Swenson & Sons for the upbuilding of Spur, and was established not long after the founding of the town. March 10th, 1924 the Spur Inn was destroyed by fire, but scarcely had the foundation cooled before arrangements were being made for its rebuilding. Just six months after the fire the Inn entertained the Stamford Trade Extension Board, September 10th. Rooms were opened to the public September 15th. The Fire Boys of Spur were entertained here with a banqut September 18th, and September 19th. the business men of Spur were given the privilege of enter taining the Community Fair Queens with a banquet. The Inn was opened for business in full force September 20th.

This little hotel is the pride of all the traveling men through West Texas, and many of them make their arrangements to spend their week ends at the Spur Inn. It is well in keeping with the progress of the town, and the citizens take pride in referring to the Spur Inn.

AVERAGE SALARY OF TEXAS TEACHERS

The 35,459 teachers in the public schools of Texas during the 1923-24 session drew salaries aggregating \$30,336,-737, according to compilation made by the State Department of Education. The average salary was \$880.

Woman teachers totaled 28-061, with salaries aggregating \$21,668,169, with average salary of \$772, compared with 7,398 men teachers with total salaries of \$8,668,567, average \$1,172.

White teachers totaled 31-112, of which 24,738 were women with salaries of \$20,-021,548, and 6374 men with salaries of \$8,038,350. Negro teachers numbered 4,347, who were paid \$2,276,838 salaries, or an average of \$523.

Teachers in common school districts drew a total of \$11,-793,463 in salaries, while \$18,-543,273 were paid teachers in independent school districts.




