## Bulldogs Meet Chiefs

The Spur Bulldogs will encounter the Crosbyton Chiefs in a non-conference football game Friday night at 8 p.m. in Crosbyton.  
Coach Bill Henry is expecting a tough game from a Crosbyton crew that drew 160 yards in penalties in last week's game with Seagraves. The Chiefs hold wins over Post and O'Donnell besides their tie game with Seagraves. (Seagraves and Spur scrimmaged in a pre-season workout, and Seagraves looked pretty good).  
The Bulldogs came through the Anson game without any major injuries. Tackle Kenneth Gilcrease received a cut lower lip and several other players were bruised. However, everyone is expected to be ready for tomorrow's game with the exception of Don Morrison who is still out with a shoulder injury.

Spur will start Ernest Wilson and Woodie McArthur at Ends; Kenneth Gilcrease and Melton Webb, Tackles; Jim Gabriel and Marshal Murray at Guards; Don Kidd at Center; Freddie Walker at Quarterback; Kenneth Sutt and Jimmy Paronto at Halfbacks and Joe Copeland Fullback.  
Sophomore quarterback Freddie Walker pulled the Spur Bulldogs from the brink of defeat and shoved them into a 14-14 tie with Anson last Friday night as he reeled off a sparkling 72-yard scoring run with only a minute and 46 seconds remaining in the game.  
Walker's run came after Spur had forced Anson to punt out on the Bulldog 28 yard line. Playing with a slick ball, Walker had the snap from center squirt from his hands; he bugged the ball back into center, saw an opening in the line, and set sail for the goal line. He was cleared by a block by End Woodie McArthur near mid-field, then sprinted the rest of the way untouched.  
Walker collapsed in the end zone with a leg cramp. Try for point failed and the game ended 14 all.  
Anson opened the scoring late in the first period when Anson Quarterback David Probst started throwing strikes. Taking over on their own 38, the Tigers scored in 11 plays. Big factors in the scoring drive was a 15 yard personal foul penalty against Spur, and two pass completions, one for 12 yards and the other for 11 both were completed to End Freddie Adkins.  
Halfback Ronnie Ryan scored the Tiger TD on a plunge from the one yard line. Try for point was no good.  
The Bulldogs took over the lead early in the second quarter when linemen Gary Scott and Melton Webb charged through to partially block a Tiger quick-kick, Don Kidd recovered.  
Spur took over on the Tiger 12. Walker was thrown for a

Also included in the discussion were activities to be included in the program for the three day affair. Friday afternoon, October 24, the time between the parade and ballgame has been set aside to give the various classes an opportunity to meet. Although production estimates are down, the 1958 cotton harvest is well ahead of the pace set last year.  
A spot check with local gins showed that Spur Gin had ginned 116 bales; Farmers Co-Op, 185; and Massey Gin Co., 176.  
Last year at this same time, Spur Gin had turned out only 10 bales; Farmers Co-Op, 38; and Massey Gin Co., 27.  
Ginners said they would begin round the clock operation as soon as enough hands come in to pull the cotton.  
Recent rains may tend to lower grade a point, general consensus is that the rains have not been too damaging, locally.  
One ginners said cotton experts said the moisture might lower some strict-middling cotton to middling grade.  
The crop situation in the Craton and Wichita Communities is fair this year, although the cotton bolls are small. Maize is being combined in a big way in the area. Many boll pullers will be needed in the next few weeks to get the fast-opening cotton out of the fields.  
Good crops prevail in the Afton area with the harvesting of maize and cotton in full swing.  
There is a shortage of hands all over the county.

## Local Rotarians Host District Gov. Thursday

The Rotary Club of Spur is host today to Burnett B. Roberts, governor of the 573 district of Rotary International, who is making his annual official visit to each of the 45 clubs in the top 50 counties of North West Texas.  
He will address the local club and confer with President Bill Gregory, Secretary Mansell Bragg and committee chairmen of Rotary administration and service activities.  
Mr. Roberts is owner of Roberts Insurance Agency in Levelland, has been a member since 1935 and past president of the Rotary Club of Levelland.  
Mr. Roberts was born in Vagreville, Alberta, Canada. Moved to Amarillo in 1925 finished school there in 1931 and moved to Levelland. He farmed until 1947 at which time he rented his farms and went in the insurance business. He has been active in community affairs serving as director of the Chamber of Commerce, Community Chest and as President of the Hockley Junior Livestock show for several years. He was elected as district governor of Rotary International for the 1958-59 fiscal year at Rotary's 49th annual convention in Dallas, last June. He is one of 258 district governors supervising the activities of more than 9,800 Rotary clubs which have a membership of 562,500 business and professional executives in 110 countries and geographical regions throughout the world.  
Wherever Rotary clubs are located, President Bill Gregory asserted in discussing the governor's visit, their activities are similar to those of the Rotary Club of Spur because they are based on the same general objectives—developing better understanding and fellowship among business and professional men, promoting community-betterment undertakings, raising the standards of business and professions and fostering the advancement of good will, understanding and peace among all the people of the world.  
Each year, this worldwide service organization continues to grow in numbers and strength. During the past fiscal year, 359 new Rotary Clubs were organized in 51 counties and geo-

graphical regions, bringing the total number of Rotary clubs to an all-time high of nearly 10,000 and eight countries were added to Rotary's roster—British Honduras, Eritrea, French Guiana, Laos, Martinique, Papua, Virgin Islands and the West Indies Federation.

## FROM WHERE I SIT . . .

Those Anson boys weren't so little were they?

That was a pretty exciting (and frustrating) game the Spur Bulldogs played in Anson last Friday night. Some Spur people were pretty hot after the ball game.

They'd have been hotter if Freddie Walker hadn't scored the tying touchdown in the last three minutes of play.

It was a hectic game that saw Supt. of Schools B. G. Nunley nimbly vaulting the stadium fence at the request of one of the game officials.

At least two other Spur followers were waved off the field, Richard Walker, who was keeping statistics for Coach Henry and Don Morrison, injured Bulldog quarterback.

For a while I thought yours truly was going to watch the game from the stands. I was the recipient of a couple of pretty nasty glars.

Johnny Scudder who faithfully rings the Victory Bell, rang so vigorously and got so excited he fell off the bell and was sore Saturday.

I thought for a while my write-up would be a blow-by-blow account rather than a play-by-play.

I've heard that Spur has sent a scout to Crosbyton with a tape measure to check the height of the Chief stadium fence. We want to be prepared Friday night.

In our opinion, the officiating Friday night was a little one sided. Spur got some penalties that hurt. I'm not saying we didn't deserve them, but it appeared that the same foul went unnoticed when inacted by the Anson team.

That is strictly our opinion. Some of the players thought the refereeing was fine.

However, although some Spur fans were mad and gave voice to their feelings, it didn't change one thing.

In fact, the team and the school could have been penalized, unjustly perhaps, for the action or deed of some overzealous fan.

Perhaps you are familiar with the case of the Haskell Indians who were suspended by the Interscholastic League for two years.

The Haskell suspension was brought about not by anything a Haskell fan said or did, but for the actions of an Albany fan who assaulted a referee following the Albany-Haskell game in Haskell a couple of years ago.

The Indians have since been re-admitted and are participating in sports this year.

The same thing could have happened to Spur.

Sure, after the ball game tempers flared. But Monday morning people could look back and say "well we got a good rooking" and go on.

The officials in a football game are like a Supreme Court Justice. What they say goes. No amount of griping or fussing at an official will cause him to change his decision.

If my understanding of the

rules are correct, an official can FORFEIT A GAME for an offense as minor as a crowd booing. I may not be correct in this, but I think I am.

As you may know, a coach may not step on the field to question a call.

No good will come of violence and flaring tempers displayed by spectators at an athletic event. But we are all human, and humans are imperfect. It was hard to turn the other cheek Friday night.

However, even though we are mere humans with human faults, we should nevertheless try to restrain them.

Anson is behind us, we've played them to a deadlock for the past two years. Crosbyton is ahead, and they own a tie with Seagraves, a team that gave the Bulldogs considerable trouble in a pre-season scrimmage.

Last week the district managed a split with their opponents. Stamford crushed Slaton 36-6; O'Donnell tripped Tahoka 28-20 while Post drubbed Friendship 28-0 and Floydada eased past Rails 8-6.

Floydada had trouble with Rails, a team that had to come from behind to tie Post 8-8. Stamford won over Slaton as expected, but O'Donnell's win over Tahoka might be considered a mild upset.

This week finds Tahoka at Seagraves, Floydada at Padusah, Post at O'Donnell and Slaton at Frenship.

**BULLDOGS**—From Page 1 seven yard loss, but Halfback Jimmy Paronto got 8, and Halfback Kenneth Sutt matched Paronto's run with an 8 yard scoring run. Paronto scored the extra points, and the Bulldogs took a 8-6 halftime lead.

The game was marred by penalties, Spur being penalized seven times for 80 yards, and Anson received 4 penalties for 40 yards.

The Tigers threatened early in the third period moving to the Bulldog nine before Scott recovered an Anson fumble. The Bulldogs had been penalized 15 yards in the drive, after Anson kicked short and recovered their own kick-off near the Bulldog 19. Tackle Kenneth Gilcrease broke through to throw Propst for a seven yard loss to help stall the drive. Scott's recovery came on the next play.

Spur tried to kick out of danger, but Gilcrease' snap was low and Fullback Joe Copeland couldn't get his kick away and was dropped on the Spur 19.

Propst then faded back and found Adkins all alone and the big end scored, putting the Tigers in front, 12-8. Try for point was good and Anson took a 14-8 lead.

Spur took the ensuing kick-off but appeared to be stalled. Copeland kicked out of danger, to the Anson 35, but Center Don Kidd was down fast under the punt and recovered it for the Bulldogs when an Anson back bobbled it momentarily.

From there Spur drove to the Tiger two. Sutt gained two; Copeland went up the middle for 7; Sutt gained one for the first down on the Anson 22.

Paronto added five on three carries before Sutt made it another first down with a run good for 11. With the ball on the Tiger 7, Sutt moved it to the six before Paronto picked up four to the Tigers two where he fumbled and Anson recovered.

Riding the arm of Propst, the Tigers were again on the move before defensive halfback Bubba Bigham managed to intercept a pass on the Bulldog 18.

Spur had to kick, however, and Anson was penalized 15 yards to their own 32. They couldn't make a first down, and kicked out of bounds on the Bulldog 28, setting up Walker's scoring run of 72 yards.

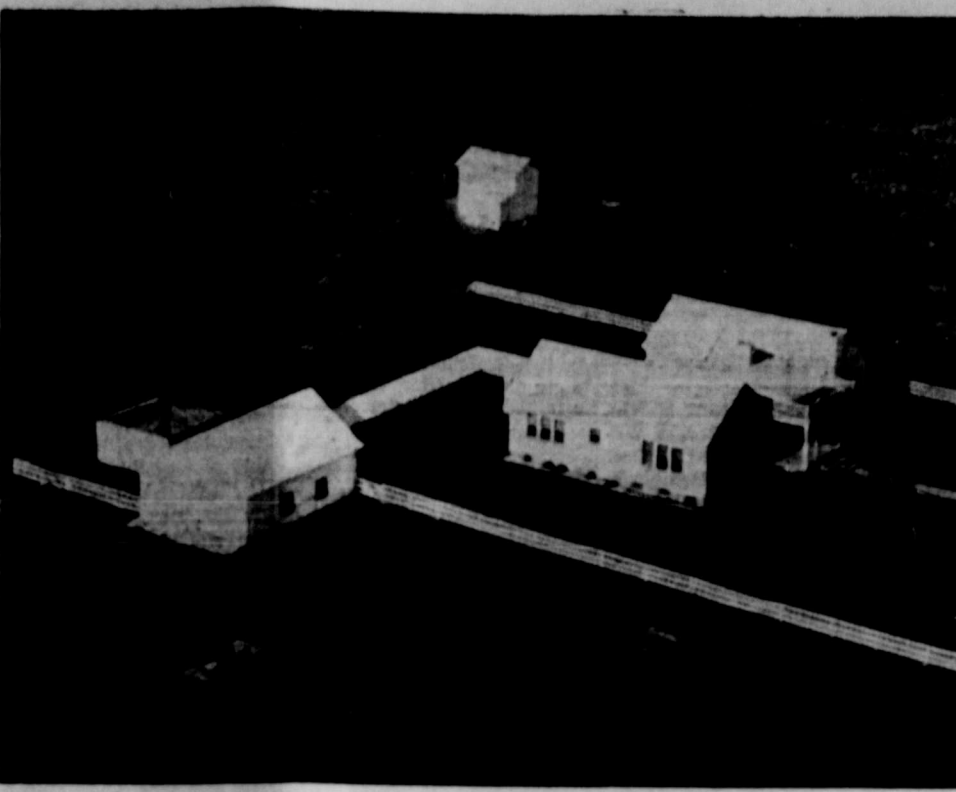

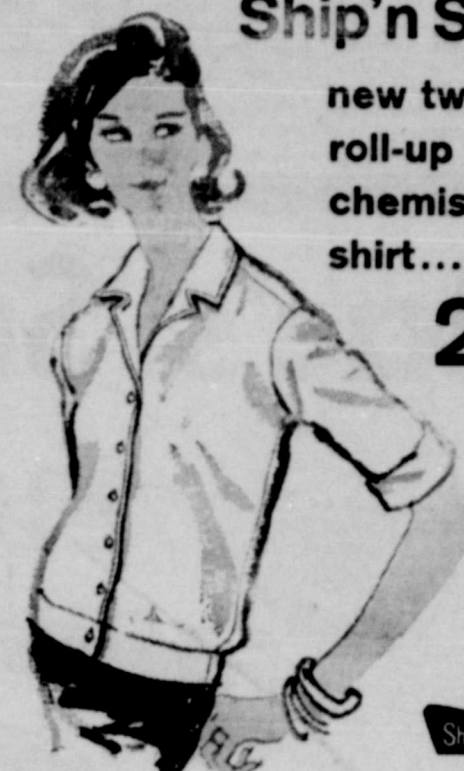

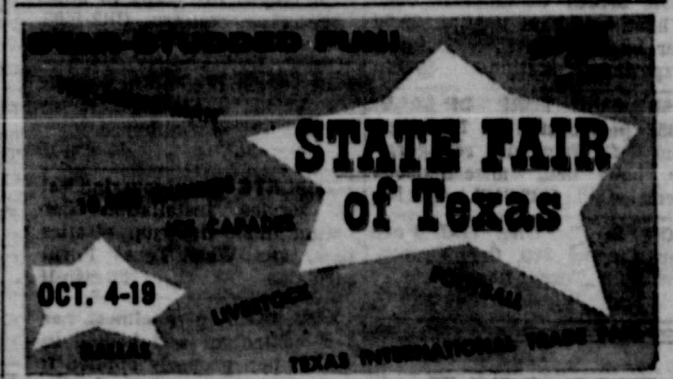
