Coach Bill Henry and the 1958 edition of the Spur Bulldogs can carve themselves a place in sports history if they can turn in a win over Crane in their Bi-District game Friday in Crane.

A Spur team has never won a bi-district game.

The Bulldogs will have their work cut out for them . . . the Crane team has been defeated only one time this year . . . by a strong Lamesa team (Lamesa is a AAA school). Crane has been tied by Pacons and Monahans, also AAA schools.

The Crane team has a history similar to this year's Bulldog team. They were not supposed to win their district, but they surprised the experts, as the Bulldogs have.

Although Crane is a AA school, they sport a seven man coaching staff. They include: Dan Anderregg, Oklahoma University; Floyd Underhill, Howard Payne; Bill Estes, North Texas State; Larry Freeman, Southwestern University; Bob

by Black, East Texas State; and Jack Gothard, Texas Western.

The Crane team is reported to be light but fast. Coaches Bill Henry and Jim Eddins scouted the Golden Cranes in their victory over McCamey last week. The Crane team will start a forward wall that will average about 154 pounds. The Backs will average 144.

These are the weights listed on the program, and may not be completely accurate.

Nevertheless, the coaches state that the Crane team has good speed, and returned the first two McCamey punts for touchdowns.

Rangers Crowned 8-Man Champs; Meet Wellman In Bi-District

For the 7th time in 12 years, Coach Ralph Marshall and his Patton Springs Rangers cut a Championship Plug out of the Notch-Stick by defeating the Roaring Springs Yellow Jackets on Ranger Field last Friday night to the tune of 50 to 16. It was not a deciding game, but the victory gave the Rangers a clean slate in the 2-B Eight Man Conference for this season, and opened the gate for a chance to play the champion of the 1-B Eight Man Conference in the bi-district game this week-end. Wellman is the 1-B champion. Plans have been made this week for the play-off on neutral ground. The Rangers have already taken an early measurement of Wellman on her own field with a score of 36 to 0. Both teams have rolled off much football since September 26th, so the bi-district game bids fair to be a scorcher.

Quarterback Ronnie Ragland secured the initial deposit in the first quarter for Patton Springs and Harold Goodwin converted. The Yellow Jackets built an unexpected wall and held the Rangers to three 1st downs and no more score for the 1st period. This was unusual, for the Galloping Trio, Ragland, H. Goodwin, and Blasingame had been used to scoring within four plays of the beginning kick-off.

Harold Goodwin and Ronnie Mullins reached the pay-off line to round out the 2nd period touchdown for Patton, but there wasn't enough Ranger power to push over the PATS.

The sleeping Ranger Giant awakened in the third quarter and the Patton Springs score shot up to 42 by the close of the period. After long hard drives, Blasingame accounted for two touchdowns and Harold Goodwin for one, with Ranger Tommy Lawson taking two passes over the line for conversions. Early in the 4th period, Billy Goodwin recovered a diverted pass off the shoulder of a Yellow Jacket receiver and raced 20 yards for the final Ranger score. Jerry Tarrant pushed over the extra points. Coach Marshall used the Reserves for the last part of the 4th quarter and the score ended 50 to 16 in favor of Patton.

THINK BEFORE SIGNING

Whenever you are asked to sign something, your signature should be a warning signal that in some way you may become legally obligated by what you sign.

Usually you are asked to sign something as a result of a business transaction, such as a contract, a receipt, an order, a release, an option, a mortgage or deed. For your own protection, you should clearly understand what you sign, why you are signing it, and what the consequence may be. It is rarely possible for a person who has signed a document to avoid its legal effects.

You can decrease your legal risks by always taking these precautions before you sign anything:


Know what you are signing and what the document contains. Understand clearly what it means. Don't be confused by its title - a "statement" may be a release of all your claims, or a "contract" may be a negotiable promissory note. "Co-signing" a note may result in your having to pay it.

Read Everything in any document. Clauses in fine print may be important. Remember,

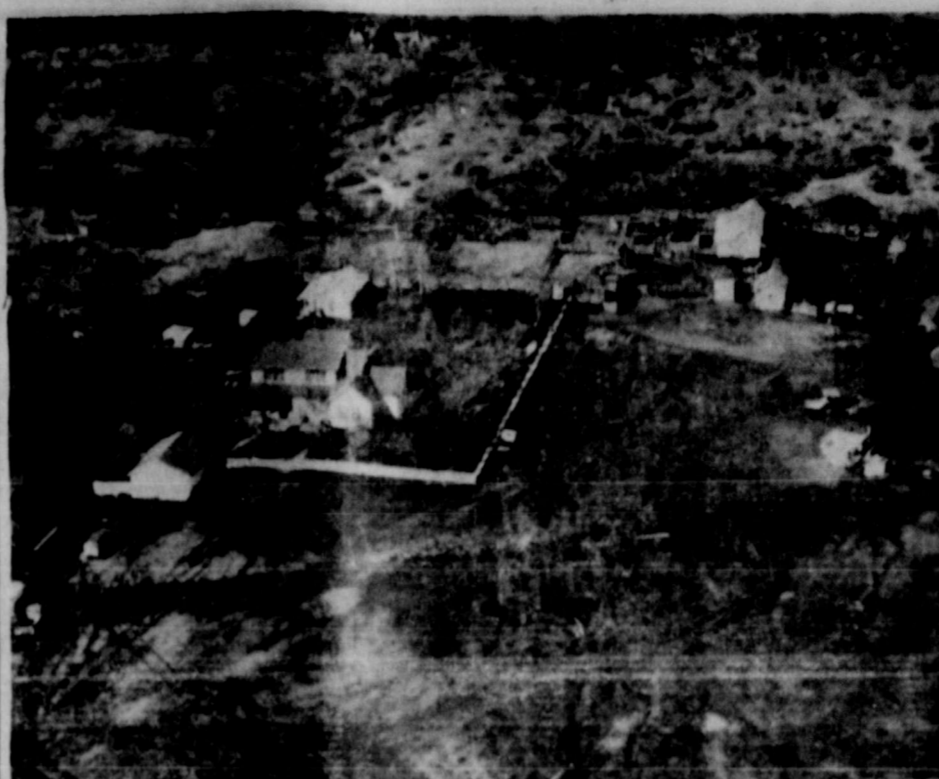



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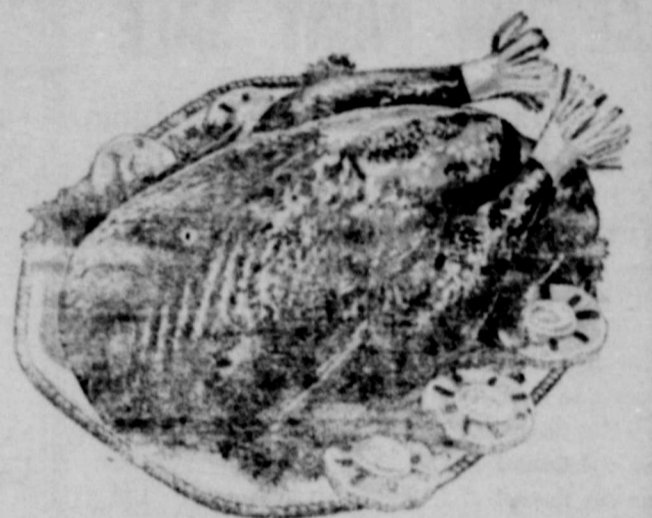
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
