places, but knowledge teamed with common sense man make your trip both safe and pleasant, provided you take the trouble to follow a few simple rules.

Immunization requirements for foreign travel vary from country to country and should be determined in advance so that you have ample time to re ceive proper immunization.

By all means, you should be

protected against typhoid, polio and smallpox. Your family doctor, local director of health or the State Department of Health can ad-

vise you on these reccommen

While it is probably safe to drink water in the big tourist hotels and the big cities everywhere, the traveler who gets off the beaten path should, in most areas, be careful!

The only safe water should be filtered and treated in an approved manned and approv-ed by the local health depart-

Coffee and tea are not ne cessarily safe because of boil-ing, and carbonated or noncarbonated soft drinks from unfamiliar sources should be avoided. And don't forget that ice cubes from poluted water can contaminate any drink.

Unless you are sure that the local milk is absolutely safe, and that the custards, ice cream, etc., are made from safe milk, you had better steer clear of them.

There is no rule that cooked food is safe food, but you should be especially careful of uncooked foods: refrigeration standards may be poor and especially in sub-tropical climates, fods will spoil quickly. Many local farming habits bring sewage into close contact. bring sewage into close contact with vegetables, so eat only fresh vegetables and fruits that ou are sure of.

Bathing in salt water is us-ually safe unless the water is grossly contaminated with sewage. Water infested with dan-gerous fish-sharks, carracuda,

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
