Nation Gets 9% Cotton Cut

"It is expected that Dickens County will receive a cotton allotment cut that is in line with the 9 per cent cut received by farmers over the na-Admission prices for the show are: adults—75 cents; tion," reports W. W. Gunn, County ASC office manager. children (age 6 to 12)-35

Official figures for the local allotment cut have not yet been released for publication.

However, some farmers have indicated to Gunn that they do not plan to plant their coton allotment in 1959. In such cases, this allotment can be loaned out, Gunn says.

"Any farmer who does not plant any portion of his allotted cotton acreage, may get his Services Set By allotment released for one year," he says. "The County committee may then loan this allotment out to some other farmer in the county. The farmer who does not choose to plant his allotment, will have it protected by law, the same as if he had planted it," Gunn assures.

This year, there are two plans for the cotton producer. The A and the B Plan

Under Plan A, a produc plants his alloted acreage, a is guaranteed full level of the price support.

Under Plan B, a producer may plant his allotment plus 40 per cent more and he will be guaranteed 15 points below the suport level, and market his cotton as he pleases.

"Every cotton grower must thodist Church, Assembly of choose either plan A or plan God, Bethel Baptist Church, B, and he must utilize the plan he chooses on all his farms." Gunn concluded.

The referendum on marketing quotas will be held Dec. 15. The referendum must pass by at least 2-3 or more of the to tal vote. If 1.3 or more vote against the referendum, then there will be no plan B, and producers who stay within the allotment will receive 50 per cent of the support level.



IT'S THE LAW * in Texas *

Possibly the most mystifying of all traffic rules to the average driver are those relating to "Right of Way" at an intersection. In reality, however, other fellow's courtesy, and be these rules are quite simple.

In trying to understand the laws regulating intersecting traffic, it is best to star! off the premise that all streets are of equal dignity, legally speaking.
