A Budget of \$247,454 was adopted by the Trustees of the Spur Independent School District following a public hearing on Monday, Sept. 8, according to B. G. Nunget," Nunley states.

"This decrease is represented by a cut in operation costs and teachers' salaries," Nunley says. The system has fewer teachers this year than last.

The major item of the budget is salaries of teaching per-sonnel in the amount of \$157,-629. Teaching supplies, total-Arnold, ing \$6,702 brings the instructional total to \$164,331. A total of \$17,910 has been budgeted for transportation of pupils; \$21,300 for operation of pupils, splant; \$3,600 for maintenance of the plant; \$3,000 for fixed charges; \$5,100 for capital outlay and \$18,213 for debt service

The per pupil cost of opera-tion is \$280.50, which will pro-bably be among the lowest in this area according to Nunley. Salaries of all personnel will
